Myrtle K. Mael, 85, a long-time former Kendrick and Deary resident, died of age-related causes Thursday, July 23, 1992, at Gritman Medical Center in Moscow.

She was born Oct. 29, 1906, in Westlake, Idaho near Craigmont, the daughter of Chris and Marie Jelleberg Dahl. The family moved to Park, Idaho, south of Helmer in Latah County where she grew up and attended school.

She married Harold Mael on Oct. 6, 1925, at Moscow. The couple lived at Park until 1949, when they moved to Deary.

Following her husband's death in 1973, she moved to Kendrick, where she lived until April of 1992, when she moved to the Regency Retirement Center in Lewiston.

She enjoyed crocheting, flower gardening and reading. She was a member of the Golden Sunset Senior Citizens in Kendrick.

Survivors include four sons, Bernard Mael of Lewiston, Arnold Mael of Deary, Ronald Mael of Bovill and Roger Mael of Orofino; three daughters, Opal Hamilton of Ahsahka, Hazel Candler of Kendrick and Carol Craig of Lewiston; two sisters, Grace Wood of Deary and Ruth Shove of Moscow; 32 grandchildren, 56 great-grandchildren and three great-great-grandchildren.

A daughter, Jeanette Riebold, died in 1978. A sister, Helen Dahl, also died previously.

Graveside services were held on Saturday at the Pinecrest Cemetery in Deary, with Rev. Carl Kinne of the Deary Community Church officiating.

Grange hears results Of local trade survey

Among the goals for its first year as a contributor to the local Gem Community, the Kendrick-Julietta Community Development Association listed need for a trade survey of local consumer attitudes and practices as they affect the local business community.

Such a survey was in time locally designed and administered, with major help from Potlatch Telephone Company and a group of enthusiastic Kendrick High School students. On July 7, the results of the telephone survey, conducted in May, were shared with Kendrick Grange, which has consistently supported and assisted in the program of the Development Association.

Potlatch Telephone Company had provided a random list of 100 local residence phone numbers representative of the community, including the ridges. A team of high school students, headed up by Anna Klatt and Cade Konen, began calling the randomly selected, anonymous numbers. The survey team, which also included Marlene Henson, Melinda Cook, Levi Eckroth, and Stephanie Hill, reached 69 of the numbers provided, and 53 of these persons contacted agreed to respond to the seventeen question survey, for a net response of 53%, not bad for a telephone survey, we're told.

The drafters of the survey format (an adult advisor and the high school students) caution the reader that this was a first time effort and is not touted as scientifically reliable. It does, however, provide food for thought, both for local business people and for consumers.

It came as no surprise to learn that 90% of the survey respondents sometimes shop outside the Kendrick-Julietta area, 71% of them by their own estimate spending a third or more of their shopping dollars outside the community. Some 14% say they spend nearly all of their shopping dollars elsewhere.

The association was interested in learning their reasons for shopping outside the area. Of those responding, 53% said it was for better selection of goods, and 44% said it was for better price. Better quality and better service were not considerations.

The survey then attempted to measure how people spend their dollars at home. Listed in the order of their success at attracting local dollars, the retail businesses looked at included those dealing in groceries, gasoline, prescription drugs, gardening and home maintenance supplies, and clothing.

Ninety-eight percent of respondents shop for groceries in the Kendrick-Julietta area, 73% of them spending a third or more of their grocery dollars right here at home. About 27% spend nearly all their grocery dollars here in the community.

Ninety-eight percent of respondents shop for the family car do so locally, with 42% of the respondents using a local self-service convenience store, 18% a card-lock pump system, and 29% a combination of the two. Only 4 respondents indicated they buy gas from a traditional full-service station.

Seventy-three percent of the respondents buy prescription drugs from the local pharmacy, while about one out of four buy their prescriptions elsewhere, mostly from a pharmacy in another town. Only one respondent shopped for prescription drugs by mail.

Less successful at attracting local dollars were retail businesses dealing in gardening, home maintenance supplies and in clothing.

Julietta Park Meeting Is Monday, Aug. 3

Anyone interested in establishing a city park in Juliaetta is urged to attend a public meeting at Juliaetta city hall on Monday, August 3, at 7:00 p. m.

