## Kendrick Post Office Position Is Now Open

The position of Postmaster-Relief Leave Replacement is now open and applications are now being accepted to fill this part time job. Postmaster Sharon Harris said this week.

A Postmaster-Relief Leave Replacement replaces the Postmaster during absences due to vacation, sick leave, meetings, etc.

This individual is required to work every Saturday in CAG J and K (Second and Third Class) offices and be on call at all times in case of an emergency of the Postmaster. In CAG L offices (Fourth Class) the individual is required to work only when the Postmaster is not available to be in the office.

A Postmaster-Relief is not a career postal position. There are no benefits available for non-career employees. However PMR is eligible to be considered for the Postmaster position for this office only, after three years as a PMR.

All applicants for postal employment must have drug testing, have fingerprints taken and a police check completed. Persons tentatively selected will also be required to pass a physical examination paid for by the Postal Service.

The salary is \$8.58 per hour. The position was opened when the present clerk, Julie Helmgartner, transferred to Lapwai.

Interested individuals should request a Form 2591, Application for Postal Employment from the Postmaster. Deadline is 5 p. m. June 1, 1992.

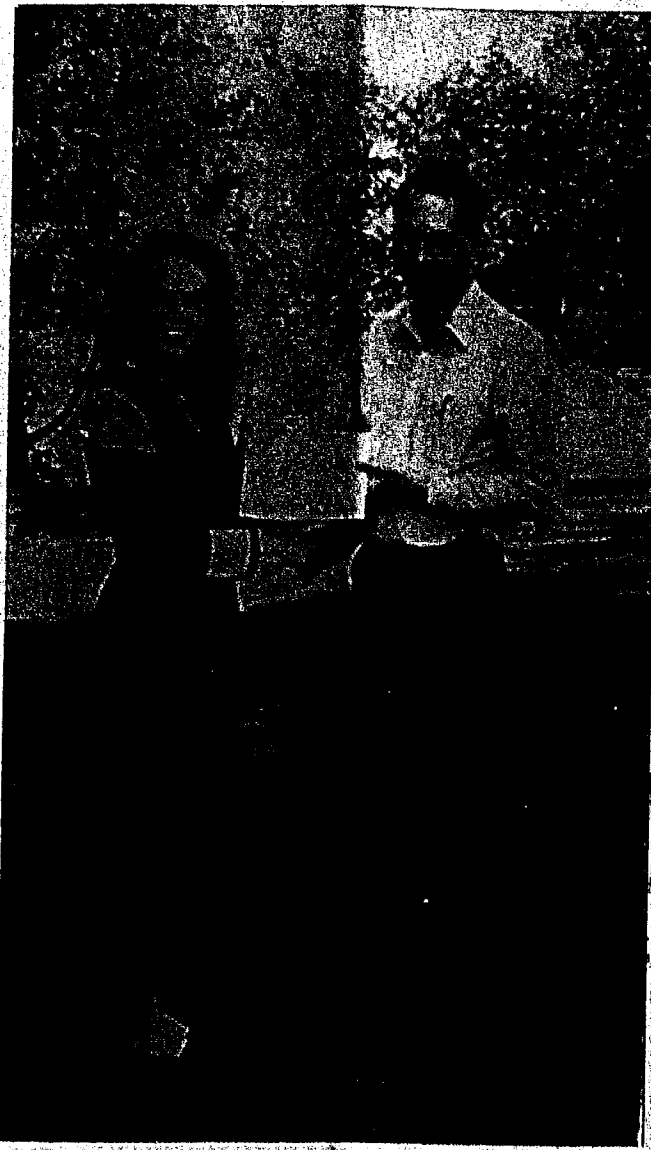

## 32nd Locust Blossom Festival Is Saturday, May 30

Anyone who didn't get their fill of fine community celebration when Juliaetta presented its centennial event May 2, will have an opportunity for more fun and excitement Saturday, May 30, as Kendrick presents its 32nd annual Locust Blossom Festival.

Most, if not all, of the locust blossom have come and gone, but the spirit of the blossoms still remain and those attending the yearly event are promised a day of fun, a fine parade, good food and a chance to visit with hundreds of others who "come home" each year to enjoy the day.

The day will begin with runners participating in the 15th annual 5.3 run and the 2-mile fun run. Runners entering the 5.3 mile run are asked to be at the R&R Mobile Home site about 2 miles west of Juliaetta at 7:15 Saturday morning for registration. Entrants will pay a \$10 fee which includes a T-shirt. The run begins promptly at 8:00. Youngsters or oldsters who wish to participate in the 2 mile fun run should assemble on Highway 3 near the Doc Little place.

Although the runs begin at 8, the Festival parade beginning at 10 o'clock sharp, officially get the Festival underway. Parade committee workers have been busy for weeks getting another good parade organized.

After the parade the booths and games will begin and continue on through the day.

