## "Pride In America" Is Theme for Locust Festival Parade

Plans are underway for the 32nd annual Locust Blossom Festival parade to be held May 30 at the traditional time of 10 a. m. sharp.

"Pride In America" is this year's parade theme. Trophies will be awarded in the following categories:

1. Overall Grand Prize (best of the parade).
2. Most Patriotic
3. Best Historical
4. Best Family Entry
5. Best Royalty
6. Humorous
7. Marching Groups
8. Automobile: Individual and Groups
9. Horses: Individual, Groups and horse drawn
10. Children's Parade (Various categories).

A new location has been selected for the main parade staging. The back street area between the small park and the Gene Brocke residence up to City Hall will be blocked off and reserved for parade entries. The children's parade will once again form between the Kendrick Garage (Deobald's) and Joyce Clemenhagen residence. The parade entry table will be placed near city hall. The new location will provide a safer location and will enable Main Street traffic flow to be uninterrupted until the parade begins.

Automobile entries will once again assemble at the high school. Dave Neal and Bill Blewett are in charge of this category.

Horses and horse drawn entries will assemble in the "Fosterville" area as has been traditional. Gerald Halseth and Darold Hazeltine are assembling this category.

The Parade Committee is hoping that every organization, business, and family in the Kendrick-Juliaetta area will participate in some way to make this the best parade yet. Entry forms will be distributed very soon or they may be requested from Eldon Taylor or Sharon Harris.

## Voter Approval of May 19 Override Levy Election Is Important for District 283

The special supplemental levy election discussed by Dr. Taylor in the following article will be held Tuesday, May 19, at four polling places within the school district. The polls will be open from 12 noon until 8 p. m.

Latah County (Precinct No. 23), Juliaetta and a portion of American Ridge and a portion of Fix Ridge will vote at Juliaetta Elementary School.

Latah County (Precinct No. 24), Kendrick and a portion of American, Cedar, Big Bear, and Little Bear Ridges, and Precinct No. 25, Linden, will vote at Kendrick High School.

Nez Perce County (Precinct No. 34) Leland, Cameron and Southwick, will vote at Cameron Lutheran Church.

Clearwater County (Precinct No. 8) Teakcan, will vote at the Albert Lawrence home.

In addition to the Trustee elections in Zones 1 and 4, all zones will be voting on a 1-year supplemental maintenance and operation "override levy" next Tuesday, May 19. The one-year supplemental levy will restore the amount levied during the 1987-88 school year to \$95,000.

Because of this up-coming election Superintendent Eldon Taylor has been asked some questions whose answers might better explain the issue.

Question: Why is this \$95,000 override levy necessary?

Answer: By our best estimation we will end July 1, 1992 with an ending balance of approximately \$10,000-\$20,000 in the red. This "red ink" is approximately the amount the State Department of Education held from the Kendrick School District because of a state undercount (6,000 instead of 2,000) on new students coming into the state during the 1990-91 school year. As mentioned in the last article in the Gazette two weeks ago, 80% of our "maintenance and operation" budget comes from the state of Idaho and 20% comes from local property tax. Since the state appropriations are based upon a classroom unit of student attendance and Kendrick's budget is built on 20.9 classroom units, the state held back \$748 per classroom unit (20.9x\$748) or approximately \$15,633. This occurred in June of 1991 a few days before the start of this budget year, thus negatively affecting the beginning balance on this year's budget. It is this time of year (April-May) that budgets are built on an estimate or projection given to us by the State Department of Education for the following year. Budget hearings are in June so that you start July 1 with a new budget for that year. When state funds are suddenly shifted on a district in the eleventh hour (June), a local school district is at the state's mercy.

Question: Can't Kendrick School District live on a budget?

Answer: Yes. We certainly can and have 10 out of the past 12 years. In 1986 and again in 1991 the state held back money in the last hour. Both times our red ink was approximately the amount held back. If the Kendrick School District is to be faulted, it would be on the side of being too sensitive or too conservative to the realities of the local economies. Knowing how fragile the farming and lumbering economies have been during the 1980s and early 1990s we have asked the bare minimums in contrast to other school districts, thus not leaving us a margin of error for the unexpected. Hopefully, the voters will appreciate this and support it if they want to keep their school district.

Question: What effect is this 57c/\$1,000 assessed valuation going to have on a typical piece of property?

Answer: Returning the Supplemental M & O override to the 1987-88 \$95,000 level will increase a \$100,000 assessed market value farm or a \$100,000 assessed market value busi-

ness \$57 per year. A \$50,000 home with homeowner's exemption using a \$5,000 lot value (\$50,000x50%=\$25,000=\$5,000 (lot)=\$30,000 (30x\$7c=\$17/yr.).

Question: Why do you consider these supplemental override survival efforts for this school district? Is this a scare tactic of voting for this issue?

Answer: The best answer I can give you for both of these questions, is that if you want to keep your school district, we are going to have to vote for the overrides. We only have to look around and practically anyone we would consolidate with, our taxes would go up.

