Supt. Answers Questions About May 19 Election

As we get closer to Tuesday, May 19 school election day, there are 2 school issues that face some school zones and one that affects all school zones.

In Zones 1 (Juliaetta and rural areas south) and Zone 4 (Upper American Ridge, Little Bear Ridge, Bear Ridge, Texas Ridge, Cedar Ridge, Gold Hill and Three Bear area (in Latah County) a trustee election will be held with incumbents Gary Browning and Doug Harris running in each zone respectively. In all zones a 1-year supplemental maintenance and operation 'override levy' will be held. The one-year supplemental levy will restore the amount levied during the 1987-88 school year to \$95,000.

Because of this up-coming election, Superintendent Eldon Taylor has compiled some questions and answers that better explain the issues.

Question: Why is the district just running a "one-year" override versus a "two-year" override as they have in the past few years?

Answer: Our main school budget, known as our maintenance and operation budget is 80% funded by the state and 20% funded by the local property tax. Locally we have been blessed by taxpayers who have been supportive and given us stability both in Supplemental M&O override levies and our small 10 year plant facility levy. Over the past 5 years the voters have supported our maintenance and operation overrides in the amounts of: \$95,000—1-year M&O Sup. (1987-88); \$75,000—\$85,000 2-year M&O Sup. (1988-1990); \$84,000—\$83,000 2-year M&O Sup. (1990-1992). Because of the erratic funding by the legislature over the past 2 years and because of circumstances out of the state department of education, it is not financially stable enough on the state level to project 2 years into the future.

Question: Will restoring the \$95,000 amount levied during the 1987-88 school year raise our taxes.

Answer: Yes, approximately 57c/\$1000 of assessed market value. Because our assessed market value within Kendrick School District No. 283 has gone up by almost \$4 million, the impact on next year's individual piece of property is not quite as great as it was back in 1987-88.

Because the total district's market value was less in 1987-88, it took approximately 71c/\$1000 to generate the same dollar then as it does 57c/\$1000 today. At least that is a small positive figure in the eyes of the taxpayer.

Kendrick School District No. 283 has tried to keep their override levies to a bare minimum. To give a comparison of our supplement overrides with neighboring districts last year (1991-1992):

A 57c increase to restore the \$95,000 override to its 1987-88 level will increase it to \$1.76/\$1000, still making Kendrick's the lowest in the area. The tax rate in 1987-88 was \$1.80/\$1000 to generate the \$95,000.

Juliaetta Library Staff Receives Grange Citizen Of the Year Award

Citing the American free public library system as one American institution that has kept up with changing times, Grange Master Frank Jacobson last week praised the service "beyond the call of duty" provided by the staff of the Juliaetta Community Library.

"These ladies," he said in remarks following the April 21 supper honoring them, "do not conform to the traditional American scheme of success that sees one always upward-bound towards a fancier title and a bigger salary." No, these ladies, whose part-time jobs call for full-time devotion, are satisfied to stay in the community they love, working with people they come to know so well, and having time to pursue their family interests as well.

Representing the staff were Jan Welles, the branch manager, and the two assistants, veteran Cynthia Nye and Robin Sandino. Cynthia was accompanied by her daughter Laura and by her mother-in-law, Esther Nye. Robin's husband, Jim, was also on hand. Melanie Bacon, former branch manager, was there with her daughters, Nikki and Katie.

Comparing the public library's ability to keep up with technological change, Jacobson remarked that the the Grange as an American institution could at times be compared to the old-fashioned card catalog, a piece of library furniture seldom seen any more.

The awarding of the Citizen of the Year Certificate and marble paper weight is a traditional Grange week activity for Kendrick Grange. According to National Grange Lecturer Mary Buffinton, only about 11% of the Granges across the country avail themselves of the opportunity to recognize community service in this way.

Betty Stone, who as Lecturer was responsible for the program, pleaded for further financial and other support for every public library whose contribution to young lives is so very important.

Kendrick Grange is proud to continue its efforts this year to encourage and support community development in the Kendrick-Juliaetta area and finds the Juliaetta Public Library to be a vital part in what makes the quality of life so special in the Potlatch River Valley.

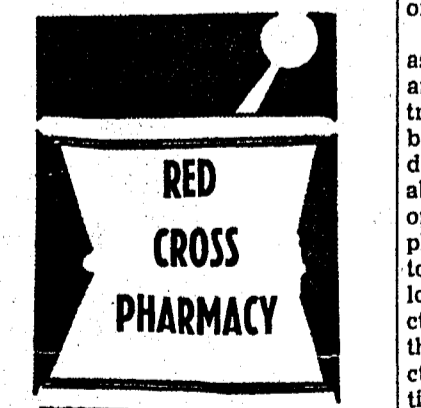
