Brammers Return from Tour of Europe

Ernie and Jean Brammer returned home Tuesday of last week from a 17-day bus tour in Europe. Upon arrival in London they joined the rest of their traveling companions.

The city tour of London included many famous landmarks. The highlight of the City tour was Westminster Abbey, one of the most famous churches in the Christian world. Before returning to their hotel they had the opportunity to watch the practice parade for Queen Elizabeth's birthday. It was spectacular.

At Dover, England, they crossed the English channel on an exciting Hoverspeed craft to Calais, France. Leaving Calais for Belgium, the tour director called attention to the remains of Hitler's bunkers near the highway.

Amsterdam offered the tourists a relaxing, Dutch-style sightseeing on a glass-roofed boat through the maze of canals. A short distance from Amsterdam was the quaint village of Volendam where many people wear their traditional Dutch costumes. Many windmills are still being used. Wooden shoes are made there.

At Aalsmeer, Holland the Brammers visited the largest flower auction in the world. Two flower auction firms had been selling flowers and plants since 1912 and they merged in 1968. The complex was finished in 1972. The auction buildings cover 111 acres. It is called Aalsmeer Flower Auction. Auctioning takes place in five rooms. Each auction room can accommodate three hundred buyers. Nearly 14 million flowers and 1.5 million plants are sold daily. Buyers from all over the world attend the auctions.

In Venice, Italy, the couple went on a walking tour. They watched skilled glass blowers, toured St. Mark's Square, the Byzantine Basilica with its 1,000 year old gem-studded gold altar piece and much more.

On the way to Rome Ernie and Jean stopped at Assisi. They visited the 13th century Basilica of St. Francis, built above the grave of St. Francis. Church services were being held in the lower level and also on the main level. On the upper level outside on the lawn were several hundred people celebrating an event the Brammers didn't understand, but they witnessed the event. During the speeches Italians twirled neck scarves above their head and shouted. When the event was finished, wine and chunks of hard bread were served to everyone.

In Rome they saw the Arch of Constantine that was built on October 28, 312 AD. The famous Rome Colosseum took eight years to build and was opened in 80 AD and could accommodate 56,000 people who watched fights of wild beasts and gladiators.

The Trevi Fountain is the most famous fountain in the world. It was built in 1762. Legend says if you throw a coin over your left shoulder into the fountain, your wish to come back to Rome will come true. Ernie threw a coin in the fountain. Maybe they'll go back!

Another spectacular chapel in Rome is the Sixtine Chapel with the painting by Michelangelo on the ceilings.

One outstanding place was the Gallery of Fine Arts which contains many of Michelangelo's sculptures.

The Brammers noted their distance at the Leaning Tower of Pisa.

Weekend Storms Broke Heat Wave But Halted Harvest

A series of storm fronts from the Washington coast moved across the region over the weekend, breaking a heat wave that had sent temperatures over the 100 degree mark.

And, while the rain and cooler weather were welcomed, the moisture brought the 1992 pea harvest to a sudden halt.

George Brocke, of Brocke and Sons, Inc., said the first of the current crop of peas had come in to the warehouses on June 20. Lohman Bros. had delivered the first peas of the season from their fields below Juliaetta. Since that time other peas had been cut on the lower end of Potlatch Ridge.

Brocke said that not enough peas have been cut to get an accurate picture of just how the harvest is going to be this year, but he said some of the fields were yielding better than expected. "There's been some pretty good yields, and some not so good," he reported. "It's just too early to tell."

The latest rain, Brocke said, will definitely benefit peas and lentils that were planted later in the spring, much as the crop in the Southwick and Cameron area.

The amount of moisture recorded ranged from about a half inch in the immediate Kendrick area to up to over three-quarter of an inch in areas to the south and east.

Brian Silflow Selected to Participate in Cattleman's For Tomorrow Program

Brian Silflow was among the 29 students chosen to participate in the Advancement of Cattleman For Tomorrow (ACT II) Program during the week of June 15-19.

ACT II is a scholastic honors educational program sponsored by the University of Idaho for young men and women entering their Junior or Senior year in high school. The students are diverse in their agriculture-related background, but share strong academic backgrounds and a common goal to pursue careers in the beef/dairy cattle industry.

The week-long program featured tours of the University of Idaho's facilities at Moscow, Washington State University Veterinary School, speakers from livestock-related industry, and workshops where the students were involved in the technology of the industry.

Juliaetta Council Restricts Outside Water Use

After watching its water supply drop to dangerously low levels during last week's heat wave, the Juliaetta city council imposed outside watering restrictions at a council session Tuesday evening. The restrictions are now in effect and the council sincerely asks the cooperation of residents.

Watering will again be restricted on an "odd-even" day schedule. All residences and businesses below State Street are permitted watering on EVEN DAYS. Residences and businesses above Water Street may do outside watering on ODD days.

NO SUNDAY WATERING WILL BE ALLOWED.

Hours of watering are also limited the council said. Use of outside watering, even with the "Odd-Even" restrictions may be done only between the hours of 7:00 p. m. and 9 p. m.

Frank Groseclose, the Juliaetta city maintenance man told the Gazette that the city pumped 1,253,000 gallons of water last week during the wave. "There was just no way we could keep up," Groseclose said.

The city must still depend on its old wells and pumps while the new water system is under construction.

While the weekend rains and the rain and cooler weather this week has relieved the pressure on the wells and pumps, the council feels it must keep enough water in the reservoir to provide adequate fire protection in the event of emergency.

The council dislikes having to impose watering restrictions, but feels the citizens of Juliaetta will understand the need to provide adequate safeguard to conserve water.

Liquor store hours remain the same—from 11 a. m. to 6 p. m., Monday through Saturday.

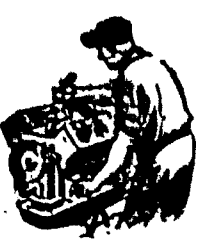
