Kendrick Council To Emphasize Clean Up Campaign

When the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association began its efforts to have both towns certified as Gem Communities, a survey was conducted to determine what the residents thought should be some primary goals. The answer came back—"clean up the towns." This response was not lost on the city councils of both Juliaetta or Kendrick. Some good work was accomplished (and is still being done), in both towns. But the Kendrick City Council wants to keep the campaign alive and encourage it.

At its February 11 meeting the Kendrick council approved a Clean-up Month for April which will be held in conjunction with the City of Juliaetta as it prepares for its Centennial Celebration May 2, the J-K Community Development Association as it works on its Gem Community efforts, and the Juliaetta Centennial Committee. The council wants a high profile campaign to promote the clean-up and urges all citizens of the Gem Community to participate.

Those who are working to improve the community should be shown recognition and be thanked for their efforts, the city council believes. The council salutes the Kendrick Roadside for its continued effort to improve the appearance of its business. The metal siding on its storage building and the addition of the Horseshoe Park are great additions.

As part of the Clean-Up the council has arranged for dumpsters to be placed in both towns. These are the big dumpsters and will be placed in the towns without cost by the Latah Sanitation Co. Latah Sanitation will also pick up from these dumpsters at a reduced price to the towns.

The City Council of Kendrick deserves recognition for its efforts to encourage community clean-up—it would be a good thing if the residents would encourage the council by responding positively to this campaign. Everyone would benefit.

Development Assoc. Plans to Apply for Comm. Action Grant

Reference is made in a display advertisement in this week's Gazette to the fact that the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association intends to apply to the Idaho State Department of Commerce for a \$10,000 Gem Community Action Grant.

Readers are advised that this is a matching grant. That is, for every dollar of state money there must be a match in the form of a written, signed pledge to contribute dollars or in kind goods or tangible services of that value. Fewer dollars of other support pledged locally, fewer dollars from the state.

Local government bodies, businesses, organizations, and individuals are encouraged to support the association's application by completing the required commitment form and returning it as soon as possible to the association. Commitment forms are available at Abtams Hardware.

If granted, the money (potentially \$20,000 in dollars or in-kind contributions) will be used to support selected elements of the association's first year plan as a Gem Community. The project must be completed within one year of the application's being approved.

Kendrick Council Considering New Fire Station

The Kendrick City Council is considering constructing a new fire station it was learned this week. Actually the new structure would be termed an Emergency Services Facility, and would house the present fire truck and the ambulance and provide for a training and meeting room for firemen and the Emergency Medical Technicians.

According to preliminary plans a new metal building would be built on and adjacent to Lots 2-6 of Block 14 (most Kendrick know the property as the old city hall next to the swimming pool). This property is now owned by the city and the proposed building would be compatible with other initial storage structures also located on these lots.

Part of the proposed building, which is planned for 30 x 50-feet, will provide the fire department with three bays for their present two firetrucks (the old one and the new) and space for a future quick response pumper truck, and will have a fourth bay to be used by the K-J Emergency Medical Technician unit for housing the ambulance. The remaining building area (30'x30') will function as the Fire Department meeting hall and training center.

The proposed building would meet all building code requirements and would be insulated and also have an adequate heating system.

If the new building is built it will require the removal of the old metal building owned by the city that now is being used by the Good Samaritan Food Bank. Plans call to leave the metal garage next to the food bank intact. This garage houses the ovens for the Locust Blossom Festival cooking facility.

The preliminary estimated cost of the project is between \$90,000 and \$100,000. The bulk of the cost is expected to come from an Urban Development Block Grant. The city's share is expected to come from a variety of sources. The city expects to sell certain parcels of public property that are not used in present operations or not expected to be of further need.

The sale of at least one primary parcel of land or property will be needed to generate the majority of the matching funds. The city has two primary parcels being considered—one is the existing city hall (the old Dept. of Lands Bldg.) and the other is the present fire hall. Smaller contributions toward the matching funds could come from the sale of vacant city lots, the fire fire department, the E. M. T.'s, Locust Blossom Committee or the Cities of Kendrick and Juliaetta contingent funds.

The present method of housing the fire trucks and the ambulance is less than desirable from a safety, maintenance and training standpoint. At the present time, the new fire truck is parked behind the ambulance in a 20-ft wide building. The rear of the truck and passenger doors of both the truck and the ambulance are not accessible unless the vehicles are driven out of the building. The old fire truck is located in a small city shed approximately two blocks from the station.

The existing fire station is heated with an oil stove, which is located in the meeting room. Heat from the meeting room passes through the uninsulated wall, and, along with a space heater, provides winter heating for the truck and ambulance.

The talk of a quick response fire protection comes from the the present need for such a vehicle. The city

A More Attractive Juliaetta-Kendrick Is Goal of Community Development Assoc.

Making Kendrick and Juliaetta more attractive to visitors was one of the major topics for discussion at the regular monthly meeting of the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association held Thursday noon, Feb. 13, at the fire hall. The well-attended luncheon meeting also heard a number of reports from its committees.

The meeting was called to order by president Wally Butler. Following the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting, treasurer Greg Mann presented a report indicating the association has assets and liabilities of \$11,591.00. Assets include \$471.03 in the checking account, and \$7,897.08 in a savings account. Other assets include \$2,625.00 in centennial medallions on hand and \$598.00 in prepaid silver deposits.

