Tigers Outrace Huskies 52-42 For Second Win

In a wide-open offensive game Friday night on the Kendrick High School field, the KHS Tigers outscored the visiting Highland Huskies 52-42 for their second victory of the young season. Kendrick looked good in the Whitepine League game, but were pushed all the way and had to come from behind twice before they could nail the victory down.

Highland served notice early that they were there to win as the Huskies took the opening kickoff and moved down field from their own 30 to the 36. A pass play put the Huskies on the Tiger 36 and Jeremy Savage moved down to the Tiger 14 on a sweep play. One play later Savage lateraled to Chad Zenner on the 14 who ran in to score for Highland. Savage ran over the conversion and the score was 8-0 with 10:44 left in the quarter.

Chad Heimgartner, who was going to have an outstanding evening, took the return kickoff from the 15 out to the Tiger 35. Taj Anderson picked up a Tiger first down and two plays later the Tigers fumbled the ball away. Kendrick's defense stiffened on the next series ran by Highland and the Huskies had to punt in a 4th and 9 situation. John Wegner picked a first down for the Tigers and on another play ran to the Husky 25 before being hauled down. A penalty was called against Highland that moved the ball to the 10 yard line. Craig Tefft passed to Taj Anderson who was pushed out of bounds at the 1 yard line. On the next play Josh Hudson ran the pigskin over for the touchdown and when Phil Brown boomed across the goal line for two extra points the game was tied 8-8 with 4:26 still remaining in the first quarter.

Highland took to the air to set up its next touchdown. The Huskies moved the ball to about mid-field on the kick off return but were called on a clipping penalty. A short completed pass and a run brought Highland to the Tiger 45. Another pass and the Huskies were down on the KHS 1 and the next play Lucas Peery scored. Savage ran over the extra points and the Huskies were ahead again 16-8.

Chad Heimgartner answered that Highland touchdown with one of his own, taking the kickoff on the Tiger 20 and moving up to the 30 where he got two great blocks by his teammates that set him free to gallop all the way, 80 yards, for a score. The point after touchdown failed and the Huskies held a 16-14 lead as the first quarter ended.

Kendrick took the lead back early in the second quarter with Wegner running to the Highland 35 on the scoring series. Heimgartner brought it down to the 16 on a sweep. Hudson went straight up the middle to the 13 and a Tefft pass to Brian Silflow got the ball down to the 1 where Hudson packed it over on the next play. The extra point try pass failed. But with 9:50 still remaining in the half the Tigers led for the first time 20-16.

That lead didn't last long against the scrappy Highland squad who let a fine KHS kickoff roll into the end zone and then started from the 20 with a pass that brought the ball to the Husky 44. From there Jeremy Savage broke off tackle and went 56 yards down the right sideline to score. A run attempt for the extra points was halted by the Tigers but Highland had the advantage again 22-20 with 8:54 left in the half. Kendrick put its offense into high gear after that surprising Highland touchdown. After a short period of plays when the referees called a seemingly endless number of penalties against both teams (the umpires moved the ball more than the Tigers or the Huskies did), Kendrick began to attack with Silflow picking up good on one play, Anderson making a fine run, and Wegner packing the ball down to the Husky 13. Phil Brown just simply bulldozed the ball to the 7 with Husky players hanging all over him, Josh Hudson went up the middle to the 4 1/2 yard line and then Anderson drove to within 18 inches of the goal line. There the Tigers faced a 4th and inches to go. On the next and very important play, Tefft handed off to Hudson who bounced into the end zone with plenty of room to spare. The Tigers again called on Brown who shook off tacklers to score the extra points and the Tigers took a lead they never gave up 28-22.

The reliable veteran lineman Mike Morgan keyed the next touchdown for the Tigers as he broke through the Husky defense and sacked their quarterback for an 11 yard loss as Highland was trying to pass its way out of a 3rd and 10 situation. Highland was forced to punt and when Kendrick took possession, Tefft hit Heimgartner with a pass and Chad gathered it in and went 45 yards to score. Kendrick picked up 2 more points with Brown running over the PAT.

The score was 36-22 at the half.

Terri Walker Is Flawless As Week's First Football Forecast Winner

The lady football fans got off to a good start in Kendrick's Weekly football Forecast this week as Terri Walker predicted all of the fourteen games correctly in National Football League competition. Terri was way out in front of the other 82 entries turned into Jeff Smith at The Town and Country Diner.

Lee Heimgartner came in a respectable second place with only two wrong selections.

Terri can claim her 82 certifiable points from the Diner. Jeff was pleased at the 82 entries for the opening week—far better than that of last season. Jeff said the Pittsburgh win over Houston seemed to give forecast players the most trouble.

This week's forecast is being sponsored by Wally Butler of Farm Bureau Insurance in Kendrick.

