A wrong is righted; new swans Now grace Kendrick lagoon



It has been over six months since a Coeur d'Alene man shot and killed two swans on the Kendrick sewage lagoon, but thanks to the persistence and hard work of the Kendrick City Council, Kendrick's maintenance man Steve Howerton and Tanya Regan an Idaho Fish and Game officer, two replacement swans now grace the waters of the lagoon. The new birds, a pair of Mute Swans were delivered last Thursday, July 9 from "For the Birds", a private bird facility

near Nampa, Idaho. The story began last November when two men were seen shooting the swans that were on the city's sewage lagoons in the west part of town. The men had been told that the water was city property and no hunting was allowed. The men ignored the warning and were later observed carrying the birds from the lagoon. An alert resident took down the license plate number of the vehicle the men were driving. The num-

ber of license and description of the men were turned over to Steve Howerton, who in turn contacted the Latah County Sheriff's office and the Fish and Game Department. The city council also began writing letters urging that action be taken.

The persistent pressure worked, and identification of the man who killed the swans was made. The man initially denied any knowledge of the event, but later in a plea bargain session agreed to reimburse the city of Kendrick \$1,000 if no criminal charges were pressed. The city council accepted that agreement. The man sent the city a check in the full amount less than a week later.

There was never much doubt that the city would use the money received to make a replacement of the two dead swans. After some inquiring, city clerk Lynne Bruce found a south Idaho firm that dealt in rare birds. This facility was located near Nampa and was named "For the Birds." They had an adult pair of Mute Swans that just seemed right. And the cost was \$1,000, delivered. The agreement to purchase the birds was made, and after a lengthy wait, the birds were delivered Thursday.

Mute Swans (Latin name Cygnus Olor) are 58 to 60 inches in length and can have a wing span of up to 95 inches, says the Audubon Society's Field Guide to North American Birds. Mute Swans are white with a black knob at the base. The guide says, "Unlike other swans, it is usually silent except for some hissing and grunting notes". The book does say, "It (the swan), does have a loud trumpeting call, but this is rarely heard."

The incident is now officially closed. A wrong has been righted, and while the memory of the first act of killing the swans still disgusts local residents, everyone is very pleased that two beautiful birds are again providing enjoyment and pleasure to those who drive by and look at them on the pond.

Firemen, EMT's to Conduct Survey Necessary for Grant Application

The City of Kendrick, the Kendrick Volunteer Fire Department and J-K Ambulance Service are interested in the construction of a new emergency services facility building. The proposed new structure would replace the present fire hall and give more space for housing the fire trucks, the ambulance and the new emergency vehicle which has been donated by Washington Water Power Co.

The State of Idaho's Department of Commerce has grants that could be used to help pay for the cost of construction. To qualify and be considered for such a grant, the group seeking the grant must meet certain qualifications. One of these qualifications is a financial one. The state wants to know what the average income is of people living in the area served by those seeking the grant.

A short time ago the City of Kendrick attempt to obtain this information by mailing out survey sheets which would give the necessary information but still not reveal any names or identifications. Despite all pleas for completion and return of the survey sheets by the city, there was not sufficient response to validate the survey. The grant is not obtainable unless this information about the community obtained.

In an effort get the project underway, the firemen and the emergency medical technicians have decided to do a door-to-door survey in Kendrick to bring the needed information. There will be no attempt to identify or record who is giving the information. NO NAMES WILL BE RECORDED OR USED. The survey will be completely anonymous, but it is necessary if the city is going to qualify for the grant.

Councilman Dave Klatt said Monday afternoon that the firemen and EMT's will be conducting the survey Wednesday and for as many evenings as necessary to cover the town. The cooperation of the public is most seriously sought.

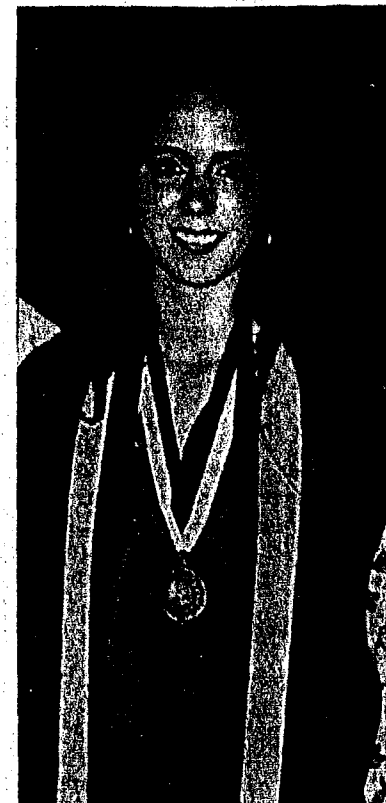
Potlatch Ridge Workers 4-H Club Meets July 20

River Crossing, Inc. Abandons Plans for Local Golf Course

After four years of work and planning, River Crossing, Inc., a group that wanted to construct a golf course several miles east of Kendrick on Cedar Creek, announced it had abandoned its plans and would dissolve the corporation. The announcement was made by corporation president Wally Butler at a meeting of the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association Thursday, July 9.

Butler, who is also president of J-K Development Assoc., said later that lack of support, especially at the local level, convinced the River Crossing officers and directors to take this action. River Crossing had purchased land for the project late last year from John Snyder of Kendrick. In the contract for the sale of the land, was a stipulation that Mr. Snyder have the first option to repurchase the land, should the effort to build the golf course fail. Butler said this week that Mr. Snyder has exercised that option and again owns the land. Butler also added that when the necessary paper work and other details are taken care of River Crossing will disband.

Giving up the dream of Kendrick and Juliaetta having its own golf course is a keen disappointment for the local people who have worked so diligently and hard for the past four years. The idea of a community golf course was one of the first project ideas to come up when the K-J Development Assoc. was formed. A golf course committee was created by the association, and when that committee's efforts reached a certain point and it was felt that the course might be a reality, the committee was abandoned and River Crossing, Inc. was formed for legal and tax purposes. Other than having its interest, support and friendship, River Crossing, Inc. was not connected with the K-J Community Development Assoc.

It is understood that outside investment money was sought, but these are troubled investment times with the economy still on a downward curve. Investors also seemed to be reluctant to put money into a golf course that had only nine holes, instead of the usual 18 holes.

Kendrick Street Signs Should be Up Soon

The Kendrick city council met in regular session Tuesday evening and among the reports was one from maintenance man Steve Howerton, who said that the street signs in town should be up soon. Steve and his work crew have nearly all of the sign posts in place and the signs designating the streets will be installed, it is hoped within two weeks.

The signs with the street names will be of regular size with white lettering on a green background.

In regard to the house numbers, the city asks that anyone with problems or questions should call city hall at 280-5157.

Thanks Saving Water

The council expressed its appreciation to city residents for their cooperation in the matter of watering restrictions. The public's help in this matter has been allowing the reservoir to refill each night so as to provide for adequate water in the event of emergency need, such as fire.

The public's continued cooperation with the restrictions is asked and will be appreciated.
