Traffic Delays To Occur During Area Turn Bay Work

Motorists will experience some traffic delays as crews begin construction of the Lenore Bridge turn bay on U. S. 12 starting Monday, March 9, according to the Idaho Transportation Department. This project is the first of four turn bay projects to be constructed by Poe Asphalt Paving, Inc., of Clarkston, Wash.

Crews will be constructing turn bays for east and westbound traffic. Motorists wishing to turn off the highway will be able to do so in a safer manner, without disrupting the flow of traffic.

Once the Lenore Bridge turn bay is completed in approximately three weeks, crews will begin work on the other projects in the following order: the Junction of Idaho 3 and Idaho 89 at Kendrick, Ridgeview turn bay east of Moscow on Idaho 8, and the Junction of U. S. 95 and Idaho 8 at Moscow. Each project will take about three weeks to complete.

Traffic will be delayed periodically for up to fifteen minutes during construction. Motorists are urged to use caution as they drive through the work zone.

All work is scheduled to be completed by the end of June.