In reports from Bob Hassold of the executive committee and Donna Heinen of the Business Expansion and Retention committee, both indicated that they were encouraged by the interest of a number of local high school students who were willing to get involved with community development. Hassold said he was pleased by this interest and thought it should be pursued. Heinen added that she too wanted to encourage the interest of the students. She said there had been discussion the high school classes of teacher Colette Cozort help with a community survey on subjects such as business and shopping practices and strengths and weaknesses in the local trading area, etc.

Frank Jacobson, the coordinator of the Gem Community Program, talked to the group about the plans of the Gem Community Program. Making the towns of Juliaetta and Kendrick more attractive to visitors is one of the prime first-year goals of the program, he said. Some priority items and plans, however, must be put on hold, Jacobson told the association. He named the plan to attract retirees to the valley as one of these because of present lack of adequate housing.

presently does not have the money to buy, the personnel to operate, or a location to house a quick response fire truck at this time, but space in the new fire station should be allotted for this future need.

There are other items of discussion on this proposed plan to build the new fire station, but what the city council is most interested in now is what the public thinks of this project. If public reaction is favorable, then the city can move ahead with the project. If there is unfavorable reaction, the council would have to consider other alternatives to solve existing problems. It is understood that within the next two months the council is going to call a public meeting to present its plan and receive public questions in response. At present time about all the council is asking is for the citizens of the community to "Think about it."

committee currently working on the publication of a brochure promoting the Kendrick-Juliaetta area, reported that the brochure is nearing the printing stage and should be available soon. The association is also working on the development and creation of a community calendar. Clayton, Zana Sherman and Lillian Howerton are now attempting to find a proper format for this calendar.

Jacobson next reported on a proposed plan for obtaining and using Gem Community Grant funds. (One of the advantages of becoming a Gem Community is that the community involved becomes eligible to receive matching grant funding for improvement projects). Preliminary discussions with the various committees, Jacobson said, indicated that making the communities more attractive to visitors appeared to be a favored overall theme. If this proposed plan is acceptable to the association (and also if it is perceived to be acceptable to the communities), the major elements would be:

1. Printing a community attractions brochure (this part of the program is already in progress, Jacobson noted).
2. Beautifying the entrances of both towns.
 - a. In Kendrick with landscaping, clean up and permanent plantings.
 - b. In Juliaetta with beginning stages of a city park at the end of town (e. g. ground preparation, permanent plantings).
3. Utilizing history as an attraction in both towns by:
 - a. Providing signage to designate historic buildings. Included in this would be money for metal pipe for mounting street street signs.
 - b. Providing a brochure or other handouts in reference to a walk-tour of both towns.

Before final plans can be made it will be necessary to put a cost on this project. Jacobson said he would like the committees of the association to review and discuss the proposed project and arrive at a cost figure. Bob Hassold said he would like to see these signs placed in all parts of town, and not just on main streets. The association approved this and committees are to try to get these figures to Jacobson by the end of the month.

On a completely different subject, Dana Magnuson told the meeting that the Latah County Commissioners are studying a plan to develop a solid waste transfer station some where in the county. Under this plan solid waste would be transported to a central point, bundled or blocked for shipment and then transported to a permanent disposal site out of the state. Finding a suitable location for this transfer station is now under investigation, Magnuson said. He would like suggestions concerning a possible site. The now-defunct A. F. Green Brick Plant in Troy has already been suggested as a possible site.

Helen LaBoeuf, the director of Lewis-Clark State College's Small Business Administration Center was a special guest at the meeting. This center is designed to assist small businesses in the area, and in doing so, also helps the communities they are located in. Mrs. LaBoeuf talked of obtaining a grant to conduct a housing assessment in this area. To do this, she suggested that Mary Emery be contacted by as many individuals and organizations to express a need for a survey of this type to gathered information.

Slowing down "economic leakage" (local money going out of town) was another subject discussed by Mrs. LaBoeuf. Through her center there is help from well-trained, knowledgeable people.

In helping promote tourism in the area, LaBoeuf said that some help might be obtained from the Idaho Travel Council.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK, A MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE STATE OF IDAHO, PROVIDING RATES AND FEES FOR SEWER SERVICES WITHIN THE CITY. PROVIDING THAT SECTION 2 OF ORDINANCE 628 BE AMENDED, PROVIDING FOR THIS ORDINANCE TO BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT FROM AND AFTER ITS APPROVAL AND PUBLICATION.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Kendrick deems it in the public interest to increase sewer rates to a level which will permit sewer revenues to equal the amounts expended for sewer service and improvements;

Section 1: That Section 2 of Ordinance No. 628 be, and the same hereby is amended to read as follows:

- A. Each account unless otherwise specified shall be charged a monthly rate of \$7.00.
- B. Beauty parlors, cafes, taverns, meat markets, frozen food lockers and laundries shall be charged a monthly rate of \$14.00.
- C. Public schools shall be charged a monthly rate of \$70.00.
- D. All rates and charges shall be paid before the 25th day of each month.
- E. Past due accounts shall include an additional penalty and service fee of \$1.50.
- F. Churches, lodges, and civic organizations shall be charged a monthly rate of \$5.00.
- G. The City may require a deposit of \$50 to insure payment of accounts.

Section 2: That the foregoing monthly rates, fees, and charges for sewer services are hereby fixed and shall be paid effective the first day of February, 1992.

Section 3: That all other ordinances, regulations and rates for the sewer system shall remain in full force and effect.
