## Norman L. Fry, 65, Southwick Native, Passes April 5 in Missoula

Norman L. Fry, 65, died Sunday, April 5, at Community Medical Center in Missoula, Mont. He had been a patient there since suffering a heart attack late last month.

He was born March 27, 1927, at Southwick to Clarence and Francis Vaughan Fry. He attended school in Kendrick and served in the U. S. Navy after finishing school. He returned to Idaho where he married Louella Forest, June 9, 1950. They had two children. They later divorced. He then moved to Montana and on July 2, 1964, he married Jane Vannoy Tackitt.

Norm spent most of his life as a logger. Friends, co-workers and acquaintances came to respect him for his vast knowledge and ability when it came to logging. There wasn't a person he didn't like or didn't like him.

He loved the outdoors and spent much of his free time hunting and fishing. He was very devoted to his grandchildren.

He is survived by his wife at 9555 1/2 Inspiration Dr., Missoula, Mont., a son Dale Fry of Imperial Valley, Calif., a daughter, Nori Fry Pierson, Smyrna, Tenn. Also three stepsons, Mahlon, Merle and Jerry Tackitt, all of Missoula; a step daughter, Mavis Caffery of Polson, Mont.; three sisters, Lois Johnston, Lenore; Jean Wegner, Cameron, and Nellie Millard of Lewiston, and two brothers, Robert Fry of Emmett, and Don Fry of Juliaetta.

He is also survived by 15 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.

There will be a potluck memorial gathering for family and friends on Thursday, April 9 from 6 p. m. to 9 p. m. in the Lolo Community Hall, Lolo, Mont.

Memorials may be made to the family of Norman Fry. Garden City Funeral home and Chapel is in charge of arrangements and cremation.

## Golden Sunset Seniors To Consider Changes in By-laws, Elect Officers

At their annual meeting in May, the membership of Golden Sunset Senior Citizens, Inc. will be voting on whether to adopt a new set of by-laws for their organization. They will also be electing a president, vice-president, and secretary-treasurer to one year terms and one board member to a three year term.

Owners of the Senior Center in Kendrick, the organization makes its facilities available to the meal site program, which is operated under the direction of a separate council. The proposed new by-laws are meant to clarify the distinction between the Center's overall purpose and management and the operation of the meal site. In recent years people have tended to think of the two as operating under a single management. While they do cooperate, they are separate entities.

To help members prepare to vote in May on the proposed changes, the next luncheon meeting of the Golden Sunset Seniors on Monday, April 13, will include a reading and discussion of the proposed new by-laws as contrasted with the existing set. Members will also have a chance to raise questions. Copies of the proposed by-laws will then be made available for study in the Center during the weeks preceding the annual meeting in May. A simple majority will be required to put the new by-laws into operation.

As for the election of officers, any member of the Golden Sunset Senior Citizens may be nominated from the floor at the annual meeting to serve as an officer. There being no nominating committee, all candidates for office must be nominated at the time of the meeting. Election to office shall be determined by majority vote of those present and voting. Members should be thinking of potential candidates and are encouraged to contact them in advance as to whether they would be willing to serve.

Remember, that's Monday, April 13, a day to hear about and consider some proposed changes. Mark your calendar now.
