Grange Considers Federal, Regional, Local Issues

At its August 18 meeting, Kendrick Grange considered a number of issues and elected officers for the coming year. Ruth Heimgartner presented for consideration three Clearwater Power Company resolutions adopted by its Board of Directors on July 8.

The first of these resolutions calls for revision of the Endangered Species Act to provide mitigation for economic loss and social devastation to individuals and communities. The resolution also calls for putting "economic and biological reasonableness" into the actions and activities pursued under the act. It calls as well for establishing principles of resource economics within the act.

The second resolution calls for counteracting and abandoning the unproductive, destructive, and environmentally unsound practice of drawdowns. The third resolution calls for a stop to surrendering hydro electric production for salmon. Grangers were urged to consider the issues and to write members of Congress in support of the positions taken by our local REA company.

Granger Cecil Dean urged members to contact state legislators regarding the injustice of laws permitting trespassers to sue for injury or other damages even though the land on which the injury or loss is suffered is clearly posted regarding trespassing.

With an eye to local infrastructure concerns, Master Frank Jacobson informed members that the State Highway Board would be touring through our area on Friday, August 28, and will be available for consultation at the Juliaetta City Hall from 8:00 to 8:20 a. m. and at the Grange Hall in Kendrick from 8:35-8:55. Representatives of the two city councils and the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association will be meeting with the State Board. Once again Juliaetta will request that the speed limit on the state highway through the city be reduced to 25 mph.

Jacobson also reported that the K-J Community Development Association Board of Directors has endorsed three primary goals for housing development within the cities of Kendrick and Juliaetta: moderate priced housing for families, to rent or own; moderate priced housing for seniors able to live independently in a congregate setting; and transient housing, including recreational vehicle facilities, a motel/hotel, and bed-and-breakfast type overnight lodgings. A fourth goal, to be considered later, concerns upgrading housing that is in a poor state of repair.

Officers for the coming year were elected as follows: Overseer, Manning Onstott; Lecturer, Virginia Jacobson; Steward, Wayne Heimgartner; Assistant Steward, Cecil Dean; Lady Assistant Steward, Maxine Foster; Chaplin, Ruby Craig; Treasurer, Ruth Heimgartner; Secretary, Vera Hutcheson; Gatekeeper, Ross Armitage; Ceres, Elsie Onstott; Pomona, Margaret Olsen, and Flora, Henny Reil.

Frank Jacobson, who asked not to be nominated, will continue to serve as Master until a successor is elected. Jacobson has served for four years.

Vera Hutcheson and Grace Curtis were named as alternates to this year's Idaho State Grange convention and will attend instead of delegates Frank and Virginia Jacobson.

At its next regular meeting on September 1, the Grange will hear a report from Robin Baumgartner of Deary on the national FFA convention held in Chicago. The Grange will also hear and take action on resolutions to be considered at the Idaho State Grange convention.

Plans for Juliaetta Centennial Park Revealed; Recreation District OKs Funds

The dream of a new park in Juliaetta that would serve not only that town but the entire community took a giant step toward reality Thursday evening, August 20, when the Kendrick-Juliaetta Recreation District approved a grant of \$20,000 for the construction of the facility. The board of director of the recreation district gave its approval at the annual meeting and budget hearing. The request for the funds and the presentation of plans for the park was made by officers and members of the Juliaetta Centennial Park Project, Inc., a non-profit organization formed specifically to build the new park.

A new park for Juliaetta has been a long-sought goal for many of its residents, but despite much work it never seemed to be within reasonable grasp until after the Juliaetta Centennial Committee was formed and did such a magnificent effort on the May 2 centennial. With the momentum and enthusiasm generated by the centennial, it was decided by some of the committee to try to channel this spirit into a park project. The result was the formation of the Juliaetta Centennial Park Project, Inc. which was first formed, and then incorporated after a series of community meetings.

