Dex Archer will bring his progressive Southern Gospel style of inspirational music to worship services at 11:00 a. m.

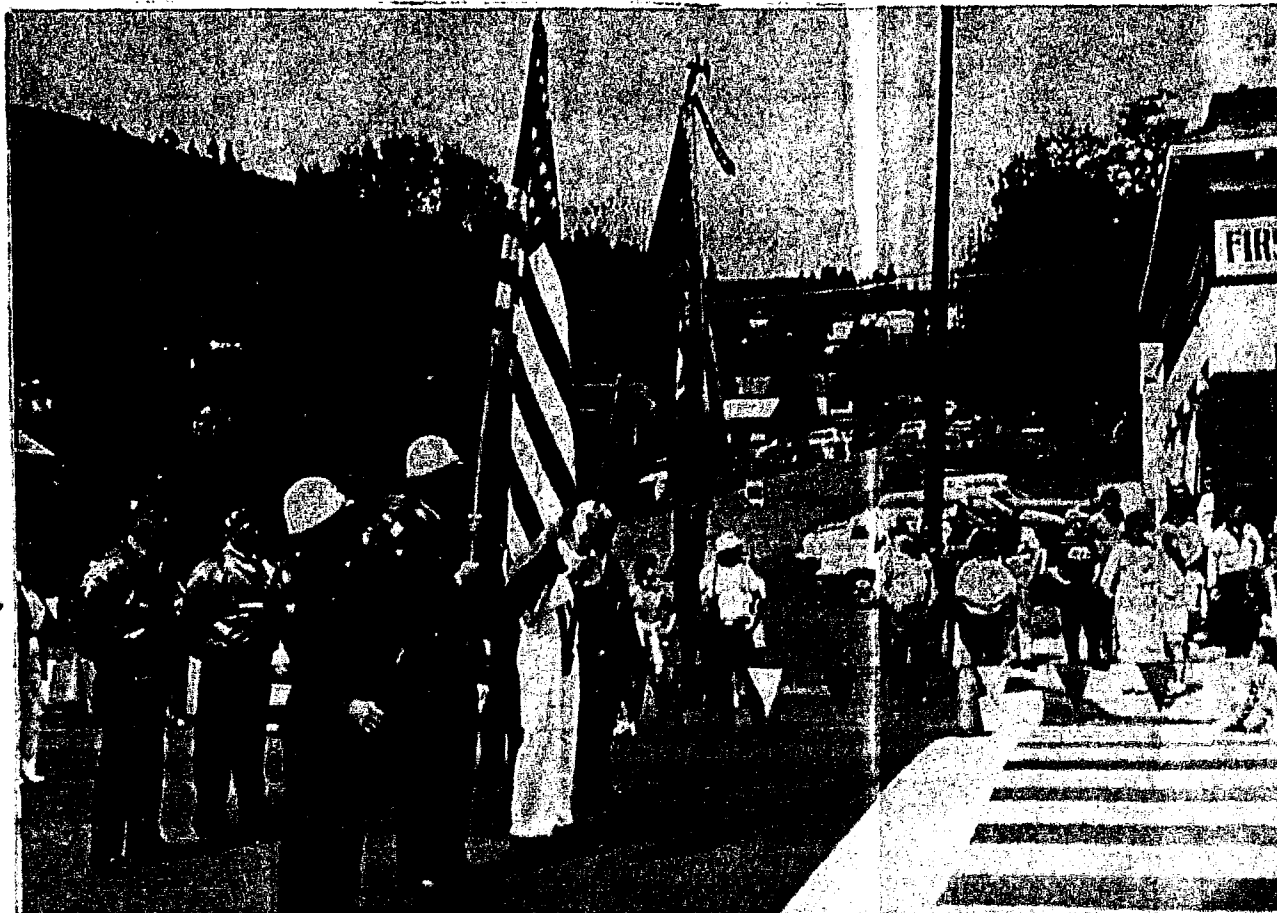

Monday Storm Halts Harvest

A summer thunderstorm moved across the area Monday afternoon accompanied by strong winds, lightning and rain. The rain brought harvest operations to a sudden halt in the Kendrick/Southwick area. The harvest of the 1992 pea, lentil and small grains was well underway when the storm struck.

Farmers had no idea of when they would be able to get back into the fields as the weather forecasts predicted continuing wet conditions for the next several days.

George Brocke, of Brocke and Sons, said Tuesday afternoon that approximately 15 to 20 percent of the expected crops had been cut when the rainstorm moved in.

The intensity of the rain appeared to vary in this area, Brocke said. In the immediate Kendrick area rainfall of .45 inches was reported and just a few miles east of town a total of .55 inches was recorded. Up in the Southwick area the farmers continued to cut until dark and some gauges in that area had .20 inches Tuesday morning.

While not even a quarter of the expected crop is in, Brocke painted a gloomy picture for this year's pea harvest. "The peas are going to be very poor this year," he said. "Lentils are going to be about average, but I can't remember when the peas have been this bad," he said.

The peas are bleached and dirty Brocke said and he blamed that on the rains that fell in late June and the first few days of July. What happened was the rain caused the bleaching, but the moisture also gave the weeds in the fields a spurt of growth. When the combines moved into the fields to thresh the peas, the weeds were moist and in the process of cutting were squash and mixed with the crop, giving the peas a wet, sticky coating that also picked up other field dirt.

Lentils, it appeared, were not as affected as the peas, and the yields seem to be slightly better.

Jason Butler at Kendrick Rochdale said Tuesday afternoon that deliveries of wheat and barley were getting a start when the Monday afternoon storm came. What grain had come in, Butler said, "looked better than expected." He said test weights have been running "about what they should."

The harvest story was about the same at Lewiston Grain Growers' warehouses in Kendrick and Juliaetta, said Dareld Hazeltine. "We were just getting a good start with some wheat, and winter and spring barley coming in," he said. He noted that the quality of some of the wheat was down from average with the grain showing signs of stress and pinching. "No one's talking about yields right now," Hazeltine added.

From other areas in this region have come horror stories of 35 bushel wheat and 600 pound peas. Local farmers can only wait for the fields to dry and then get on with the harvest.

Marv Eveland to Teach At Calif. Science Session

Marvin Eveland, a science teacher at Kendrick High School, left Wednesday for the University of California at Berkeley where he will be working with the Dept. of Energy's Honor Student's Program as both an instructor and advisor for a group of 65 honor students from high schools in the United States and foreign countries.

The three-week program will involve both lab and field work.

Eveland, at the University's request, will be taking with him the material to construct another plastic life-size blue whale which he and his Kendrick students built this spring.

fective treatment can save your life. Cancer's warning signals are: 1) Change in bowel or bladder habits, 2) a sore that does not heal, 3) unusual bleeding or discharge, 4) thickening or lump in breast or elsewhere, 5) indigestion or difficulty in swallowing, 6) obvious change in a wart or mole, and 7) a nagging cough or hoarseness. If you develop a warning signal, consult a competent doctor. It could save your life.

The increasing incidence of breast cancer is frightening. Statistics confirm that one out of every nine women will ultimately develop this malady. This year, 500 Idaho women will be diagnosed with breast cancer, and there will be about 150 deaths. Because of this hazard, every woman over the age of 40 should have a mammogram every two years, and those of 50 years or older, one annually. This procedure discovers cancer very early, and could save your life, and/or perhaps your breasts.

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
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