The highlight of the day will again be the serving of the famous barbecue beef dinner. While the rest of town slept Friday night, the barbecue committee workers and the bean committee will have been working to prepare the hundreds of pounds of rolled beef roast, and gallons of

home-baked beans for the noon meal that will be served beginning at 11:30 in the park. Served with the beef and the baked beans will be cole slaw, bread, pickles punch and coffee. The price this year remains at the bargain fee of just \$4.00. The Grange will be having its pie house, too. Those who are unable to stand in line may be served at the Senior Center.

Following the meal there will be entertainment in the park by the Inland Harmony Chorus and the ever-popular Old Time Fiddlers. An FFA "Slave Auction" will also be conducted.

Children's races will be at the park beginning at 1:30. Note this is a change from previous years. Also adding to the day's entertainment will be a miniature golf course on 6th St. between the Red Cross Pharmacy and the Clinic; a Jack-n-Jill softball tournament out at the high school beginning at 1:30; and a 3-on-3 men's basketball tournament at the high school, also beginning at 1:30.

A shuttle bus will be operating between town and the high school on a 15-minute schedule. The bus will leave from the Potlatch Telephone Co.

The annual Arts & Crafts Show will be at the Kendrick Grange Hall and will open after the parade.

Things both local folks and visitors might wish to remember is that there will be no parking between 6th and 7th Streets until after the parade (old Elewett store down to the Clinic. There will also be no parking on Railroad St. from City Hall east (this is the staging area). There will also be no parking on 6th St. on either side of Main. The miniature golf course and booths will be using this area.

## Oscar and Ruth Slind, Ernie and Jean Brammer are Festival Grand Marshals

The Grand Marshals for Kendrick's 32nd Annual Locust Blossom Festival are four popular and respected citizens. Leading the parade down Main Street this year will be Ernest and Jean Brammer and Oscar and Ruth Slind. All four are long time area residents and their selection is a tribute to their contributions and service to the community.

Oscar and Ruth Slind When the Class of 1992 graduates Sunday, May 31, one of the pianists providing the processional and recessional music will be Ruth Slind. It would be difficult to imagine a graduation at Kendrick High School that did not include the talented performance of Mrs. Slind. And, it is typical of the contributions she has made to the community since the early 1930s when she came here as the bride of Oscar Slind.

Ruth Leland was born in Spokane, Washington in 1908 and received her schooling from a private Lutheran School—Spokane College High. After graduating from there she attended the Axberg School of Theater Pipe Organs and played pipe organs in movie theaters in Seattle, Pasco, Kennewick and Spokane. In the early days of motion pictures before the advent of "talkies", much of the drama was supplied by talented organists whom performed while the motion pictures were being shown.

On June 4, 1933 Ruth and Oscar were married at the home of her parents in Spokane.

Oscar was born in Windom, Minnesota April 11, 1899 where his parents had migrated from Norway. In the early 1900s the Slind family moved to Big Bear Ridge near Kendrick. Oscar and Ruth still reside on the family farm where Oscar's father farmed before him.

Oscar is a charter member of the Kendrick Lions Club. Ruth has been a church organist for over 60 years. She and Oscar have been members of the Moscow Organ Society for many years. Likewise, the Slinds have been members of the Cameron

Lutheran Church for over 30 years and before that members of the historic Bethany Lutheran Church on Big Bear Ridge.

The Slinds have two married children, Maxine and Leland, as well as eight grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

The Slinds are a lovely couple, well-deserving of the honor the community has bestowed on them.

Ernie and Jean Brammer Everyone was pleased when it was announced that Ernie and Jean Brammer were going to also be the Locust Blossom Festival Grand Marshals. This popular and respected couple have been an important part of the community for many years.

Ernie was born near Southwick April 22, 1913. In 1937 he drove a logging truck for Potlatch Corp and was later a logging truck driver for Paige and Paige Trailer Co. in the Portland area. During World War II Ernie enlisted in the Navy, serving 46 months on escort ships as a radio operator.

Jean Ramey was born in Creston, Washington, May 9, 1917. She moved with her family to Kendrick in 1923 where her father, the late Roy Ramey was the depot agent for many years. After graduation from Kendrick High School and Lewiston Normal School (now Lewis-Clark State College), she taught school in the elementary grades for 10 years.

Ernie and Jean were married in Kendrick on November 23, 1946. They farmed near Southwick for 32 years before retiring to Kendrick in 1976.

Ernie is a Life Member of Baker-Lind Post 3913, Veterans of Foreign Wars and Jean is a Life member of that Post's Auxiliary unit. They are both active in the V. F. W. and the Auxiliary and also active in the affairs of their church.

They have one daughter, Jolene, who makes her home in Moscow. The selection committee for this year's festival made a wise and popular decision when it chose the Brammers as Grand Marshals.

Wilbur D. Colwell, a former Kendrick resident, died Wednesday, May 13 of a stroke at St. Joseph Regional Medical Center at Lewiston. He was 87.

He was born June 10, 1904 to Albert Otto and Julia May Mithum Colwell at Pomeroy. He attended rural schools in the area.

In 1931, he began working for the U. S. Forest Service in the Pomeroy area and continued in this job for several years.

He married Thelma M. Cantrill on May 31, 1931, at Pomeroy.

