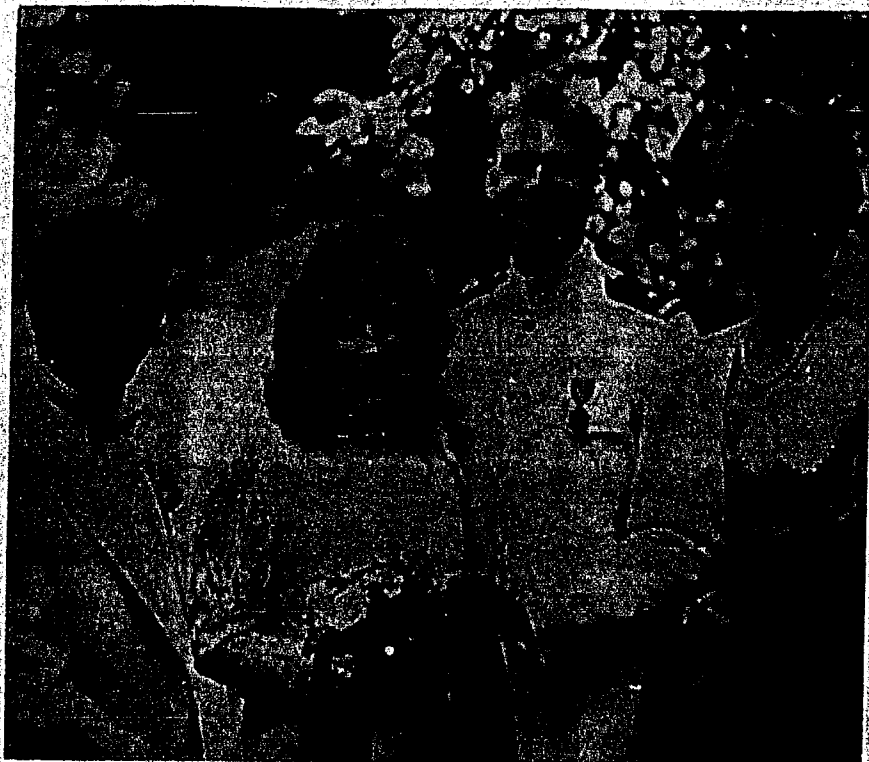

Lester J. Nelson, 87, Retired Bear Ridge Farmer, Claimed by Heart Attack

Lester James Nelson, a lifetime Kendrick area farmer, died Wednesday, March 25, at Gritman Medical Center in Moscow of a heart attack. He was 87.

Nelson was born Feb. 19, 1905, on Big Bear Ridge near Kendrick, the son of James and Selma Anderson Nelson.

He graduated from high school at Clarkston and attended the University of Idaho, graduating from the agricultural sciences program. He farmed the family land on Big Bear Ridge until his retirement.

He married Pearl Underdahl on Dec. 31, 1941, at Moscow. The couple celebrated this 50th wedding anniversary last year.

Nelson was a member of the Deary Lutheran Church and served on the church board. He was a past master of Kendrick Lodge No. 26, AF&AM. He was a member of Canyon Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star and a member of the Deary Grange. He enjoyed fishing, camping, reading and politics.

He is survived by his wife, Pearl, at Moscow, and a sister, Betty Nelson of Oakland, Calif.

He was preceded in death by two brothers, Alfred and Chester Nelson and two sisters, Stella Nelson and Effie Lewis.

A graveside service was held at Moscow Cemetery Saturday with the Rev. Bryon Hansen of the Deary Lutheran Church officiating. The family suggests memorials may be made to the church.

For a Stronger Community—

Keeping Dollars at Home Involves Many Factors, and Some Changes, Residents Told

Reducing "economic leakage" and building a healthier local retail base involves a number of factors, thirteen local business people were told Monday evening at a workshop conducted by James Hunter of the Idaho Small Business Development Center at Hayden. Hunter's workshop was arranged by the Small Business Development Center at Lewis-Clark State College.

Economic retail leakage is defined as the amount of dollars difference between potential retail and actual retail sales in a given economy. In plain words it's what happens when people go out of town to shop.

It's a cold, hard fact of business life that money is going to be spent out of town. There are many reasons for this. Some of this shopping out of town is simply unavoidable, but some of it can be reduced, Hunter told the group, by using better marketing techniques, understanding what potential customers want and changing the attitudes of the merchants.

