Devel. Assoc. Met With KHS Students

Members of the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association and 17 interested students at KHS, enjoyed lunch together Thursday noon at the high school cafeteria and the students later joined with association people for the regular monthly meeting of the group.

Following the reading of the minutes of the February meeting and the presentation of a financial report by Greg Mann, President Wally Butler and Gem Community Coordinator Frank Jacobson told the group of the approval of a \$10,000 matching fund grant from the Dept. of Commerce to this community through the Gem Community Program. Kendrick and Juliaetta will match these funds, either with money or in-kind labor or services, to improve the appearances of the entrances of the two towns and to put up signs designating historical buildings and other points of interest.

It was also announced that on March 30, Jim Henderson of Coeur d'Alene will present a seminar on "Economic Leakage" in the evening. Economic leakage refers to the money that leaves a community that otherwise might be spent within the community. Anyone interested in being part of this seminar may contact Wally Butler for details.

Bob Hasshold, chairman of the Infrastructure Committee, said his committee is in the process of setting a budget which should be finished at the Mar. 17 session.

Barbra Clayton distributed copies of a community calendar her committee has been assembling.

Frank Jacobson reported on Business Expansion and Retention committee work.

Under new business Supt. of Schools Dr. Eldon Taylor talked of the projected enrollment in the Juliaetta and Kendrick Schools. The current enrollment of students is 175 at the elementary school in Juliaetta and 165 at Kendrick High. This is the highest enrollment since the 1983-84 school year, Taylor told the group. Enrollment in Kendrick and Juliaetta jumped upward in the '70s when Dworshak Reservoir was under construction, but then began to decline when the work was completed. Enrollment dropped to a low of 805 in both schools in the 1989-90 school year, but has come up to its present 357 level.

Dr. Taylor also told of the improvements that have been made at both schools, including the installation of the required handicapped access ramp at the elementary school. New windows and installation, plus other improvements have also been made. Dr. Taylor credited much of the school's improvement program to the skill and talents of Roger Syverson, the school maintenance man. He said Syverson's skill as a carpenter has allowed the school to do many of its own projects, such as remodeling, thereby saving literally thousands of taxpayer dollars.

Martha M. Long, 88, Passes March 12

Martha M. Long, one of the most respected and admired citizens of the Kendrick community, died Thursday, March 12, at Lewiston Care Center of causes related to age. She was 88.



Mrs. Long was the widow of Marvin Long, a pioneer Kendrick merchant, and she made her home in the Long residence, a landmark feature of Kendrick that is on the Latah County Historical register. She was born October 9, 1903 to William H. and Mary Ellen Ladd Lowery at Quincy, Wash. The family moved to Pullman in 1914.

She attended school at Quincy and Pullman, graduating from Pullman High School in 1920. She graduated from Washington State College at Pullman in 1924 with a bachelor of arts degree in Home Economics. While attending WSC, she sang in the Glee Club.

She was employed for six years as a teacher at Culesac High School and at Omak (Wash.) High School. She was then the first home extension agent for Chelan County, Wash., for five years, where she also worked with 4-H leaders and home demonstration agents.

She married Marvin Long May 20, 1939, at Kendrick, where the couple made their home.

Mr. Long died June 5, 1980. She continued to live in Kendrick where she took an active part in the everyday life of the town. She was a member of the Kendrick Community United Methodist Church and she was an active busy volunteer worker at the meal site and the Golden Senior Citizens.

She was a 50-year member of Kendrick Grange No. 413, a former Girl Scout leader and a Sunday School teacher.

During the preparation and the celebration of Kendrick's Centennial, Mrs. Long was an active, valuable member of the Centennial Committee, seldom missing a meeting. She was a treasure chest of historical information and knowledge, and her accurate memory and store of knowledge saved her fellow workers many hours of research in the preparation of the book "A Centennial History of the Kendrick/Juliaetta Area."

She enjoyed bird watching, gardening, making rugs, collecting antiques, making dill pickles and reading mysteries. Surviving is a sister, Miss Marion Lowery, of Everett, Wash., who was a frequent visitor of Martha's here in Kendrick.

