Dillard Stone, 83, Claimed by Attack

Charles Dillard Stone, 83, died Tuesday afternoon, February 25, at St. Joseph Regional Medical Center in Lewiston after being stricken with a massive heart attack at his home.

He was born August 4, 1908 on Big Bear Ridge, near Kendrick, to Tom and Amy Lee (Galloway) Stone. In 1913, the family moved to Coberg, Mont. where he started school. In 1920, they returned to Idaho and settled in Bovill, where he attended school and graduated from the 8th grade. He continued to read and studied throughout his lifetime. He moved to California and worked as a heavy equipment operator and mechanic for various construction firms throughout the western states, including R. G. LeThourneau. He married Betty B. Lichhardt in Reno, Nevada, on March 11, 1932, and continued to work in construction throughout the depression as work was available. During World War II, he was a diesel mechanics instructor for the military at Astoria, Oregon and was also a purchasing agent for the government of heavy equipment that was to be sent overseas. His projects included work on the Bonneville Dam in Oregon and he was a guest of honor at the dam's 50th anniversary dinner. He was also involved in the Don Pedro Dam Project in California. In 1944, the Stones returned to Idaho, living and working in the Boise area. They moved north in 1952 to Bovill where he worked first for Potlatch Forests and later for Josephlyn. They returned to Boise in 1957 when he went to work for the State of Idaho Highway Department in the shops. He was one of the two employees who generated the idea and followed through to found the Idaho State Employees' Retirement Program. After retirement, the Stones made their home in Rocklin, California, where he became the city building inspector. They moved to Lewiston 13 years ago.

Stone was an active member of the American Association of Retired Persons, Kendrick Grange, No. 413, RSVF Senior Volunteers, Banana Belt Senior Citizens, and the Masonic Lodge. He held offices in each of these organizations, taught defensive driving for the AARP and was a state legislative lobbyist for the Grange. He was an avid outdoorsman, enjoying hunting, fishing, and gardening and loved to share his produce and flowers with everyone. He was working in his flower beds when he was stricken.

Surviving are his wife, Betty, at the family home in Lewiston; a daughter, Betty Jo (Jody) Smith at Deary; two sisters, Grace Maher of Lewiston and Augusta Connelly at Hood River, Oregon; and a brother, Rupert A. Stone at Milton-Freewater, Oregon; 8 grandchildren, 13 great-grandchildren; and a host of nieces and nephews, and a large group of young people whom he had befriended. He was preceded in death by a son, Charles W. Stone in 1977; a brother, Joe Stone; his parents; his step-father, William Bengs, and a step-mother, Nettie Gentry Stone.

Funeral services were held Monday at 2:00 p. m. at Short's Funeral Chapel at Moscow, with Pastors Adrian and Evelyn Burd of the Orthodox Christian Church officiating. Pallbearers were Jim White, Jerry Galloway, Don Bieker, Jim Dorian, Tom Weber, and Joe Brockman. Honorary bearers were JayDee Wilson, Eddie Galloway, Charles Bower, Lloyd Slatter, Harold Larson, Don Smith, Victor Haag, and the men of Kendrick Grange No. 413.

Organist was Nancy Blasko, and vocalists were Mrs. Blasko and Karen Eggers. Featured songs were "I'll Never Walk Alone", and "Amazing Grace".

Burial followed at the Moscow Cemetery with Mason Ritualistic services provided by Deary Lodge No. 72, A. F. & A. M.

Kendrick-Julietta Receives \$10,000 Grant For Gem Community Work

Word was received from the Idaho Dept. of Commerce that the Gem Communities of Kendrick and Juliaetta have been approved for a \$10,000 matching grant from the state. Gem Community Coordinator Frank Jacobson said the Dept. of Commerce notified him of the grant Tuesday morning. The action means that the state will match, dollar for dollar or in kind services and work for community betterment programs up to \$10,000.

To qualify for this grant Kendrick and Juliaetta, through the Gem Community Program had to present a comprehensive set of plans and goals it would use these matching funds for.

On the advice of state officials, this community has been engaged in putting its application in order without delay, as word had come down that funds for this part of state program were rapidly running out.

Talking about the grant, Jacobson had high praise for the work of Lil Howerton and Kathy Shove who did much of the paper work and the fax work in getting the application to the Dept. of Commerce.

