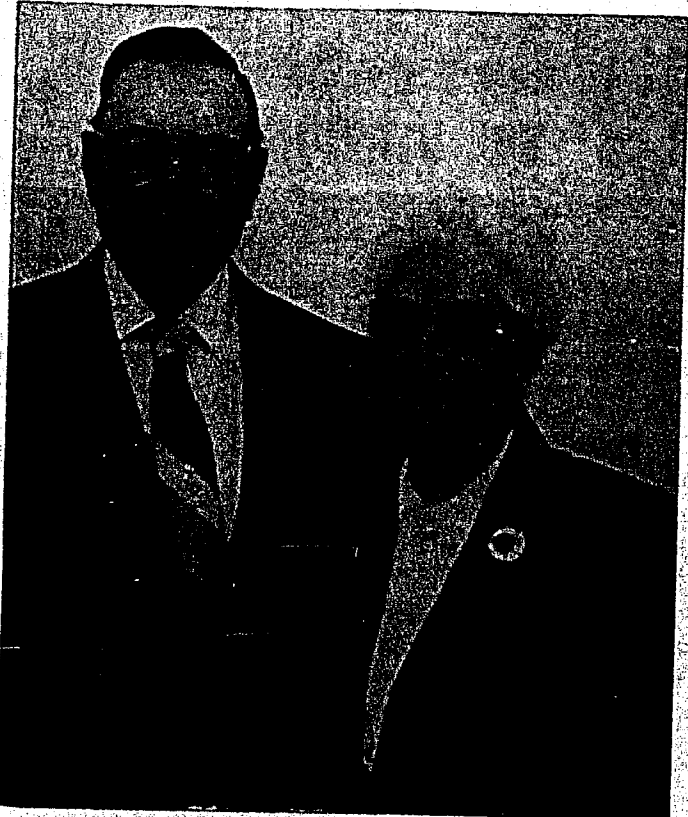

K-J Development Association Becomes Part Of LCSC Housing Assessment Project

As of May 12, the community of Kendrick-Juliaetta, along with Orofino and Kamiah, became a participant in a local housing assessment project developed by the Institute for Community Development at Lewis-Clark State College. Concerns about local housing have been raised in every Gem Community project with which the Institute has worked. Consequently, Mary Emery, community development specialist at LCSC, identified resources to assist communities in addressing their housing needs. Plans call for each community to organize a task force to carry out the assessment process and to use the data they accumulate to initiate

at least one local housing project. The economic diversification committee of the K-J Community Development Association will assume responsibility for this process and will for this specific purpose expand its membership to include a representative cross section of the community.

The assessment process calls for the following: The establishment of a task force; the gathering of basic demographic data for each community; the assessment of housing conditions, including affordability, land availability, and housing resources; and finally, creating strategies for change—in short, initiating projects to meet identified needs.

There is the possibility that the groups involved in the earlier community assessment process may be invited to provide insights into housing needs and possible solutions.

Quite early in the process of identifying Gem Community needs, there was some talk of taking steps to provide senior housing here. Subsequently the emphasis shifted to providing much needed housing for targeted young retirees who could possibly be a new source of income for the community. The assessment process, which requires beginning with hard, factual data, may further define these needs as well as identify housing needs that as yet haven't surfaced.

Whatever the findings, the community of Kendrick-Juliaetta is unique in that any group addressing housing needs and proposing projects must keep in touch with four independent entities: the towns of Kendrick and Juliaetta and the counties of Latah and Nez Perce. Further complicating the work of such a group is the fact that Federal and state programs may tend to bias planners in favor of this or that approach to meeting housing needs.

Anyone interested in becoming part of this assessment process is invited to contact Frank Jacobson at 289-3302. Jacobson, who will continue in the role of a community encourager for LCSC (indicates that the timeline established by Mary Emery sees the group's work being completed by July/August. When task force completes its work, it's finished—free to go, period!

Alternate Watering Days Begin June 1; Council Passes New Water Ordinance

The Kendrick City Council at its May 12 meeting set Monday, June 1 for the beginning of scheduled watering inside the city limits. And, for the first time, the watering restrictions will be based on the town's new house numbering system. City Clerk Lynne Bruce recently sent a letter to each resident informing them of the number of the house in which they live. Now residents are going to get to use the numbers. Even-numbered houses will water on Monday, Wednesday, Friday, and odd-numbered houses will water on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. The Council urges residents to water only in early mornings and evenings. If you don't know your house number, now is the time to call the City Clerk and find out.

In their continuing effort to improve the water system, the City Council passed Ordinance No. 635 which provides for increased water

fees to those residents who use over 30,000 gallons of water a month. This ordinance was passed to encourage water conservation. However, most residences will not see any increase in their monthly bill.

Studies show that 30,000 gallons is adequate for household and irrigation use for residential lots. In addition, 30,000 gallons per household is the limit of the city's capacity to pump and any use over this amount puts a strain on the system.

The city continues to put one dollar (\$1.00) of each monthly bill into a Dedicated Water Fund for future water projects. An increased effort to detect and fix leaks in the past two years has decreased the amount of water that the wells need to produce by 173,000 gallons a week. Also, Steve Howerton, the maintenance man for the city, has been working diligently to replace non-working meters and repair city lines.

May 30 Locust Festival Topic at Lions Meeting

The time is rapidly approaching for Kendrick's 32nd annual Locust Blossom Festival on Saturday, May 30, and much of meeting of the Kendrick-Juliaetta Lions Club on Wednesday evening, May 13, concerned the yearly celebration.