Fifty-nine percent of the survey respondents purchase some garden and home maintenance supplies locally. Of those who do shop locally, 68% of them buy a third or more of such supplies here at home while 32% of them make less than a third of such purchases locally. Twenty-two respondents do not shop locally at all for such supplies but instead go elsewhere, chiefly to Lewiston.

Only 50% of the survey respondents buy clothing items from local retailers. Of the 26 who do buy clothing locally, 54% spend less than a third of their clothing dollars here. Only 8 respondents spend more than a third of their clothing dollars in the Kendrick-Julietta area. Of the 26 respondents who don't shop for clothing locally, nearly all shop in Lewiston or Moscow or other towns. Only 5 respondents indicated they shopped by mail.

The telephone trade survey also took a look at one service business, that dealing in insurance. Sixty-five percent of the respondents purchase some insurance through local agents; eleven individuals shop elsewhere, 5 of them by mail.

An attempt to generate an overall evaluation of retail businesses in the Kendrick-Julietta area resulted in the following: There was a consistently high rate of approval for the quality of merchandise and service offered by local retailers. Thirty-one percent of the respondents, however, rated selection and variety of goods as unfavorable, and nearly half rated pricing unfavorably.

While nearly all respondents rated local retailers as friendly or very friendly and their attitude as positive, a significant number of respondents find business hours inconvenient and the merchant's show of appreciation sometimes less than enthusiastic.

About half the respondents had had a local retail store special order something for them within the last year, with an average of 4 times in the year and a maximum of 15. About half of those not requesting such service indicated they would if they knew it was available.

Sixty percent of the respondents found banking hours to be convenient. Ten respondents, however, would like to see later afternoon closing hours.

The students conducting the survey were pleased to see overwhelming support for the idea of having a teen entertainment center in the community.

The survey concluded with three open-ended questions. When asked what one thing would cause the respondent or his family to spend more at retail and services business in the Kendrick-Julietta area, 13 of 31 persons responding indicated lower, more competitive pricing would help keep them shopping at home. Ten respondents indicated that better selection and variety of merchandise would help; and five indicated that longer or different business hours would help.

When asked to identify a retail or service business that the community lacks and that they would support with their dollars, the greatest number indicated, not surprisingly, a variety store. And despite what should be their obvious presence, about 20% of the respondents called for a grocery store, a hardware store, an auto repair shop, or a clothing store. Garnering at least two votes each were a sporting goods store, fitness center, indoor swimming pool, RV park, hotel/motel, and a retirement center. Other businesses identified included a craft store, a gardening center, feed store, 24-hour convenience store, a spa, a "really nice restaurant," a licensed day care center, and an art gallery.

Given one last chance to comment on the local retail and service business scene, about half of the respondents had nothing to add. A theme of approval was expressed by those who did respond, however, citing their pride in a neat and tidy community and their appreciation for the friendly business people who are willing to please. Noting that local stores "have everything you need, pretty much," respondents point out that "it's really nice—everything's fine," and that Kendrick and Juliaetta are among the small towns of Idaho that might survive.

While acknowledging that more competition is needed, respondents also point out that people "need to purchase things here to keep the town and the schools going." And one respondent even questions whether you really do save money by going to Lewiston or Moscow.

All in all, the project appears to have been worth the time and effort spent on it. Thanks to all who made it possible. Idaho Travel Council Awards \$1.4 Million for State Promotion Projects
The Idaho Travel Council funds this week awarded \$1.4 million in Idaho Regional Travel and Convention Grant funds to 46 regional travel committees, chambers of commerce and other travel-oriented, non-profit organizations. Fifty requests for almost \$2 million were reviewed by the council at a two-day meeting which concluded July 22 at the Owyhee Plaza in Boise. The grant program is administered by the Idaho Department of Commerce.
"Private industry and the public sector work together to promote Idaho through this program and it's working," said Idaho Department of Commerce Director James V. Hawkins. "As of July 1, lodging industry revenues are up 12.3 percent statewide. The travel industry is to be congratulated for their contributions to tourism's growth."
Since 1982, the Idaho Regional Travel and Convention Grant program has evolved from a \$400,000 program to a \$1.4 million program. More than \$8 million has been awarded to local tourism promotion efforts since the program's inception.
The \$1.4 million in ITC grant funds will be matched 50% by local and private sources.
