The first significant rain in several weeks fell on the dry Pacific Northwest Thursday of last week and brought smiles to the faces of farmers who were beginning to talk of drought as crops were starting to show the stress of heat and lack of moisture. A heavy rain fell on Thursday afternoon and again on Friday, continuing, at least in Kendrick, on through the night. The initial storm Thursday wsa accompanied by thunder and lightning and strong winds that did damage to property

in the Deary area. Estimates of the amount of rain that fell over the weekend varied, but most agreed that the total was close to one and a half inches. Frank Dammarell who keeps a close check on his rain gauge, said he recorded 1.4 inches at his home on Bear Ridge.
