Woodrow Flesham Passes May 23rd

Woodrow Wilson Flesham, a retired Union Oil employee for thirty-two years, died at his home at Paradise, California May 23rd of cancer.

He was born at Leland, Idaho on December 1, 1913 to John Edward and Julia N. Lopslech Flesham.

He attended the Leland school and was a life member of the United Methodist Church.

He left Leland in 1936 and went to California where he worked on the Golden Gate Bridge for a year.

December 28th, 1936, he married Hazel Marie Campbell in California.

In 1937 they returned to Leland to care for her mother. In 1939 he went to work for the Bunker Hill Mine at Kellogg, Idaho. In 1941 they returned to California and went to work with Union Oil until October of 1973, when the couple moved to Paradise, Calif. Hazel died Sept. 24, 1982.

On Nov. 13, 1985, he married Theda Spicker at Reno, Nevada. She survives at the family home. Other survivors include two daughters, Yvonne Whitaker of Concord, Calif., and Karen Narberes of Antioch, Calif.; two grandsons and two granddaughters; one sister, Mildred (Flesham) Johnson, Kendrick, and one nephew, Daniel Hunt of Durvall, Wash. One brother and three sisters preceded him in death.

He was an ardent outdoor person and returned to Idaho each year to hunt and fish. He also enjoyed and participated in baseball when he was younger. In his retirement years he took pride in his yard and flowers.

Cremation has taken place and a memorial service was conducted on May 30 at the United Methodist Church at Paradise.

Inurnment and committal services will be conducted at 2 p. m. Monday, June 8 at the Cameron Cemetery.

With the weather cooperating beautifully, the 32nd annual Kendrick Locust Blossom Festival was celebration Saturday, May 30 before a large and appreciative crowd that had come from many states and the region. There were few, if any complaints except from a few who wished "they could have visited a little more."

Some apprehension had been expressed that this year's Festival just might be "down" a little because of the Juliaetta Centennial of May 2. But these fears were ungrounded as even the Juliaetta neighbors from three miles down the road turned out in excellent numbers and support for this yearly event.

The 5.3-mile run and the 2-mile fun run began the day at 8 o'clock. Criss James won the 5.3 mile event in a time of 28 minutes, 36 seconds.

Friends of Steve and Beth Caskey were pleased to note these former Kendrick residents, now living in Morton, Wash., were here once again to participate in the run. There has been an increase in taxable property values in Latah, Nez Perce and Clearwater County over the last year. Because of this increase in assessed valuation, more taxes will be collected this year than last year.

The new Truth in Taxation law requires that the School District notify its patrons any time there is an increase of more than 5% in the dollars collected for property taxes or increase the tax rate in excess of that certified in the previous year. However, the increase in total dollars collected probably will not increase the dollars available to schools. This is because when the local property tax support increases, the state funding decreases in an attempt to equalize the dollars available to all school districts across the state.

This increase is automatic and in no way affects the supplemental/override levy.