Julietta's Water Project Grant Restored by State

Julietta's "on again, off again" state grant for the construction of new water treatment project is on again, after Gov. Cecil D. Andrus announced Wednesday, Feb. 26, that the \$400,000 water project grant from the Commerce Department to build a water treatment plant near the Potlatch River would be restored. The grant was first approved in February of 1991. Later in the year Juliaetta voters approved a \$250,000 water revenue bond issue to meet its share of the cost. Then in January of this year the Dept. of Commerce notified the city that it was withdrawing the grant because of noncompliance and delays in procedural work.

That action by the state touched off a public meeting, at which representative of the Dept. of Commerce, and other agencies involved with the project and the grant were present. At the orderly and friendly but intense public meeting, the state and federal officials explained what the concerns were and why the grant was terminated. But just as importantly, the officials got to know how sincere the citizens of Juliaetta were in trying to solve their long-standing water problems.

Julietta residents responded to Mayor Jeff Lohman's call for letters and phone calls to government people urging the reinstatement of the grant. The council also stepped back and took a new look at the project in an attempt to meet state concerns.

All the meetings, the work, the letters, phone calls and personal contacts paid off last week when Dept. of Commerce Director James V. Hawkins, in Kendrick for a press conference to announce the Certification of Kendrick and Juliaetta as Gem Communities, also brought with him a letter for Mayor Lohman advising him of the Department's reinstatement of the block grant contract.

In part, the letter to Lohman said, "The overwhelming show of support by the community and the extensive efforts shown by you, the city attorney and the city council to work for solutions in a timely manner is, in part, the reason I feel confident in reinstating the contract."

Tuesday evening of this week, Lohman said "The Juliaetta City Council and I would like to thank all the citizens who wrote or called the Dept. of Commerce and state legislators. With these letters and calls, we feel you took an active and important part in getting our grant restored."

Mayor Lohman then had one more favor to ask. "We ask you now to call or write back to the people you sent letters to or called and thank them for their part in the reinstatement of the grant."

With the grant now restored, the council is getting ready to hire an administrator to help handle the paper work involved in the successful completion of the water project. Much of the state's original direct-

While Lohman was expressing his and the council's appreciation to Juliaetta citizens for the support that was given in getting the water grant restored, he also added that the council would like to acknowledge the Cedar Ridge 4-H Club, its leaders and parents of members for making planter boxes for the town. "We feel they will enhance the appearance of the city, and we are very pleased with them," he said.

April Designated as "Clean-Up Month"

Both the Kendrick and Juliaetta City Councils have designated April as "Clean-Up Month" in the two towns. "So please do your part to make your town the best it can be," Mayor Lohman urged. He added that because the City of Juliaetta is celebrating its centennial this year, Juliaetta residents are asked to put a little more effort into the clean-up as the community gets ready for the big event.

Coeur d'Alene Man Pleads Guilty to Swan Killings

The persistence of the Kendrick City Council and the efficiency of Idaho State Fish and Game Conservation Officer Tanna Ragan paid off this week as a Coeur d'Alene man plead guilty to the Nov. 23 killing of two swans on the city's lagoon. Wesley Simmons was charged in Kootenai County court of a felony theft, but later in a plea bargain, agreed to plead guilty to a lesser charge of misdemeanor theft. Part of the agreement was that Simmons also agreed to pay the City of Kendrick \$1,000 in reimbursement for the value of the birds.

The admission of guilt by the Coeur d'Alene man culminated over two months of effort by the Kendrick council and hours of investigation and work by Officer Ragan. She told the Gazette Monday morning that the charge against Simmons was a criminal complaint and not a Fish and Game charge. "But the main point," Ragan said, "was that we managed to get what we wanted to get for Kendrick." That was the admission of guilt and the reimbursement for the loss.

The Kendrick council was just as outraged by the wanton killing of the birds as the community and had spent much time in pursuing the case. Councilman Darrel Brocke had praise for city clerk Lynn Bruce for her work, and said the council is deeply grateful to Officer Ragan for her efforts. Brocke said the council had written a letter to State Fish and Game Dept. commending Ragan for her work.

Mayor Jerry Brown said the council hasn't met since the news of the outcome of the case became known, but added "you can be sure we will be talking about it." Asked if the council was going to use the money it receives from the settlement to replace the birds, Brown said, "Well, again we haven't taken the subject under advisement, but personally I would be in favor of using it (the money), to replace the birds."