I believe that the next 2 1/2 years, until we get the elementary school bond paid off in February of 1995, are the most critical in the history of Kendrick Jt. School District No. 283. There is growing pressure every year by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction Jerry Evans and his Assistant State Superintendent August (Gus) Hein and Meridian-type of school districts to change the school funding formula so that money is shifted away from small rural type of school districts to more urban low market value assessed school districts. This is a backdoor approach to consolidation by starvation since we are dependent on the state monies for this 80-20% shared financial support between state and local efforts. Five years ago Kendrick's superintendent was asked to sit on a state superintendent's finance committee with 14 others of the then 116 school districts in the state. One of the handouts with all the statistical computer runs that we received from the State Department of Education had Kendrick asterisked with 13 to 15 other districts as potential candidates for consolidation (no explanation of who we would consolidate with, just a consolidation candidate). After meeting for 3 years, 3 or times per year and looking into all aspects that make up the funding formula: enrollment divisors, transportation, special education, sparsity factors, P. L. 874 funds, forest funds, etc., the conclusion of the committee that while Idaho's funding formula was not perfect, it was about as fair to all school districts and their uniqueness as you could get. Again, these pro-consolidation moguls mentioned above know the political realities (open warfare) of trying to get the "C" word legislation passed so they more than likely will come in the back door with funding formula changes so that they will starve us into consolidation. Two of the past three legislative sessions, local superintendents have spent a great deal of time in Boise during the legislative sessions fighting off legislation that would change the funding formula. Fortunately, 2 larger districts have similar assessed market value situations as some of the rural districts and these are Boise and Lewiston, which have been strong supporters with their political strongholds. Likewise, our North Idaho legislators from New Meadows to the Canadian border have, for the most part, been supporters. However, the political climate has just changed with the legislative redistricting (North Idaho losing 3 or 4 legislative seats) and the retiring of the Speaker of the House—Tom Boyd from Genesee. Jerry Evans just announced to local superintendents at the April post-legislative meeting in Moscow that he would most likely support legislation next year to change the funding formula.

If we get the elementary school bond paid off in February, 1995, and the voters approve without raising their overall taxes, a shift of monies from the bond fund to a larger M&O override, we might have a chance as a district surviving into the next century. Again, this voter approved shift in 2 1/2 years would not raise one's overall taxes.

Question: Why is this \$95,000 override levy necessary?

Answer: By our best estimation we will end July 1, 1992 with an ending balance of approximately \$10,000-\$20,000 in the red. This "red ink" is approximately the amount the State Department of Education held from the Kendrick School District because of a state undercount (6,000 instead of 2,000) on new students coming into the state during the 1990-91 school year. 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

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, A MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE STATE OF IDAHO, PROVIDING FOR ANNEXATION OF PROPERTY DESCRIBED IN SECTION 1 OF THIS ORDINANCE INTO THE CITY OF JULIAETTA; PROVIDING THAT PROPERTY DESCRIBED IN SECTION 1 BE ZONED AS "SINGLE FAMILY RESIDENTIAL" (R-1); PROVIDING FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE COMPREHENSIVE PLAN AND ZONING MAP TO REFLECT THIS CHANGE; PROVIDING FOR THIS ORDINANCE TO BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT FROM AND AFTER ITS PASSAGE, APPROVAL AND PUBLICATION ACCORDING TO LAW;

WHEREAS the City Council deems it in the public interest that the real property described in Section 1 of this Ordinance, adjacent to the existing City boundaries, be annexed into the City of Juliaetta; and,

WHEREAS a public hearing was held before both the City Council and Planning and Zoning Commission and it was determined that said annexation is provided for under existing law, that the proposed zoning is suitable and compatible with surrounding land uses, that said land uses would fit in with the general development of the City, and that such zoning would be in the best interest of the citizens of the City of Juliaetta.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: That the following described land be annexed into the corporate limits of the City of Juliaetta, County of Latah, State of Idaho:

SECTION 2: That said property is hereby zoned "Single Family Residential" (R-1) and shall be so designated on the City Zoning Map.

SECTION 3: That said property as annexed shall be and is hereby designated as Low Density Residential on the Comprehensive Plan and shall be so designated on the Comprehensive Plan Map.

SECTION 4: That this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon its passage, approval and publication according to law.

**RESOLUTION NO. 257**  
**POLICY REGARDING**  
**NON-DISCRIMINATION ON THE**  
**BASIS OF DISABILITY**

A resolution of the City/County of Juliaetta, Idaho, adopting a policy of non-discrimination on the basis of disability.

Whereas, the Congress of the United States has passed Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 which requires that "no otherwise qualified individual with handicaps in the United States . . . shall, solely on the basis of his or her handicap, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subject to discrimination under any program or activity receiving federal financial assistance"; and,

Whereas, the City/County of Juliaetta has applied for/received an Idaho Community Development Block Grant and is required to comply with Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973; and,

Whereas, the failure to comply with the terms and conditions of Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act may cause the City/County to lose its grant or eligibility for future grants;

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Mayor/Commissioner and the Council/Commission of the City/County of Juliaetta, Idaho, the following:

Section I. It is the policy of the City/County that all programs and activities shall be accessible to, and usable by, qualified persons with disabilities.

Section II. That the City/Council shall undertake an evaluation, conducted in consultation with citizen groups involving persons

with disabilities, of its programs, policies, procedures and facilities in order to determine those areas where discrimination may occur.

Section III. The City Council shall, upon completion of said evaluation, make such revisions, modifications, or other changes so as to fully comply with the letter and intent of Section 504.

Section IV. Further, the City Council shall, where building modifications are required, develop and implement a transition plan for the timely elimination of structural barriers to citizens with disabilities.