The family moved to Seattle in 1941, where he worked for Boeing Co. and was also involved in selling real estate.

In 1944, they moved to Ingleswood, Calif., where he worked in real estate. They moved to Southwick in 1948 and he was a partner in the shake mill on the North Fork of the Clearwater River.

In 1950, they moved to Kendrick and he worked for Gem State Lumber Co. at Juliaetta.

The family moved to Joseph, Ore., in 1953, where he was employed as a projectionist for Walter Brennan's Movie Theater.

In 1956, they moved to Lewiston where he worked for LCSC as a groundsman. He retired from the position in 1967. They have lived at Lewiston since.

He enjoyed spending time with his family, fishing, traveling, reading and working in his garden.

Survivors include his wife at the family home in Lewiston; 2 daughters, Betty L. Mustoe of Southwick and Barbara L. Halseth of Lewiston; two sisters, Mabel Bartels of Pomeroy and Helen Cantrill of Fairfield, Wash.; three grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren.

Two sisters, Ruby Alford and Hazel Crawford, and a brother, Ernest Colwell, died previously.

A funeral service was held Monday, May 18 at Southwick Pine Hill Cemetery at Southwick.

NOTICE OF TAX INCREASE

Kendrick Joint School District No. 283 has proposed to increase its annual budget by an amount of ad valorem tax revenues that is less than one hundred five percent (105%) of the ad valorem tax revenues certified for its annual budget during the previous year. Its ad valorem property tax rate of one and nine-tenths percent (1.9%) will increase its property tax revenue by three and seven-tenths percent (3.7%). The following percentage schedule is an estimate of what this change may mean to a taxpayer.

All citizens are invited to attend a public hearing on the increased budget request or increased tax rates. The hearing will be held June 11, 1992, 8:30 P. M., Kendrick High School Board Room.

**CAUTION TO TAXPAYER:** The amounts shown in this schedule do NOT reflect tax charges that are made because of voter approved bond levies, override levies, supplemental levies, or levies applicable to newly created taxing districts.

There has been an increase in taxable property values in Latah, Nez Perce and Clearwater County over the last year. Because of this increase in assessed valuation, more taxes will be collected this year than last year.

The new **Truth in Taxation** law requires that the School District notify its patrons any time there is an increase of more than 5% in the dollars collected for property taxes or increase the tax rate in excess of that certified in the previous year. **However, the increase in total dollars collected probably will not increase the dollars available to schools.** This is because when the local property tax support increases, the state funding decreases in an attempt to equalize the dollars available to all school districts across the state.

This increase is automatic and in no way affects the supplemental/override levy.

**ORDINANCE NO. 635**  
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK, A MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE STATE OF IDAHO, PROVIDING RATES AND FEES FOR WATER SERVICES PROVIDED BY THE CITY; PROVIDING THAT ORDINANCE 625 BE REPEALED, PROVIDING FOR THIS ORDINANCE TO BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT FROM AND AFTER ITS APPROVAL AND PUBLICATION.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Kendrick deems it in the public interest to increase water rates to a level which will permit water revenues to equal the amounts needed for water service and improvements;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: That Ordinance No. 625, be, and the same hereby, is repealed.

Section 2: That the following monthly rates, fees, and charges for water services are hereby fixed and shall be paid effective the first day of June 1992:

A. Each account shall be charged a monthly fee of \$6.00 dedicated to the Bond Reserve Fund. All other charges shall be in addition to this fee.

B. Minimum Rate: Consumption of 0 to 4,000 gallons and the minimum rate for unmetered services shall be \$8.00 per month.

C. The charge for gallons used above and beyond 4,000 gallons shall be \$3.00 per thousand gallons or fraction thereof; for residential purposes, the following average fees will apply:

30,001 to 40,000 gallons	\$1.50 per thousand gallons
40,001 to 50,000 gallons	\$2.00 per thousand gallons
50,001 to 60,000 gallons	\$2.50 per thousand gallons
60,001 to 70,000 gallons	\$3.00 per thousand gallons
70,001 to 80,000 gallons	\$3.50 per thousand gallons
80,001 to 90,000 gallons	\$4.00 per thousand gallons
90,001 to 100,000 gallons	\$4.50 per thousand gallons
100,001 plus gallons	\$5.00 per thousand gallons

E. All rates and charges shall be paid before the 25th day of each month.

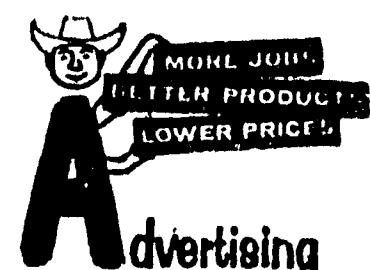
F. Past due accounts shall include an additional penalty and service fee of \$.50 per month.

G. The City may require customers to pay a deposit of \$50.00 to insure payment of all utility statements.

Section 4. The rates and fees imposed by this ordinance shall be effective the first day of June, 1992. This ordinance shall be effective from and after its passage, approval and publication.