In addition to her husband, she was preceded in death by three brothers and two sisters.

A memorial service was held Tuesday morning, March 17, at the Kendrick Community United Methodist Church with Rev. Susan Butts officiating. Alberta Turner was organist.

Speakers at the memorial were George F. Brocke, Jr., Ruby Hobson and Alberta Turner.

Cremation has taken place and burial was at Kendrick City Cemetery. Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel was in charge of arrangements.

The family suggests memorials be made, if desired, to the Kendrick-Juliaetta Ambulance Fund or the Kendrick United Methodist Church Memorial Fund.

Julietta Changes Water Sewer Rates

Taking the advice of a citizen's advisory board, the Juliaetta city council has made some changes in water and sewer rates. The changes are designed to cope with the city's water shortage, at least until the new water system is in place and operating satisfactorily.

During the time Juliaetta was attempting to get its block grant of \$400,000 restored by the state, mayor Jeff Lohman asked for the creation of an advisory board composed of Juliaetta residents who would suggest methods of dealing with the water situation. One of the suggestions was increase the rates for the big users of water to discourage excessive use.

Under the new plan set forth in Resolution 253 and which is in effect now, the minimum water rate will remain the same (no increase) for the first 8,000 gallons: \$21.50

After the first 8,000 gallons the price goes up. From 8,000 to 12,000 gallon the cost will now be \$3.00 per 1,000 gallons, an increase of 50c per thousand.

From 12,000 to 300,000 gallons the new rate will be \$5.00 per thousand gallons, an increase of \$2.50.

The rate per additional 1,000 gallons of water over 300,000 gallons will now be \$7.00 per thousand, an increase of \$3.50 per thousand.

Julietta residents will also pay more for the minimum sewer rate. Beginning with the April billing the sewer charge will increase to \$12.30 per month, up from the present fee of \$11.30.

That's just the beginning; in 1993 the rate will go to \$13.30, in 1994 to \$14.30, and in 1995 to \$15.30. There is a bright side. The council may also lower the rates if circumstances appear to justify a lowering.

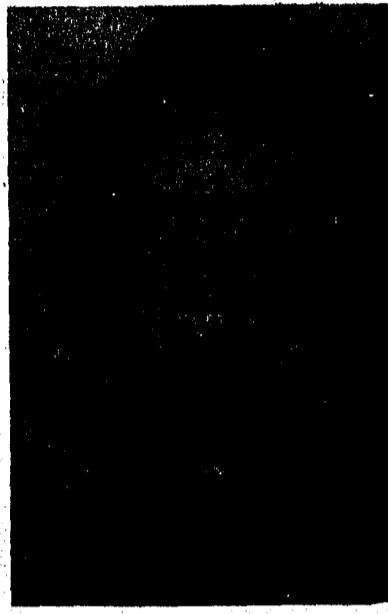
"Mr. KHS" Program Set For Friday, March 27

ORDINANCE NO. 254
AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO CHANGING SEWER SERVICE CHARGES FOR SEWER USERS OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA; PROVIDING THAT FUTURE CHANGES IN RATES MAY BE DONE BY RESOLUTION; AND PROVIDING FOR THE PUBLICATION AND EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO: SECTION 1. That Section 2 of Juliaetta Ordinance No. 219 be, and the same hereby is, amended to read as follows:

SEWER RATES. The following rates are hereby established as the official sewer rates:

The minimum rate for sewer is hereby established and fixed at twelve dollars and thirty cents (\$12.30) per month.

The minimum rate shall increase to:

\$13.30 on March 1, 1993;
\$14.30 on March 1, 1994;
and
\$15.30 on March 1, 1995.

The City Council may from time to time change such rates by Resolution.

SECTION 2. DATE OF EFFECT. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the 1st day of March, 1992.

Passed under suspension of rules upon which the roll call vote was duly taken and enacted an Ordinance of the City of Juliaetta at a regular meeting of the City Council, held on March 11, 1992.
