Kendrick-Julietta Schools Open Aug. 26

Kendrick Joint School District No. 283 announced this week that school will resume after a summer vacation Wednesday, August 26. Anyone with a student who is new to the district is asked to contact the school as quickly as possible so that records may be sent for.

Registration for high school students will be Tuesday, August 25th as follows:

Juniors and Seniors: 9:00 to 10:00 a. m.

Freshmen and Sophomores: 10:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon.

8th Graders will register the day school begins.

7th Graders will have an orientation meeting at the high school on Monday, Aug. 24, at 7:00 p. m.

All students will obtain lockers when they register. The school is not responsible for lost or stolen articles.

The hot lunch program will feature the usual delicious meals served daily at the following costs:

Adults \$1.55

Grades 7-12 1.20

Grades K-6 1.10

If any student wishes to buy extra milk only, they may do so at the cost of 15 cents for a half pint. There will NOT be any charges allowed on milk.

The school district does not provide medical insurance to automatically pay for medical expenses when students are injured at school. This is the responsibility of the parent or legal guardians. Students need insurance verification and Health Physicals to participate in any extracurricular activity. The district does make student medical insurance available to families for their individual purchase. Forms may be obtained at the high school office during any working day—7:45 a. m. to 4:00 p. m. The following insurance rates apply to the Preferred Option:

High School: \$75.00 for football only

17.00 for School Time Plan — All Sports except football

65.00 for Full Time Plan — All Sports Except football

14.00 for Elementary — School time plan.

There is also a Budget Option that is available at lower prices.

The district also has available a dental accident insurance for \$7.00 to cover students while at school or engaging in school activities. This, of course, is an optional plan.

Everett D. Custer, 88, Formerly of Julianna, Passes August 5

Everett D. Custer of Clarkston, a retired Northern Pacific Railroad employee, died August 5, of complications following open heart surgery at Sacred Heart Medical Center in Spokane. He was 88.

Custer was born Jan. 31, 1904, in Harlan, Neb., and moved with his family to Julianna in 1918. He attended schools in Harlan and Julianna.

While in Julianna, he started working for the Northern Pacific Railroad and worked for the railroad for 45 years, the last 30 years as a track supervisor.

He married Marie Gruell in Lewiston on Nov. 17, 1923. They raised a niece, Leona Gruell.

He and his wife moved to Troy, Idaho in 1940 and lived there until 1950, when they moved to Pullman. After his retirement from the railroad in 1969, they moved to Clarkston where they had lived since.

He enjoyed gardening, especially cultivating roses, and fishing. He attended the Clarkston First Christian Church (Disciples of Christ).

Custer is survived by his widow at the family home. The couple would have celebrated their 70th year of marriage in 1993.

Two sisters died previously. Services were held Saturday at Malcom's Brower-Wann Chapel in Lewiston with the Rev. Sarasopa Enari, pastor of the Clarkston First Christian Church officiating. Burial was at Vineland Cemetery in Clarkston.

Tigers to Draw Gear Sunday, Aug. 16; Practice Monday

This year's KHS Tiger football team will draw its gear Sunday evening, Aug. 16, and have its first turnout of the season Monday morning, said new head football coach Kevin Driskill.

Those players turning out are asked to draw their gear Sunday evening in the following way:

Seniors: 6:00 p. m.

Juniors: 6:10 p. m.

Sophomores: 6:20 p. m.

Freshmen: 6:30

After being issued their equipment, the team will be on the field the next morning at 6:00 a. m. for the first workout. There will be another practice from 8 to 10 p. m. that same evening. This two-day practice will continue on until school begins, Driskill said, if it does not interfere with the harvest.

Driskill knows he and this year's Tigers have a big pair of shoes and a lot to "live up to" in following the state champions of last season.

While Kendrick's premier backfield of Ryan Blewett, quarterback; and running backs Jarod Silflow and Cade Konen are gone, the Tigers will have a good, big, experienced line. "I know a lot of people think we're going to really be down this year," the new coach said, "but I think we're going to be contenders."

Driskill should know about the potential of all the teams in the Whitepine League. He was the assistant coach at Deary last season and had the opportunity to see all of Kendrick's opponents in action. He thinks Highland, his high school alma mater, will be strong this year, as will the always tough Deary Mustangs.

Driskill said Tuesday that he expects about 40 to 45 players to turn out for football this season.

Kendrick opens the season against Troy Friday, Aug. 28 at Troy.

For New Emergency Services Building—

Survey Results Indicate Kendrick Could Qualify for State Block Grant Funds

Results of a door-to-door survey recently conducted by members of the Volunteer Fire Dept. and the Emergency Medical Unit indicates that Kendrick could financially qualify for a block grant from the Idaho Dept. of Commerce to assist in the construction of a new emergency services building for the City of Kendrick. The city is interested in building a new structure that would house the fire department vehicles, the ambulance, the related equipment for both groups as well as a meeting and training room. Preliminary plans call for the building to be constructed on the back street east of

the swimming pool and behind R. E. Magnuson Insurance, Farm Bureau Insurance, Hayden & Ross, Snyder Home Center, etc. Estimated cost of such a building has been placed at \$150,000.