"We don't live in a product environment, we live in a marketing environment, or the prescription thereof," Hunter said, meaning that customers are influenced as much by marketing techniques as by the

desire for a certain item.

Idaho has one of the lowest per capita incomes in the United States, and the lowest gross per capita incomes in the Pacific Northwest, so Idaho small town merchants are not dealing with a wealthy customer base, which further complicates the business picture.

Hunter presented some unsettling statistics to his audience, such as:

- Why customers quit trading at a certain store. The answer was disturbing—
- 1% Die
- 3% Move away
- 5% Other reasons
- 9% Competitive reasons
- 14% Product dissatisfaction
- 68% Indifferent attitude of sales person.

With this 68% reason for customers' changing businesses, Hunter challenged local retail merchants to become "customer service friendly" in dealing with all their patrons.

Although he understood the problems of small town merchants (he was one of them once) Hunter wanted little sympathy, but offered more comments and challenges.

"Have you ever been angry when the city, the school, or some other government agencies went out of town to buy something?" he asked.

"Well, maybe these people don't know what you have," he said. He added that knowing your customer and what he wants is vitally important.

The Hayden man had five points to make on what a community can do to improve employment and income:

1. Improve efficiency of existing firms.
 2. Improve ability to capture dollars.
 3. Attract new basic employers.
 4. Increase aid received from broader governments.
- For achieving this goal, Hunter had these suggestions:
1. Identify potential retail outlets.
 2. Improve share of retail market capture through downtown analysis and renewal.
 3. Aid employees in development better attitudes.
 4. Expand purchases by non-local people (tourists, and neighboring towns).
 5. Encourage local citizens and businesses to buy locally through information and advertising.
 6. Collective action through formation of organizations such as chambers of commerce.

The coming of the new Wal Mart store in Moscow did not go unnoticed by Hunter. Wal Mart Stores, the largest retail complex in the world, is planning on opening a store in Moscow within a year. Every retail merchant in the area worries about the effects of this giant on local businesses. He said that surveys conducted across the nation show that businesses within a 24-mile radius of a Wal Mart store are impacted by a minus 24% when one of these stores come into the area.

Dealing with Wal Mart competition is not easy local merchants and retailers were told. Some moves to lessen the impact could be: 1. offer better service, 2. Find out what they are selling and don't try to compete, and 3. focus your advertising on your specific market.

Hunter agreed that the future of retailing in a small town is not a bright picture, but he said the small stores can survive if they change with the times and cater to their best potential customers.

Develop. Assoc. Met With Meal Site Seniors

Seven members of the Kendrick-Julietta Community Development Assoc. met last Friday noon with patrons of the Kendrick meal site.

Bob Hassoldt, filling in for absent president Wally Butler briefed the other association members and the seniors on the progress of some of the projects currently underway.

Hassoldt, reporting on the work of the Infrastructure committee, said there is need for an Arts committee to plan for cultural events in the communities of Juliaetta and Kendrick.

Donna Heinen, chairman of the Business Expansion and Retention committee reported that plans are still being made to establish a "Welcome Wagon" for Juliaetta and Kendrick and asked that anyone with suggestions should contact her.

Mrs. Heinen also said her committee will be working as much as possible with the River Crossing, Inc., organization to establish the golf course. At present the golf group is working to get a driving range in operation at the site of the proposed course.

Frank Jacobson, chairman of the Economic Diversification committee reported that when Kendrick and Juliaetta received its \$10,000 matching fund grant from the Dept. of Commerce for Gem Community work, this was the final funds that were available until the state of Idaho re-finances the program.

City Urges Return of Survey Questionnaires

City Clerk Lynne Bruce this week asked that all residents of the city who receive the economic survey questionnaires, to please return the completed sheets as soon as possible. The survey results are vitally important in the application to obtain grant money from the state.

The completed survey sheets may be mailed to city hall, given to Mrs. Bruce, or left at the bank.

The city must have a 90 percent response to the survey in order to have it validated.

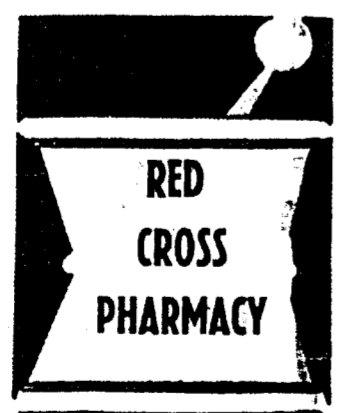