Out-on-the Limb—

Of course Jeff Smith was gloating over his correct out-on-the-limb prediction last week. He called the Cincinnati-Seattle game correctly and now has a 1-0 record. This week Smith says the Indianapolis Colts are going to defeat the Houston Oilers at Indianapolis.

This season Jeff is sharing his out-on-the limb duties with Wally Butler and Don Chrystal, but Smith cautions readers not to take Wally or Don's guessing too seriously as neither have the skill and knowledge he possesses.

All that stuff aside, Chrystal says San Diego will beat the Broncos at Denver. Wally, always the loyal Seahawks fan, says Seattle will win over Kansas City at K. C.

Both teams played good defensive ball in the third quarter. Kendrick drove deep inside the Highland ten at one point but the Husky line held solid and the Tigers yielded the ball in four downs. Highland moved the ball from deep in its own territory down to the 14 where Peery reversed field nicely and scored. Savage made the conversion run and with 3:53 left in the third Highland had closed to 36-30.

That third quarter touchdown by the Huskies sparked the Tiger offense back into action and Kendrick took a Highland punt and began an other scoring drive with Brown advancing the ball on a straight up-front power play four yards. Wegner came through the line down to the Highland 29 where on the next play Heimgartner shook off two tackles and went 29 yards to score. Tefft passed to Wegner for the extra points. Kendrick was now back up 44-30 with 10:33 left in the game.

With 9:45 left in the game, Highland fumbled and the Tigers recovered on its own 45. From there Tefft dropped back, found Heimgartner open on about the line of scrimmage and passed to him. Chad took the pass and went 55 yards for the final Tiger score with Taj Anderson taking a Tefft pass for the extra points. The Tigers, leading 52-30, took some of the pressure off late in the final period and the fighting Huskies responded by scoring 2 touchdowns, one on a 30 yard run by Peery and another on a 54 yard run by Savage.

Tigers at Genesee Friday— After being pushed all the way by the determined Highland Huskies last week, Kendrick gets what may be a slightly easier opponent this Friday night when Coach Kevin Driskill takes his Tigers up to Genesee for a 7:00 o'clock match with the winless Bulldogs. In other action in the Whitepine league last week the Deary Mustangs didn't need even a full three quarters to rout the outgunned Kootenai Warriors 61-16.

Daniel B. Whybark, 88, Retired Kendrick Farmer, Dies September 1

Daniel Raymond Whybark, a retired Kendrick area farmer and a Clarkston resident, died of congestive heart failure Tuesday, Sept. 1, at the Clarkston Care Center. He was 88.

He was born June 13, 1904, on Fix Ridge, near Juliaetta, to Daniel W. and Ida Bell (Dot) Helm Whybark. During his childhood, the family lived at Juliaetta, Boise, on Big Bear Ridge near Kendrick and in the Walla Walla area. He attended the Pilot Rock School near Juliaetta.

After completing his schooling, he worked in the lumber industry and farmed at Gifford, northeast of Culesac, and along Cedar Creek, north of Kendrick.

During World War II he worked as a welder in the Kaiser Shipyards at Portland, Oreg., until volunteering for the U. S. Army.

After he returned home from the service, he resumed farming on Cedar Creek Ridge until retiring in 1970. He moved to Clarkston after his retirement.

He enjoyed music, playing the violin, carpentry and cabinet making and had built a number of homes. He was a member of the United Brethren in Christ Church and was active in the Lewis-Clark Camp of the Gideons International organization.

He never married. Survivors include a sister, Elsie Leshures of Swift Current, Sask., Canada, and three brothers, Fredland of Albany, Ore., William of Kelso, Wash., and Quentin of Bremerton, Wash.

A sister, Dolly Gaskill, and two brothers, Melvin and Arlie died previously.

A graveside service was held Friday morning at Lewis-Clark Memorial Gardens at Lewiston with the Rev. Oliver Bittleston of the First Church of God at Clarkston officiating.

Recertifying J/K E. M. T.s Honored With New Jackets

Recertifying E. M. T.'s were honored last week with the awarding of the new Juliaetta-Kendrick Ambulance Unit jacket. This will be part of an incentive program by the Ambulance Service to reward and recognize those people who continue to devote their time to emergency needs of the community.

It takes many hours of dedication to become an Emergency Medical Technician. An individual must complete a course of 110 hours initially and then every two years must have 30 hours of continued education to test for recertification! Upon successfully being certified, EMT's begin to "take calls". The On Call system allows our community to have two EMT's available 24-hours a day; 7 days a week, 52 weeks a year. Summer time is an especially busy time for some of our EMT's with some being on call from 35 to 60 hours in a five-day period.

The Ambulance Service also has volunteer drivers who carry a radio and are also "on call". No EMT or driver receives monetary compensation.

As always in volunteer work, the EMT unit needs more help! If anyone is interested in becoming an EMT, please contact anyone of the community members. It is hoped a new class will be offered soon.
