Grange Challenged To Analyze Shopping Habits

Representing the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association at the last meeting of Kendrick Grange on April 7, Frank Jacobson gave members an abbreviated but telling version of the recent economic development workshop held here. 'Keeping the Dollars at Home.'

The workshop, presented by James Hunter of the Small Business Development Center at Hayden Lake, was meant to help local business people understand some of the reasons why local residents do some or even all of their shopping away from home. Jacobson's presentation, while underscoring the importance of the consumer's understanding these reasons, went further to encourage the consumer to evaluate the part he plays in the economic decline of small town businesses and what the ultimate consequence of that decline might be.

Small town retailers and consumers alike are often frustrated with each other, some times to the point of hostility. From Hunter's point of view, the retailer's number one problem (and frequently a source of irritation for customers) is lack of knowledge. The merchant, according to survey after survey, lacks knowledge of the consumer—his needs, his attitudes, and his buying habits. He lacks product knowledge of the very merchandise he has on his shelves. He lacks knowledge of and appreciation for his immediate competitor and the larger markets which are attracting his customers elsewhere. And he lacks knowledge of things in the world of commerce as influenced by international events.

Through trade analysis and trade area surveys—such as the one soon to be conducted by a group of Kendrick High School students—the retailers can learn that people go elsewhere to shop for a variety of reasons: quality, selection, price, and service, for example. The merchant needs to develop knowledge of what consumers are looking for, and he needs to realize that a consumer's perceptions, though they may be based on faulty assumptions, are real for him. Perceptions that you can get things better and cheaper somewhere else are "at the wheel" in that car going right through Kendrick-Juliaetta to a shopping district in another city or state.

Merchants need also to know what they're selling that others don't have; and at the same time, according to tough-minded economic advisors, they need to close down those departments that cannot compete with a Wal-Mart's. Tough advice sometimes to follow.

Other reasons small town retailers are losing business relate to whether or not they and their clerks are visitor-friendly and whether they show appreciation for the customers they do have. Hunter repeatedly stressed the importance of the businessman's being positive in his thinking, in his relationships, and in his business decisions. Positive, deliberate, and consistent.

Strange as it may seem, contrary to what one might well expect, surveys often find small town retailers rated low in the area of service, traditionally one of their strengths. Hunter urges them to develop superior service, to treat their most reliable customers special, and to develop intentional policies regarding such things as pricing (lower prices on things people buy regularly, for example), store hours, special order capabilities, and credit policy. "You cannot afford to be a bank," snaps Hunter.

When Wal-Mart's opens in Moscow, estimates are that nearby small town merchants will lose 20% of their business. Stores dealing in so-called "shopping goods," clothing, home furnishings, appliances, etc., will be the most affected. Specialty shops, those dealing in such things as homespun crafts, for example, will feel less of a pinch. Convenience stores, such as grocery stores, will be the least hurt. A caution is called for, however: A Wal-Mart's will not only capture local trade for itself, it will also result in trade capture for specialty shops and convenience stores located near it. Moscow, over all, will be the winner.

As for what the consumer can do, Jacobson urged Grangers to analyze their own shopping habits, to ask themselves why they are shopping elsewhere and whether in the long run it is in their own best interest to do so. Local consumers might discover that their perceptions are unfounded and that the real bargain long term is to keep those dollars at home!

In the final analysis, Jacobson concluded, we need somehow to return to those days when the business community of Kendrick and Juliaetta was the very center of community life, where friends and neighbors and merchants all met in a social setting characterized by mutual support rather than narrow self-interest. It is just possible that it will not be tourists and retirees who will destroy this aspect of the qual-

Several other EMTs will have been with the unit for 10 to 15 years. These people, too, will one day retire and the units needs to have their "shoes" filled with some new dedicated volunteers. Being an EMT is not a glamorous job. It means being awakened in the middle of the night; it means leaving your family when you've just sit down to your first meal together in two weeks; it means having to stay home from the lake on the 4th of July weekend because you're on call; it means going to the scene of the accident and trying your best to help only to hear later that some bystander thought they could have done it better. It means watching loved ones grow older or be debilitated by a disease that someday you'll be called to their home and there won't be anything you can do to help.

But, it also means knowing in your heart that you are trying to gain knowledge that will someday help or maybe even be a part of helping to sustain a life. It means that you are spoke in that wheel of health care in a small community that helps make this such a great place to live and raise our families.

If you would like to make this commitment of 100 hours of classroom and emergency department training and keeping your skills intact by attending training meetings twice a month, please contact an EMT. The local unit hopes to have at least 15 people willing to join "our team" so a community class can be offered in the fall.

Kendrick School to Host PAYADA Session

Latah County Parents and Youth Against Drug Abuse (PAYADA) will present a four-night substance abuse prevention/education session at Kendrick High School on April 27 and 28 and May 4 and 5.

The sessions are each two hours long, from 7:00 to 9:00 pm. The first two nights include a video about driving under the influence of alcohol, a slide show about most of the substances abused in this area, and a deputy from Latah County Sheriff's office presenting information about drugs of abuse.

The third session is presented by a recovering drug addict and/or a parent of a teen addict, along with a local counselor who addresses family issues surrounding addiction, alcoholism, intervention, and recovery.

The fourth night is presented by a qualified counselor and communication specialist concerning communication skills in the family, especially focusing on drug and alcohol issues.

"Children make their decisions about over using drugs when they are only about nine or ten years old," says Jim Robinson, coordinator of PAYADA. "Within a year or two after that, they begin to experiment."

These sessions are open to all adults and to children who are at least in fifth grade. PAYADA recommends that you attend with your children in order to facilitate discussion and openness about drugs. Display cases will be present to show children and adults what many of the drugs and paraphernalia look like. There is no charge for PAYADA sessions, and a parent's manual is optional for a \$5 donation.

Latah County PAYADA has been a non-profit corporation in the Moscow area for two years, and is affiliated with the Latah Sheriff's office and the Moscow Police Department.

Additional information is available from Jim Robinson, coordinator of the organization, at 882-7830. Robinson asks that parents of students in grades five and older pre-register with the forms sent home from school and from the sheriff's office.

**Perot Petitions
Available in Kendrick**

Petitions for the nomination of
H. Ross Perot for president and
James Stockdale for vice president
are now available in Kendrick from
Donna Goff. It was announced this
week.

Perot is the Texas businessman
who is considering running for the
presidency as a third-party candi-
date in the November election. The
vice-president nominee is a retired
Navy admiral. Idaho law requires
that nominees for president also
have a vice-presidential candidate.

Perot has stated that he will not
be a candidate unless his name is
on the ballot in all 50 states.

Persons soliciting for petition sig-
natures must be qualified voters in
the state of Idaho and those who
sign the petition must also be quali-

fied voters. Signers of the petition
must also be legal residents of the
county in which they sign the peti-
tion. Mrs. Goff said signing the peti-
tion does not necessary obligate the
signer to vote for Perot. All the
petition is requesting is that his
name be placed on the nominating
ballot. Petitions must be presented
to the state prior to Aug. 15.

Anyone wishing to have a petition
or canvass for signatures may con-

inconvenient to obtain a petition,
call Goff at 289-4422 or contact her
at her home 112 North 9th, south of
the VFW Hall on the corner.
