Juliaetta Centennial a Great Success

The team and wagon were one of seventy-four entries in the Centennial parade which was regarded by almost all who saw it as one of the best community parades ever seen in this area.

It was estimated that over 2,000 people came to Juliaetta Saturday to join in a full day and entertainment.

Juliaetta celebrated the centennial of its incorporation as an Idaho city and couldn't have planned a more perfect day. The weather, sunny and warm, with a little breeze, was just right for visiting old friends, taking in the sights, telling old stories, enjoying the day's events, and just "coming home again"! It was estimated that over 2,000 people attended the day's celebration. The committee members and volunteer workers started the day at 7 a. m. and people were waiting at the doors to get inside the Castle Museum and Centennial Center.

Town's people and visitors who came early and stayed late, never lacked for something to do, even if it was only to sit and watch for someone they knew. The day was a remarkable tribute to the fourteen months of planning and preparation by as dedicated a committee and group of volunteer workers as will ever be assembled. It is well within the mark to say that Juliaetta's Centennial will be the standard by which community events are judged for years to come.

Elementary School Program Began the Celebration

Saturday was the official Centennial Day, but a program at Juliaetta Elementary School Thursday set the tone and spirit of the day as dozens of cute students (from Kindergarten through the sixth grade), charmed an over-flow audience in the new school gym with a program tracing Juliaetta's history in original songs and skits. Adding meaning and authenticity to the program were adults Marilyn Eichner and her son Tim, and Mike Hedler. Marilyn is the granddaughter of Mathias Schupfer, one of the founders of Juliaetta. Mikey is the grandson of Florian Schupfer, Mathias' brother who with another brother, was also instrumental in founding the town. Juliaetta was founded as Schupferville and the name was later changed. Seated with Marilyn, Tim and Mike were Tim's children. Historical slides and pictures added to the program. The faculty and staff of the school and the students as well as Mrs. Eichner, Tim and Mr. Hedler are to be commended for giving the community a truly entertaining and informative evening.

Beautiful Day for Centennial

Starting the day was a 3-on-3 basketball tournament on the grade school blacktop. Eight teams participated in this event. The winning team was Ed Pea, Ron Ireland and Dirk Hammond, who also donated their winning prize money to the KHS football program. Corey Meyer, Josh Hudson and Ed Pea organized and supervised the tournament. Doug Sillfow and Dave Jones refereed.

A Very Fine Parade

Parade announcer Wayne Harris, doing his usual fine job, was hard-pressed to sometimes to find words to describe what was certainly one of the best parades ever seen in the valley. Harris kept the crowd amused and informed as 74 entries paraded by the judges and the happy audience. Entries ranged from the impressive mule pack team of the Forest Service, the authentic entry of the Galloway clan to the hil-

arious "Centennial Drill Team" (It was Paul Hutcheson complete with a brace and bit). The parade took almost an hour to pass in review.

Following the parade the crowd dissolved into smaller groups who seemed content to just visit or wandered the streets looking at the sights and sounds. Numerous food, craft booths opened and were doing a brisk business also immediately. Parade trophies were presented to the winners at the Centennial Center. Two beautifully decorated cakes were served at the Center. One of cakes was decorated with a likeness of the Castle Museum and the other depicted the Centennial coin.

Centennial baby prizes were presented to Zane Wade Ritchie who was born April 29, 1992. His proud parents are Cindy Hatley and Wade Ritchie of Juliaetta.

All of the activity was not centered around Main Street. Many people found their way up to Castle Museum to not only view the hundreds of historical exhibits and items but to sample home-made bread and beans which had been cooked on an old fashioned wood cook stove. Donna Cope, (she and husband Onal own the Castle), reported that she served 20 loaves of bread and 14 quarts of beans. The Castle was full of visitors all day long and some were still visiting at nearly 7 that evening.

Another popular attraction was the wagon rides which started at the Castle and toured through the town. Tom Umbarger and his team were kept busy all day.

A horseshoe pitching tournament was also held at the Castle. Harry Burmeister reported that about 12

people participated in the pitching tournament. Harry was quick to point out that a lot of shoes were pitched but none with the horses in them. This was a double elimination tournament.

