## Kendrick Grange "travels" to Kansas City; Considers several local issues

By means of a well organized and narrated slide show, Kendrick Grange at their February 18 meeting went along with Kendrick High School students Jenni Hakelting and Tricia Jeffries as they attended the 64th National FFA Convention at Kansas City, Mo. last Nov. 14-16. Sharing the narration, the young ladies took the Grange along on the cross-country bus ride, introduced them to some new friends, showed them some of the sights of Kansas City and gave them a sense of the spirit and purpose of the FFA all across the country.

Highlights of their experience—in addition to having fun—included workshops where, for example, they learned the importance of developing self-esteem and a positive self-image. In line with the convention's theme, "Leadership for a Growing Planet," President George Bush was on hand to emphasize the need to achieve excellence in education and to keep America competitive in foreign markets.

The young ladies had not been just passive observers on their trip, however. They came back to school with two objectives in mind: to increase competitive activities in parliamentary procedure and, to advocate that Ag Science be considered a laboratory science by the University of Idaho for admissions purposes. The Grange looks forward to hearing more about these two possibilities and how they fare.

Coming back to the local scene, the Grange agreed to have a ple booth (with hot cinnamon rolls for early comers) at the Juliaetta Centennial celebration. And while they have not yet fully planned their entry, the Grange does intend to be in the Centennial Parade. Something humorous, probably, stressing friendship between the two towns. (old timers probably scoff at that, but that's where the fun can come in!)

Anticipating the need soon to name a Community Citizen of the Year, Kendrick Grange also decided to change its guidelines for selection. Whereas in the past recognition has rotated annually between residents of Kendrick and residents of Juliaetta, beginning this year the choice will be made on the basis of the total community represented in the Grange membership; and that includes Deary to the north and all those areas to the east formerly served by Evergreen and Banner Granges, many of whose members have joined Kendrick Grange. In its own way, the Grange as a struggling institution is contributing to the growth of unification across lines that were once considered inviolable. A new community is emerging.

The Grange also considered a request from the Clearwater Resource Conservation and Development Council, Inc. that it support a proposal to reconnect State Highway 12 and old Highway 95 by means of a bypass east of Spalding. A proposed stretch of new road for a quarter mile along the east side of the railroad right-of-way east of Spalding would restore the linkage that was lost with the closing of the railroad overpass.

In the view of the Grange, the fact that the practically abandoned stretch of the road along the south bank of the Clearwater is in very poor condition—bordering on the hazardous says those who have transported livestock over it—and the fact that maintenance would be costly are reasons enough to say no to the proposal. The Grange considers access

to Spalding and Lapwai by the present route (Highway 12 up to the Highway 95 bridge and then south) is fully adequate for all purposes.

Finally, the Grange expressed its support of the idea of the K-J Development Association's seeking a Gem Community Grant. When it came to making a commitment of current funds as a match, however, the membership hesitated. The decision eventually was to ask individual members to make commitments of cash and/or of goods and tangible services through the Grange. Members wishing to provide matching support required by the action grant are encouraged to submit a statement of commitment to the Treasurer, Ruth Helmsgraber, listing the dollar amount of the cash and/or goods and services. The pledges will then be combined into a composite commitment of support from the Grange.

The next meeting, March 3, will feature a men's cookie bake-off. On hand will be representatives of the high school FFA and FHA chapters, bringing us up to date on their activities.

**CITY OF JULIAETTA  
WATER SYSTEM IMPROVEMENTS**  
 Final Public Notice of Possible Impacts to Important Land Resources and Notice of Finding of No Significant Environmental Impact:  
 The City of Juliaetta has filed an application for financial assistance with the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) for construction of a domestic water river infiltration gallery and filtration plant. The plant would be located near the Pottlatch River north of Middle Pottlatch Creek.  
 The construction of the filter backwash water basins and submersible raw water pumping station is proposed to occur in the riverbank within the 100 year floodplain. They will be near riparian wetlands and the raw water lines would be trench across wetlands. Also, the growth in population facilitated by the project has the potential to indirectly impact other floodplain areas in the community.  
 Taking into consideration the small size of the backwash basins (approx. 20x70-ft.), the negligible effects of the proposed construction on floodplain wetland values, and the substantial additional cost of locating the basins and station outside of the floodplain, FmHA is considering determining alternative locations as impracticable. Also, as a condition of extending financial assistance, FmHA is considering requiring the city of pass and enforce an ordinance prohibiting the purpose use of water for use in any new structures located within a 100 year floodplain.  
 FmHA has assessed the potential environmental impacts of this proposed action and has determined that it will not significantly affect the quality of the human environment. Therefore, FmHA will prepare an environmental impact statement for this proposed action.
