Halts Harvest A summer thunderstorm moved

across the area Monday afternoon accompanied by strong winds, lightning and rain. The rain brought harvest operations to a sudden halt in the Kendrick/Southwick area. The harvest of the 1992 pea, lentil and small grains was well underway when the storm struck.

Farmers had no idea of when they would be able to get back into the fields as the weather forecasts predicted continuing wet conditions for the next several days.

George Brocke, of Brocke and Sons, said Tuesday afternoon that approximately 15 to 20 percent of the expected crops had been cut been the rainstorm moved in,