Lions' president Wayne Harris also reported on the lentil soup sale booth the club had operated at the Juliaetta Centennial. The club was pleased with the results of the sales.

Moving on to the Festival, Don Chrystal, one of the co-chairmen of the Festival, reported that plans for the parade are progressing well and all indications point to another successful parade. The only changes are in the staging areas. The children's parade will form between the Chevron bulk plant and the Clemenhagen residence (see separate article). The main parade will form on the street between Gene Brocke's home and City Hall. Horse groups will still gather out by Fosterville and the automobile entries will start from the high school.

Other of the day's events will be much the same as previous years. The children's races will be in the park following the parade. Bingo will be in the fenced area between the old Blewett store and Town and Country Diner. The Art Show will again be held at the Grange Hall.

There will be some new events this year; the Lions were told. Included are a 3-on-3 basketball tournament at the high school. A Jack and Jill softball tournament and a miniature golf course. The golf course was a popular attraction at the Juliaetta Centennial and it is hoped that it will be equally appealing to the visitors on Festival Day. The course will be set up between Red Cross Pharmacy and the Kendrick Clinic.

Plans for the barbecue beef dinner are already being made and the menu will still be barbecued beef, baked beans, cole slaw, pickles, and coffee or punch. The Grange will again be operating their pie house. During the dinner there will be musical entertainment by the Old Time Fiddlers and the Inland Harmony Chorus.

Barnyard Bingo Planned For Locust Festival Day

School Override Levy Given Approval By 84% Margin

Voters within Kendrick Jt. School District No. 283 went to the polls Tuesday, May 19, and gave a solid 84% approval to a \$95,000 supplemental maintenance and operation override levy. The levy had been requested by the trustees of the district to make up for a loss of state funding. At the same election, two incumbent trustees were re-elected without opposition for terms of four more years.

Speaking for himself and the Board of Trustees, Supt. of Schools Dr. Eldon Taylor told the Gazette Tuesday evening that, "We are very grateful to the voters of the district for this strong show of support for our local schools that was shown today."

And, it was a strong show of support for the administrators and the school board. There were a total of 205 ballots cast at the four polling places in the district. "Yes" votes were counted at 172. There were 33 "No" ballots cast.

Southwick: Yes 13	No 1—93%

Voters in Zone 1 (Juliaetta) re-elected Gary Browning as their trustee for another four years. He received 28 of the 29 ballots cast. 1 ballot was voided.

Chairman of the Board Doug Harris was re-elected, receiving 35 of the 39 ballots cast by voters in Zone 4. 1 ballot was spoiled and 3 ballots were not counted with write-in votes because of the deadline rule on write-ins.

**RESOLUTION NO. 257
POLICY REGARDING
NON-DISCRIMINATION ON THE
BASIS OF DISABILITY**

A resolution of the City/County of Juliaetta, Idaho, adopting a policy of non-discrimination on the basis of disability.

Whereas, the Congress of the United States has passed Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 which requires that "no otherwise qualified individual with handicaps in the United States . . . shall, solely on the basis of his or her handicap, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subject to discrimination under any program or activity receiving federal financial assistance"; and,

Whereas, the City/County of Juliaetta has applied for/received an Idaho Community Development Block Grant and is required to comply with Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973; and,

Whereas, the failure to comply with the terms and conditions of Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act may cause the City/County to lose its grant or eligibility for future grants;

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Mayor/Commissioner and the Council/Commission of the City/County of Juliaetta, Idaho, the following:

Section I. It is the policy of the City/County that all programs and activities shall be accessible to, and usable by, qualified persons with disabilities.

Section II. That the City/Council shall undertake an evaluation, conducted in consultation with citizen groups involving persons with disabilities, of its programs,

policies, procedures and facilities in order to determine those areas where discrimination may occur.

Section III. The City Council shall, upon completion of said evaluation, make such revisions, modifications, or other changes so as to fully comply with the letter and intent of Section 504.

Section IV. Further, the City/Council shall, where building modifications are required, develop and implement a transition plan for the timely elimination of structural barriers to citizens with disabilities.

**ORDINANCE NO. 635
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF
KENDRICK, A MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE STATE OF IDAHO, PROVIDING RATES AND FEES FOR WATER SERVICES PROVIDED BY THE CITY; PROVIDING THAT ORDINANCE 625 BE REPEALED, PROVIDING FOR THIS ORDINANCE TO BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT FROM AND AFTER ITS APPROVAL AND PUBLICATION.**

WHEREAS, the City council of the City of Kendrick deems it in the public interest to increase water rates to a level which will permit water revenues to equal the amounts needed for water service and improvements;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: That Ordinance No. 625, be, and the same hereby, is repealed.

Section 2: That the following monthly rates, fees, and charges for water services are hereby fixed and shall be paid effective the first day of June 1992:

A. Each account shall be charged a monthly fee of \$6.00 dedicated to the Bond Reserve Fund. All other charges shall be in addition to this fee.

B. Minimum Rate: Consumption of 0 to 4,000 gallons and the minimum rate for unmetered services shall be \$8.00 per month.

C. The charge for gallons used above and beyond 4,000 gallons shall be \$3.00 per thousand gallons or fraction thereof; for residential purposes, the following coverage fees will apply:

E. All rates and charges shall be paid before the 25th day of each month.

F. Past due accounts shall include an additional penalty and service fee of \$.50 per month.

G. The City may require customers to pay a deposit of \$50.00 to insure payment of all utility statements.

Section 4. The rates and fees imposed by this ordinance shall be effective the first day of June, 1992. This ordinance shall be effective from and after its passage, approval and publication.