Both local ladies and gentlemen were a part of the show and all were well-received, but it was Ruby Craig and Esther Shreffler who stole the show and won the hearts of the audience as they modeled their own wedding dresses and proved that even with the passage of a few years, brides never lose their beauty when they are loved and appreciated. Mrs. Craig was escorted by her grandson Tim Lockett, who was wearing the suit originally worn by his grandfather, Roy Craig, the day he wed Ruby. This will most certainly be a very special moment in time for the Craig family, also for the Shreffler family as they watched their mother and grandmother, still lovely as the first day she wore her dress. Miss Anna Klatt capably handled the commentary.

Leonard A. Wolff Passes April 29

Leonard A. Wolff, 88, a retired Leland area farmer, died at his home Wednesday, April 29, of congestive heart failure.

Wolff had lived in the Leland area since he was 10 years old and had been involved in farming and related activities since his youth.

He was born June 27, 1903, at Wisner, Nebraska, the youngest of eight children of Herman and Mary Schneider Wolff. The family moved to Pottlatch Ridge near Kendrick in 1914, and he went to school at Leland and Kendrick.

He married Coryell Wilson Feb. 2, 1927, at Lewiston.

Wolff began farming at a young age and even after retiring in 1969 remained active in the farm the rest of his life.

He was a member of the Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran Church, the Golden Sunset Senior Citizens at Kendrick, Kendrick Grange No. 413, and the Nez Perce County Wheat Growers Association. He was the leader of the first 4-H livestock club on Pottlatch Ridge.

Survivors include his widow at the family home; a son, Walter Wolff at Leland; four grandchildren and four great-grandchildren. He was preceded in death by two sons, Leon A. Wolff and Howard A. Wolff, and by his seven brothers and sisters.

The funeral was conducted Saturday, May 2, at Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran Church with Rev. Bob Kenyon officiating. Burial followed at the Leland Cemetery.

Malcom's Brower-Wann Chapel was in charge of arrangements.

Ben P. Cook, 86, Retired Educator, Passes April 30

Ben P. Cook of Kendrick, a retired teacher and school administrator, died Thursday, April 30, at St. Joseph Regional Medical Center of heart failure. He was 86.



Cook was an educator for 40 years and was also active in District II of the Idaho High School Athletic Association.

He was born Jan. 27, 1906, at Cape Girardeau, Mo., to William and Sarah Enfield Cook. He lived with his family at Okanogan, Wash., and British Columbia, Canada, before they moved to Culldesac in 1917.

He graduated from Culldesac High School in 1926, from Lewis-Clark Normal School at Lewiston (now Lewis-Clark State College) in 1928 and from the University of Idaho at Moscow in 1943.

He married Miriam Blewett Nov. 12, 1957, at Asotin.

The couple lived at Lewiston until 1928, when they moved to Southwick where he was a teacher and coach.

In 1934, they moved to Geneseo, where he was a teacher, coach and principal.

In 1943, he took the position of school superintendent at Craigmont. Then in 1947, Cook and his family moved to Kendrick where he taught high school for 12 years and was also principal.

In 1960, he took a job for one year teaching at Halley, Idaho, but returned to Kendrick in 1961 and continued to teach there until his retirement in 1970.

He enjoyed operating Ham radios, fishing, carpentry and gardening. He was a member of the Kendrick Camper Klub.

He was awarded the Meritorious Service Award by the Idaho High School Athletic Association, and served as president of District 11 for four years. He was also a member of the District Board of Control and worked with District II basketball tournaments for 15 years.

Survivors include his wife at the family home at Kendrick, two sons, Gordon B. Cook of Port Angeles, Wash., and Ben B. Cook of Ontario, Ore.; two daughters, Donna Goff and Gwen Deobald, both of Kendrick; a half-sister, Velda Harris in Oregon; 16 grandchildren; 17 great-grandchildren; and two step-great-grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by three brothers, two half-brothers and two half-sisters.

Funeral services were conducted Monday at Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel in Lewiston with the Rev. Pat Blewett, a nephew of the deceased, from Cole Community Church at Boise, officiating.

Organist was Marie L. Jones and soloist was Jana Blewett who sang "Amazing Grace" and "He Leadeth Me".

Casket bearers were John L. Deobald, Lyle Deobald, Lee Deobald, Bruce Cook, Seth Cook, Jeff Cook, Steven Goff, Richard Goff and Scott Goff.

Burial was at Lewis-Clark Memorial Gardens in Lewiston.