This is the group that will direct the construction of the park. Officers of the corporation are Tammy Hitchcock and Dirk Hammond, co-chairmen; Nancy Fey, Secretary, and James Theil, Treasurer. The officers will report to a fifteen member

Tigers Open Grid Season Friday at Troy

Coach Kevin Driskill sends his 1992 version of the Kendrick Tigers out on the football Friday night, August 28, as the Tigers travel to Troy to open the nine game season. Kendrick is the defending Class A-4 State champions, but last year's team was depleted badly by graduation losses. Even with the lack of older, more experienced players, Coach Driskill is still cautiously optimistic about the coming season.

Thirty-four players turned out for football this year, Driskill said Tuesday morning. "We've got tons of sophomores this year," the coach said. Driskill will probably be starting an all-sophomore backfield at Troy Friday night. Craig Tefft will be handling the quarterback position with Phil Brown in the fullback slot and Taj Anderson as tailback. The picture is a little brighter, as far as experience goes, on the line this year with Mike Morgan, Mark Hutcheson and Ryan Heier back from the championship team. Joining the starters from last year will be Byron Walker, Brian Sillow, and John Wegner. The average weight of the line will be in the 190-195 range, Driskill estimated.

Coach Driskill answered "not good", when asked about the depth of his reserve strength. "We'll be real young this season," he said, "but we'll be strong on the line and I think things will come together."

Driskill said he didn't know too much about his team's Friday opponents, except that they will probably be a young team, too. He still considers Highland and Deary to be powers in the Whitepine League this season, but adds, "We'll be contenders, too."

Assisting with the coaching duties this year will be Clarke Bradley and Kyle Staples.

According to Driskill there are no changes in the rules this year that fans will probably notice.

As for the Tigers' offense this season, Driskill said fans will probably be seeing more of a ground game with more double tight ends on the offense plays.

The Tigers will be at home for the first game on Friday, Sept. 4 when the Highland Huskies are on the KHS field.

The proposed park will be located on 7.55 acres of land to be purchased from Neale Hoisington just across the Burlington Northern Railroad tracks. It is across the highway and south of the Floyd Heimgartner home on Highway 3.

The park will be completed over a five-year period at an estimated cost of \$168,027.00. The committee expects to spend \$51,485.00 the first year. This first year money will be obtained from:

\$20,000 from the J-K Recreation District;

\$0,885 from in-kind services (such as volunteer labor, donated material, use of donated machinery, etc.);

\$23,600 cash. This cash includes a gift of \$15,000 from Rich and Tammy Hitchcock for the purchase of the land from Neale Hoisington. The Hitchcocks had made this generous offer contingent on the funds granted by the recreation district. This contingency was met Thursday evening, \$6,000 will come from the Juliaetta Centennial Fund, \$2,600 will come from the Idaho Dept. of Commerce Gem Community grant that was made to the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Assoc.

When the project is completed, the city of Juliaetta has agreed to accept the responsibility for the upkeep and maintenance of the park, when it can afford it. At present time the city is directing most of its energy and resources into the new water system.

When completed the proposed park would provide not only the city of Juliaetta, but also the entire surrounding community with a much needed facility. This is one of the reasons the Recreation District gave its backing to the project. Plans call for not only the usual park equipment such as benches, playground equipment, etc., but also for a new baseball/softball diamond, tennis court, black-topped basketball court, volleyball court, a shelter for tables and for gatherings and also hand-capped access.

After acquiring the land, the committee will also have to acquire a right-of-way agreement with the Burlington Northern Railroad. Dirk Hammond said the railroad company has already been contacted. Hammond said the railroad's first figure for this access was \$11,000, but he (Hammond) felt a less expensive agreement could be obtained.

Hammond added that once an agreement is made with the railroad, work could begin in clearing the land and making initial preparations. He said the committee will meet regularly with the Juliaetta city council to keep the city informed as to progress. The committee will also report regularly to the Recreation District.

Hammond also said that since this is a project that will benefit all of the area, Kendrick and ridge residents are encouraged to give support any way they choose. Those wanting to offer help may contact Dirk or Tammy with their offers and/or suggestions.

"The committee is really pleased and appreciates the help and support it has received from Juliaetta residents," Hammond said Tuesday afternoon.

The Centennial Park committee will meet Monday evening, Aug. 31 at 7:00 in the Juliaetta Community Church. All interested are most welcome to attend.
