A memorial service for Mrs. Silvie (Elizabeth) Cook, a long time Kendrick resident will be held Wednesday, June 24 at 1 p. m. at Lewis-Clark Memorial Gardens at 7th and Cedar in the Lewiston Orchards.

Mrs. Cook, 90, a retired teacher died last December in Spokane.

She was born April 22, 1901, to Edward and Effie Daniels at Chesley, Idaho, near Reubens. The family moved in 1911 to Agatha on the Clearwater River. She boarded with several families during her high school years and graduated from Kendrick High School.

She graduated from Lewiston Normal School in 1922 and taught in her first country school at Welker, near Leland. During that time, she homesteaded on Pine Creek on the Clearwater River.

She and Silvie O. Cook were married Dec. 29, 1924, at Vancouver, Wash. They were married for 62 years, until his death in 1986.

She taught in many schools during her career and retired in 1962 from Clarkston schools.

Survivors include two daughters, Margaret E. Royer of Spokane and Alicia B. Morgan of Kaslof, Alaska; five grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

Thursday Rain Breaks Dry Spell

The first significant rain in several weeks fell on the dry Pacific Northwest Thursday of last week and brought smiles to the faces of farmers who were beginning to talk of drought as crops were starting to show the stress of heat and lack of moisture. A heavy rain fell on Thursday afternoon and again on Friday, continuing, at least in Kendrick, on through the night. The initial storm Thursday was accompanied by thunder and lightning and strong winds that did damage to property in the Deary area.

Estimates of the amount of rain that fell over the weekend varied, but most agreed that the total was close to one and a half inches. Frank Dammarell who keeps a close check on his rain gauge, said he recorded 1.4 inches at his home on Bear Ridge.

The rain was a blessing for grain and legume crops, especially in the higher elevations such as the ridges. For some of the grain crops in the lower country the moisture arrived too late to benefit the fields that had already been damaged by the lack of water.

There were showers on Saturday and Sunday, none on Monday and just a light rain Tuesday evening.

The skies stayed cloudy most of early part of the week and temperatures stayed below normal, allowing the ground and the crops to utilize the moisture.

ORDINANCE NO. 257

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, A MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE STATE OF IDAHO, PROVIDING FOR FEES PERTAINING TO CONNECTION WITH CITY'S WATER AND SEWER SYSTEM AND FOR PAYMENT FROM USERS WHO INCREASE DEMAND ON EITHER SYSTEM; PROVIDING THAT CONNECTION FEES BE HELD IN A DEDICATED FUND FOR REPLACEMENT AND IMPROVEMENTS TO THE CITY'S WATER AND SEWER FACILITIES; PROVIDING FOR REPEAL OF INCONSISTANT PROVISIONS; PROVIDING THAT THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT UPON ITS PASSAGE, APPROVAL AND PUBLICATION ACCORDING TO LAW.

WHEREAS THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL HAVE DEEMED IT IN THE PUBLIC INTEREST TO AMEND ITS APPLICABLE SEWER AND WATER CONNECTION FEES; NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: EQUIVALENT RESIDENCE: For purposes of this Ordinance, particularly for commercial and industrial connections to the City's utilities, the term "equivalent residence" (ER) shall be defined as the sewage flow or water use from one average single-family residence. This flow has been estimated for purposes of charging connection fees connection fees at 8,000 gallons per month.

SECTION 2: DETERMINATION OF WATER CONNECTION FEE: A sewer connection fee in the amount of \$1,350 is hereby established as a minimum fee for any user connecting to the City's water system. This fee shall be charged to each single-family residence connecting to the system. For commercial and industrial uses which connect to the system, a fee based on the number of ERs will be evaluated by the City's engineer or an economist and a fee of \$1,350 per ER will be charged.

SECTION 3: DETERMINATION OF SEWER CONNECTION FEE: A sewer connection fee in the amount of \$1,250 is hereby established as a minimum fee for any user connecting to the City's sewer system. This fee shall be charged to each single-family residence connecting to the system. For commercial and industrial uses which connect to the system, a fee based on the number of ERs will be evaluated by the City's engineer or an economist and a fee of \$1,250 per ER will be charged.

SECTION 4: DEDICATED FUND: The foregoing funds shall be maintained in a dedicated water and sewer fund. Purchases from this dedicated fund will be limited to replacement and capital improvements for the City's water system and sewerage system, including the sewage treatment plant.

SECTION 5: EXISTING SERVICES: Existing users connected to a City utility service will not be required to pay any connection fee for that service; however, commercial or industrial users who increase their demand on such services shall be required to pay a fee equal to the increase in ERs times the foregoing fee per ER.

SECTION 6: INCONSISTENT PROVISIONS REPEALED: That any provision of any Ordinance of the City in conflict with a provision of this Ordinance is hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

SECTION 7: EFFECTIVE DATE: This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.

ORDINANCE NO. 258
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO, PROVIDING FOR THE REPEAL OF ORDINANCE NO. 255; PROVIDING FOR RESTRICTIONS ON EXTENDING WATER SERVICE WITHIN THE 100 YEAR FLOODPLAIN TO ANY AND ALL STRUCTURES FOR WHICH CONSTRUCTION WAS INITIATED AFTER THE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE; PROVIDING DEFINITIONS; PROVIDING FOR THIS ORDINANCE TO BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT UPON ITS PASSAGE, APPROVAL AND PUBLICATION ACCORDING TO LAW. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: That Ordinance No. 255 be, and the same hereby is, repealed in its entirety.

SECTION 2: DEFINITIONS. The following words and phrases used in this Ordinance shall be given the following interpretations. All other words and phrases used in this Ordinance, the definition of which is not given, shall be given an ordinary and commonly understood and accepted meaning.

The term 100 year floodplain shall be defined as all land in the service area described on the floodplain map of the City designated as the 100 year floodplain; said map is attached as Exhibit 1 and incorporated herein.

(b) FLOODWAY: The channel of the river or other water course and the adjacent land areas which must be reserved in order to discharge the base flood without cumulatively increasing the water surface more than one foot. This area is designated on Exhibit 1.

(c) WATER SERVICE: Water service shall mean any person, entity, or property which receives water from the Juliaetta Municipal Water System.

SECTION 3: FLOODPLAIN PROHIBITION: The following prohibition shall apply within the flood prone areas:
Water service shall not be extended to any person, entity or structure lying within the 100 yr. floodplain as described in Exhibit 1; except for irrigation of the City Parks, drinking water delivered by free standing fountains in the City Parks, and water to any open-air pavilion (a roof and necessary supports creating a structure which is open on all sides and does not provide bathroom facilities in City Parks. This prohibition applies to any structure for which construction is initiated or substantially altered after the date of passage of this Ordinance.

SECTION 4: REPEAL OF INCONSISTENT PROVISIONS: Any provision of any Ordinance inconsistent with a provision of this Ordinance is hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

SECTION 5: PUBLICATION: This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force upon its passage, approval and publication in the official newspaper of the City of Juliaetta.
