## Kendrick Working to Qualify for Grant for Emergency Services Bldg.

The City of Kendrick is now in the process of applying for a block grant from the Idaho Dept. of Commerce to help construct an Emergency Services building to house the city fire and ambulance vehicles. This project would cost residents \$100,000. Before this grant can be applied for, the city must show evidence that it meets the financial criteria for this grant.

Gathering this required information will be done by an anonymous survey of the residents of Kendrick. City Clerk Lynne Bruce is mailing this survey to all households within the city limits. Those receiving the survey are asked to fill it out and return it to city hall by mail or in person, or leave it at a box in the local bank. The address is City of Kendrick, Box 195, Kendrick, ID. THIS IS AN ANONYMOUS SURVEY. YOU DO NOT SIGN YOUR NAME. YOU DO NOT IDENTIFY YOURSELF.

The survey is very simple. Circle the number of people living in your house and then circle whether your income is below or above the amount indicated directly below the number of persons you circled.

Without the response of the people in Kendrick the city cannot qualify. A 90 percent response rate is required for the survey to be valid.

The address label on the envelope of your income survey also includes your physical address. This address is for voter registration, UPS deliveries, etc. Do not change your present mailing address.

## Meal Site Observed 16th Anniversary Mar. 11

The month of March has held a spectacular series of entertainment and fun for all with much more to come.

On March 11, the 16th anniversary of the meal site was celebrated with Louise Pea and Viola Johns giving an interesting history of its beginning. It was first organized as a social group for seniors who met in the Fraternal Hall. Next it was moved to the Fire Hall where meals were served beginning in 1976. A large group of seniors attended beginning with 134 and at present time only 39 of those dedicated seniors are living. A contest was held to suggest a name for this group and the winner was Effie Powell with the name "Golden Sunset Seniors."

Looking to the future, the seniors decided they wanted a "home away from home" so in November 1978 a grant was received to purchase the old blacksmith shop located behind the grocery store and drug store. Then their work really began! To raise money they held auction sales, cooked food sales, yard sales, turkey raffles plus donations of all kinds were received plus the hours and hours of volunteer help.

Distinguished guests over the years have been many, including former Governor John Evans and U. S. Senator Frank Church. Ida Olderness entertained beginning in 1978 and is still bringing her group from Spokane to Kendrick for our enjoyment. Another wonderful group are the ladies from the Cameron Lutheran Church who take the time each year to entertain us royally with delicious food and programs of music, songs and history.

A few of the hard working volunteers who did so much for so long was Martha Wilken, who served as financial registrar for 15 years, Effie Powell who just loved to wash dishes, but lost her job when the dishwasher was installed. Mabel Glenn has worn many hats—from being Mrs. Santa for 16 years to celebrating St. Patrick's Day with a green hat and accessories!

And, who could forget our own Ruth A. Whites, who with her late husband, Bill, gave so much work and devotion to the senior citizens of this community. Ruth is now at a retirement home in Lewiston, but we know her heart is with us. And, ours is with her!

A group picture was taken of those seniors attending this year's celebration who also were the first meal or attended the first year. They were: Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Wolff, Mr. and Mrs. Jim Bower, Mr. and Mrs. Art Foster, Lyle and Louise Pea (Louise has done the cooking since the beginning), Anna Fairfield, Martha Wilken and Effie Powell.

Once again, to keep everything in perspective, perhaps it would be well to explain the difference between Golden Sunset Seniors and the meal site. The senior center building belongs to the Golden Sunset Seniors, therefore all maintenance expenses such as water, garbage, electricity, insurance, janitorial services, equipment and repairs are their responsibility. The center is rented to the meal site two days each week to serve and supply nutritious meals to seniors for a minimal fee.

As you will note, many changes have been made over the years, and with the loss of so many of the original members it has become increasingly difficult to maintain and furnish meals twice each week. We must not, after so many years of dedication, lose our meal site operation. In order to maintain our budget we must have attendance to meet all of our obligations. We are asking the churches for their prayers and thoughts as well as all seniors in our community.

To assist our financial situation the meal site council will be holding a plant sale, houseplants as well as outdoor plants of all kinds on April 10 at the Senior Center. ## Senior Tax Exemption Sign Up April 1

It is time to sign up for the Circuit Breaker, Senior Citizen Tax Exemption. Deadline is April 1.

If your income does not exceed \$15,920, and you are a widow or widower, 65 years old or older, disabled or a disabled veteran, you may qualify for the exemption. This exemption must be applied for every year.

You will want to bring with you the following: A copy of your Federal Income Tax form 1040, if you filed one. Your Social Security Benefit Statement form SSA-1089 stating the amount you received from Social Security. All medical expenses including prescriptions and medical insurance premiums. Any medical expenses you paid for and were not reimbursed by Medicare or insurance.

There will be a representative from the Latah County Assessor's office at the Kendrick Senior Citizen Center Wednesday, April 1 from 10:00 to 12 noon and at the Juliaetta City Hall that same day from 2 to 4 in the afternoon.

The Assessor's office says to please come to their office in Moscow in the courthouse if you cannot make either of these times.

**ORDINANCE NO. 254**  
AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO CHANGING SEWER SERVICE CHARGES FOR SEWER USERS OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA; PROVIDING THAT FUTURE CHANGES IN RATES MAY BE DONE BY RESOLUTION; AND PROVIDING FOR THE PUBLICATION AND EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE.

\$15.30 on March 1, 1995.

The City Council may from time to time change such rates by Resolution.

SECTION 2. DATE OF EFFECT. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the 1st day of March, 1992.

**ORDINANCE NO. 254**  
AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO CHANGING SEWER SERVICE CHARGES FOR SEWER USERS OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA; PROVIDING THAT FUTURE CHANGES IN RATES MAY BE DONE BY RESOLUTION; AND PROVIDING FOR THE PUBLICATION AND EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO: SECTION 1. That Section 2 of Juliaetta Ordinance No. 219 be, and the same hereby is, amended to read as follows:

**SEWER RATES.** The following rates are hereby established as the official sewer rates:

The minimum rate for sewer is hereby established and fixed at twelve dollars and thirty cents (\$12.30) per month.

The minimum rate shall increase to:

**\$13.30 on March 1, 1993;**  
**\$14.30 on March 1, 1994;**  
**and**  
**\$15.30 on March 1, 1995.**

The City Council may from time to time change such rates by Resolution.

**SECTION 2. DATE OF EFFECT.** This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the 1st day of March, 1992.

Passed under suspension of rules upon which the roll call vote was duly taken and enacted an Ordinance of the City of Juliaetta at a regular meeting of the City Council, held on March 11, 1992.
