Alvin E. Steigers, 86, Retired Gifford Farmer, Passes April 19

Alvin E. Steigers, a retired Gifford area farmer who was well-known and respected in this community, died Sunday, April 19 of causes related to age at St. Joseph Regional Medical Center in Lewiston. He was 86.

He had farmed and ranched in the Rosetta area near Gifford since 1941.

The son of William and Elizabeth Schieder Steigers, he was born Nov. 3, 1905, at Rhineland, Mo., where he lived the first five years of his life.

In 1910, the family moved to Kansas and remained there for three years before coming to Burley, Idaho. They remained at Burley for five years and moved to Asotin for a year before settling at Cherrylane, Idaho.

He attended Stony Point School at Cherrylane and married Mabel Heimgartner Nov. 7, 1928 at Lewiston.

They made their home at Cherrylane until moving to Pottlatch Ridge, in 1935. They moved to their home in the Rosetta area in 1941.

He was a member of the Clearwater Power Co. board of directors for 15 years and also was a member of the Wheat Growers Assoc., the Predator Control Board, the Cattlemen's Association and the Lapwai Valley Grange and served on the school board in Rosetta and Gifford.

Survivors include his wife at the family home; three sons, Carl Steigers of Des Moines, Wash., and Ralph Steigers and Leroy Steigers both of Culesac, eight grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren.

Four brothers died previously.

The funeral will be conducted at 11:00 a. m. Thursday at Malcom's Brower-Wann Chapel in Lewiston. Burial will follow at Lewis-Clark Memorial Gardens.

She was a member of the Yakima Moose Lodge and she enjoyed fancy work, gardening and reading. She also was a foster mother for several years and enjoying helping people, especially cleaning homes for the elderly.

Survivors include her husband at the family home in Deary; a son, Bob Crocker of Portland, Oregon; two daughters, Judith Robinson of Danville, Calif., and Teresa Littleton of Wasilla, Alaska; a brother Phillip Daugherty of Seattle, 10 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

The funeral was conducted Friday at Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel. Burial followed at Pinecrest Cemetery at Deary.



As provided by Idaho Code Section 33-502A, no write-in vote shall be counted unless a declaration of intent has been filed with the District Clerk indicating that the person desires the office and is legally qualified to assume the duties of school trustee, if elected. The declaration of intent shall be filed not later than five (5) days before the day of the election.

Polling place for Trustee Zone No. 1 shall be at the Juliaetta Elementary School, Juliaetta, Idaho.

Polling place for Trustee Zone No. 4 shall be the Kendrick Jr.Sr. High School, Kendrick, Idaho.

Said election shall be by secret and separate ballot.

Absentee voting shall be permitted as provided by Idaho Code, Section 33-406, as amended. Any qualified trustee zone elector who expects to be absent from the District on the day of the election or who will be unable, because of physical disability or blindness, to go to the polling place may make written application to the Clerk of the District for a ballot of the kind to be voted on at election, which application shall contain the name of the elector and the elector's present address.

As provided by Idaho Code, Section 33-406, as amended, application for an absentee elector's ballot shall be filed with the clerk not later than one (1) hour prior to the opening of the polls. The absentee ballot must be received by the clerk, not later than 8:00 P. M. on the day of the election, before such ballot may be counted.