It's Official Now: We're an Idaho "Gem Community"

Idaho Department of Commerce Director James V. Hawkins was in Kendrick last Thursday, Feb. 27 to proclaim the communities of Kendrick and Juliaetta as Idaho's newest Gem Community group. He said the two communities qualified for the designation because of an aggressive, locally based economic development effort. Hawkins singled out community leaders and the formation of the Kendrick-Julietta Community Development Association and applauded their efforts to communicate with the area residents.

"The fact that Kendrick and Juliaetta choose to work together shows good business sense," Hawkins said. "Both communities have a strong future in store for them as this cooperative working relationship grows."

The Idaho Gem Community program was initiated by the Idaho Department of Commerce in 1988 to provide focused, technical, economic development assistance to Idaho's communities.

Prospective Idaho Gem Communities receive training in organizing an economic development group, leadership and conflict resolution, infrastructure improvements, strategic planning methods, community assessment, business retention and expansion and economic diversification strategies. Communities completing the program may apply for a \$10,000 matching grant to implement their economic development strategy and will qualify for extra planning points on Idaho Community Development Block Grant projects.

"State government's role is to be a partner in the business of creating new opportunities and new jobs. The Gem Community program is a part of this effort," Hawkins said as he presented the certification.

At the beginning of the press conference held last Thursday morning at the Kendrick Senior Center, Hawkins was introduced by Keith Kopenski, also of the Dept. of Commerce. Hawkins asked Juliaetta Mayor Jeff Lohman, and Frank Jacobson, Gem Community coordinator for the K-J Community Development Assoc. to step forward to receive the certification papers.

"It's a pleasure to be part of the program," Jacobson told Hawkins and the audience. He also recognized the efforts of all who had worked to make this certification possible. Jacobson also noted the efforts of Mary Emery of Lewis-Clark State College for her help and assistance to the community since it began its quest to become a Gem Community. Mayor Lohman told Hawkins that "We'll be working to be a part of the effort to better the community."

Following the presentation of the Gem Community Certification, Hawkins asked Mayor Lohman to step back up to the stage and it was then he made the announcement of the reinstatement of Juliaetta's \$400,000 block grant for the water project.

CITY OF JULIAETTA WATER SYSTEM IMPROVEMENTS
Final Public Notice of Possible Impacts to Important Land Resources and Nettle of Finding of No Significant Environmental Impact:
The City of Juliaetta has filed an application for financial assistance with the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) for construction of a domestic water river infiltration gallery and filtration plant. The plant would be located near the Potlatch River north of Middle Potlatch Creek.
The construction of the filter backwash water basins and submersible raw water pumping station is proposed to occur in the riverbank within the 100 year floodplain. They will be near riparian wetlands and the raw water lines would be trench across wetlands. Also, the growth in population facilitated by the project has the potential to significantly impact other floodplain areas in the community.
Taking into consideration the small size of the backwash basins (approx 20x70-ft.), the negligible effects of the proposed construction on floodplain and wetland values, and the substantial additional cost of locating the basins and station outside of the floodplain, FmHA is considering determining alternative local areas as impracticable. Also, as a condition of extending financial assistance, FmHA is considering requiring the city of pass and enforce an ordinance prohibiting the pumpage of water for use in any new structures located within a 100 year floodplain.
FmHA has assessed the potential environmental impacts of this proposed action and has determined that it will not significantly affect the quality of the human environment. Therefore, FmHA will prepare an environmental impact statement for this proposed action.
The application for financial assistance for the construction is available for review at USDA-FmHA, 1210 Northway Blvd., Coeur d'Alene, ID 83814; (208) 765-2066.
Any person interested in commenting on the impacts of the proposed location, alternative sites or actions, and/or methods that could be used to mitigate the impacts may do so by providing such comments within 30 days to the Chief, Community and Business Programs, FmHA, 1210 Northway Blvd., St. Boise, ID 83705. FmHA will make no further decisions regarding this proposed action during this fifteen-day period. Comments received during this period will be reviewed and the final determination is based on or to receive a copy of it should be directed to the Community Supervisor, USDA-FmHA, 3510 12th St., Lewiston, ID 83501; (208) 746-9616).