Naturally the city is interested in getting as much financial support as possible. The Idaho Department of Commerce has a program that makes block grants available for this type of project. However, to qualify for the application to be considered, the state has requirements that must be met. One of the first is that over half of the persons living within the area making the application, in this case the City of Kendrick, fall into the lower to moderate income bracket. Actually the city must present acceptable evidence that over half of 90 percent of the living units (these are households), in the city limits fall into the low or moderate income levels.

New Teachers Join KHS Faculty

Four new teachers will join the faculty at Kendrick High School this year, said principal Gale Vallem Tuesday morning.

Of interest to sports fans is the hiring of Kevin Driskill to be the Business Education instructor at KHS and also the head football of the Kendrick Tigers. Driskill will take place of Ken Swanger who led the Tigers to the State A-4 football championship last season. Swanger accepted a position in the Pullman, Washington schools this year.

Driskill is a 1987 graduate of Highland High School and a 1991 graduate of the University of Idaho. He played a year of college football at Whittier College in Los Angeles, Cal. before transferring to the U. of I.

Last season Kevin was an assistant coach at Deary High School.

Tim Hardy, a graduate of Shoshone High School and the University of Idaho, will be Kendrick's new Vocational Agriculture instructor, replacing Jim Nelson.

Joanne Gertje, a Kendrick High School graduate and a graduate of the University of Idaho, will be the new music instructor at KHS.

Joining the faculty at Kendrick this year will also be Karen Kirkham, a graduate of Lapwai High School and the University of Idaho. Mrs. Kirkham held a similar position as counselor at Colton last year.

At Julianna Elementary School, Angie Holington, another KHS alumnae and a graduate of Lewis-Clark State College, will serve as a part-time first grade teacher.

This is no-host luncheon meeting.

Obtaining this information proved difficult. At first the city mailed out questionnaires which they asked to have completed and returned, anonymously, of course. This was a failure as not nearly 90 percent response was obtained and the city was stymied.

It was at this point that members of the fire department and the EMT unit volunteered to conduct a door-to-door survey to obtain the needed information. After many evenings and many hours of effort, the men and women of the fire department and EMT unit completed the canvass of the town and on Tuesday evening of this week presented the results to the Kendrick city council.

The survey results indicate that over half (51% actually), of family units in the city fall into the low to moderate income level. Thus the city now feels it meets the financial criteria for a block grant application.

Just what is below the moderate income level, as set by the state of Idaho's Dept. of Commerce, varies depending on the number of people in what is termed the "living unit". For a family of three, low to moderate income is classed as below \$19,850 gross income. For a family of four the figure is below \$22,100.

Now the city council must take this information given to them by the firemen and EMT's and incorporate it, together with other required information into the application for the block grant. The deadline for application is Nov. 1.

The block grant, if approved and awarded, would not pay for the complete cost of the proposed building. The city would have to provide funds of its own in either real money or in-kind service such as volunteer help, donations of material, labor, etc. This could come from organizations, groups or individuals.

For now, said Dave Klatt, a council member, the city will begin its search for matching funds.

The city council said it is very grateful to the members of the volunteer fire department and the EMT unit for all the work that went into this survey.

program, says a 1990 telephone survey of adult Idahoans revealed that only one in six consumed at least five servings of fruits and vegetables a day. The survey was conducted by the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare and the Centers for Disease Control.

Keim said a third of the respondents ate one or two, half ate three or four, but one in 50 ate only one—or no—serving of fruits or vegetables. True to their reputation, Californians outscore Idahoans in healthy eating—or claim they do—with one-third asserting they consumed at least five servings of fruits or vegetables daily in 1989.

But both today's Idahoans and Californians compare favorably with the second National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey conducted from 1976 to 1980. Keim said the "NHANES II" data showed nearly half the population consuming no fruits and more than one in five eating no vegetables on a given day. Keim said nutritionists don't really care whether you eat oranges, peas, potatoes or strawberries. "The plan is just to get people to eat more fruits and vegetables, period."

Not only are the foods high in important vitamins like A and C, but "some research is showing that people who consume this level of fruits and vegetables have a lower risk of developing cancer," she said. They generally also have an easier time maintaining a healthy body weight.

A serving might be one piece of raw fruit, a half cup of canned or cooked vegetables, a quarter cup of dried fruit, or 6 ounces of juice, she said. But if you drench it with fats or sugars, it doesn't count. Keim said the recommendations apply to all adults and to children as young as two. She said kids are born with a sweet tooth and "that's probably for survival." Celery, after all, won't take you far on a tiger hunt.

But a Pennsylvania State University study found that first and second graders given a choice between cake and a banana actually showed no preference. Third graders, however, were beginning to favor the cake, and among the sixth-graders a substantial resistance to fruit was building.

Keim hopes parents will quietly and persistently model good nutrition habits for their kids. "If you eat vegetables and don't make a big deal out of it, the kids will eventually eat them," she said. "Don't make it a power struggle. The kids want to imitate you."

She encourages parents to include their young children in meal planning and grocery shopping. "Let them get ownership of the meal and have some decision in it," she said. "And if they like vegetables raw, serve them that way."

Whatever you do, Keim said, don't bribe them with desserts. "If you do, they'll put a value on what you're bribing them with—not the vegetable."

For special flavor put a piece of chocolate or a vanilla bean in the coffee filter before you add the coffee.
