Juliaetta and Kendrick Councils, Community Leaders Met with Transportation Board

The State Highways Transportation Board: John Combo, Leon Smith, Jr., and Mike Mitchell, and associates Jim Clayton, Larry Vanover, Mary Detmar, Keith Green and Jack Coe toured the area Friday, August 28 and met briefly with community officials and leaders in both towns who presented the state group with their ideas, suggestions, plans, and requests for aid for future projects.

At its first stop, which was in Juliaetta the state group met with Juliaetta city council members, Tam Hitchcock the co-chairman of the Juliaetta Centennial Park Committee and representatives of the J-K Community Development Association, and other interested citizens.

All met first at the First Bank of Pizza in Juliaetta where Mayor Jeff Lohman presented detailed plans for the proposed Juliaetta Centennial Park on the west end of town.

Tigers Rip Troy 36-6 In Season Opener; Highland Here Friday

Coach Kevin Driskill wasn't completely satisfied after his Kendrick Tigers opened the '92 season last Friday night at Troy, but he added that "Well, it was a 36-6 win," and he was pleased about that. The Tigers struck quickly against the Trojans and had scored on two touchdowns in the first 2:15 minutes of the contest.

On the first play of the game, Kendrick's John Wegner took the opening kickoff and handed off to Chad Helmgartner on a reverse and Helmgartner just ran away for 85 yards down the right sideline for the touchdown. Chad never had a hand layed on him and the action took just 14 seconds.

Troy was held to downs on its first series from scrimmage. Troy's punt on the fourth down was gathered in by Wegner on the Tiger 35-yard line. John picked up a couple of key blocks and ran 65 yards for another Tiger tally and it was 14-0 with only 2:15 gone in the first quarter. Taj Anderson had added a two-point conversion.

It was Anderson who added another Tiger score in the first quarter on a right end sweep that took him 18 yards and after the PTA conversion pass attempt failed the Tigers had an 18-0 lead.

Troy's defense settled down and held the Tigers scoreless in both the second and third quarters.

While the young sophomore backfield of Craig Tefft, quarterback, and Anderson and Phil Brown didn't score in the second and third, they did gain ground with Brown finishing the game with 112 yards in 13 carries and Anderson picking up 88 yards on 16 carries, mostly on outside runs.

The Tigers added to the score in the final period of play. Wide receiver Chad Helmgartner took a nice pass from Tefft to go 14 yards and then with just five seconds left in the game Brown banged over the middle for six more points.

Troy's Preston Giovannetta scored the Trojan's lone touchdown with 4:52 left in the fourth quarter.

Tiger coach Driskill came away from the opening game with two impressions: 1. that Troy was a better, tougher team than they were thought to be, and 2. "We can learn to win better than we did." He said some of the practice sessions this week will be devoted to special team work.

Highland Here Friday

While the Tigers were defeating the Trojans 36-6 Friday night, the Highland Huskies were up at Deary and received a 56-14 battering from the Mustangs. Highland will be at Kendrick this Friday night and despite the one-sided loss to Deary, Driskill doesn't sell the Huskies' chances lightly. "They're a young team and they're going to get better," he said. Driskill obviously does not intend to let his Tigers rest.

Lohman explained Juliaetta's need for the Transportation Department's involvement in the park's plans as well as current needs such as pedestrian crossings to the Juliaetta Market and the future park entrance.

Research to develop a walking path on the old "flour mill run" that still partly exists was presented by councilman Dick Groseclose. "There would be a need to fill in several places to re-create this natural path, Groseclose told the group, and it (the path) would provide a safer passage way on the outer side of the guard rail to the Juliaetta Market and the park for pedestrian traffic.

Mayor Lohman also told the state group that the community would like to reduce the speed limit through town from 35 to 25 mph. Responding to this request the board expressed concern about the availability of law enforcement to enforce a lower speed limit, and felt that would present a problem.

The Juliaetta representatives also told the Transportation board that there is a need for a culvert on the east end of town to stop flooding and mud slides in the small park area where the new water project will be located.

Mike Mitchell suggested the National Guard be contacted to inquire if it would be able to help on any of the construction of the walk way or the park to help cut costs.

The members of the Transportation Board were supportive of Juliaetta's plans and will research the requests, then get back to the council.

The board's next stop was at the Grange Hall in Kendrick where Kendrick Mayor Jerry Brown welcomed the visitors and then explained the need to resurface the highway through Kendrick not only to improve the aesthetic appearance of the highway, but also help eliminate noise created by the rough surface. Years of build-up from past re-surfacing projects has created an elevation in the center of the highway to the extent that in some locations the middle of the road is higher than the curbing.

Bob Hassold emphasized that the highway wasn't designed to carry the traffic load that passes through this area, therefore the road was just not holding up. Hassold also expressed concern for the portion of Highway 89 that hasn't been re-done between Troy and the Kendrick entrance.

State board member Jim Clayton reported on behalf of the board that the state has been concerned about the City of Kendrick and it's needs as well as for the four miles of Highway 12 on this side of Arrow Junction. Several concerns must be addressed before the Transportation Department can make its plans.

One of these concerns is the need for the City of Kendrick to handle the expense involved in improving and replacing water and sewer lines on main street which would need to be accomplished before a new highway is constructed.

Regarding the problem on Highway 12 east of Arrow Junction, the board said that if the railroad remains, a bridge to cross the creek would have to be built, but if the railway is abandoned, fill could be used to widen the road. Obviously the costs are very different for each method of construction.
