Coach Barbara Heimgartner and KHS volleyball team worked their way through a hectic week of contests winning three matches and losing just once. They now have a league record of 6-1 and 8-4 overall.

Tuesday, Sept. 22, the Tigers played the Nez Perce Indians on their own court to rack up another win with scores of 15-9 and 19-5.

Jenifer Hudson was hot from the service line serving 15 for 17 and getting one tip. Michelle Taylor was 9 for 10 serving and added 2 tips, 2 spikes, 1 block and 1 dig. Shelley Taylor and Aundi Howerton each had 1 spike and Aundi added two tips. Lindsay Groselose had 1 block and Syrlna Groselose served 8 for 9 and had one tip. The JV team lost with a score of 15-13 and 15-8.

On Thursday, the 24th, the Tigers broke the Troy Trojan's perfect record to give them their first loss of the season with a score of 15-4 and 15-9. The team played excellent defense and played together, only missing four serves for the match hitting 38 of 42. Hudson served 9 of 10 and had two tips, Deanna Carter served 7 for 8 and recorded 1 spike and 1 tip, Taylor added 2 spikes and 1 tip. Shelley was perfect from the service line with 7 for 7 and 2 spikes. Howerton served 9 for 10 and hit 2 tips. Groselose played well at the net, having two blocks and 2 spikes and serving perfectly for the match. In the second game the Tigers were trailing 2-8 when Hudson served 7 points to put the Tigers ahead and spark the win.

The JVs lost 15-5 and 15-3.

Saturday morning the Tigers got revenge on the Colton Wildcats with scores of 11-15, 15-8 and 15-10. Hudson had 10 assists and served 10-12. Carter served 16 for 20 and recorded 7 spikes. Michelle was also hot at the net with 6 spikes, 2 tips, and served 11 for 12.

The JVs lost again but looked like a much improved team. They went down 17-15, 15-13, 15-8.

The Tigers were back on the court Saturday afternoon hosting Highland. Kendrick won with a score of 15-7 and 15-10 to bring its league record to 6-0 and 8-3 on the season. The Tigers were hot from the service line with .93% serving. Shelley T. was hot, recording 3 spikes and 1 tip and Lindsay G. helping with 3 spikes and perfect serving of 8 for 9. Deanna C. was also perfect with 5 for 5 and two tips and 1 spike. Michelle and Aundi each had 1 tip. Jenifer H. served perfect, also getting 13 for 13 and adding 1 spike. KHS had to put down a Huskie rally in both games to win.

The JVs won their first game with scores of 15-8 and 15-7.

The Tigers suffered their first league loss of the season Tuesday to the Culedas Wolves with scores of 15-8, 9-15, and 5-15. Kendrick pulled out to an early lead in the first game to 7-1 before Culedas started to battle back. The second game was close until the Wolves pulled away at 9-10. Missed serves at important times in the game was one of the Tiger problems, said Coach Heimgartner and poor passing. Michelle Taylor was 10 for 11 at the service line and contributed 3 tips and 3 spikes for the night. Deanna Carter had 5 spikes and 1 tip, Shelley one tip and Lindsay 1 spike and 1 block. The JVs lost their game 15-9 and 16-14.

Tigers Pound Kootenai 46-0

The Kendrick Tiger football team snapped back from its loss to Deary the week before, and overwhelmed the visiting Kootenai Warriors 46-0 in a non-league contest Friday night. Kendrick rolled up 32-points in the first quarter in a game that ended in the final seconds of the third via the 45-point rule.

It took the Tigers less than 2 minutes to get on the scoreboard in the game as they took the opening kickoff and marched down the field to the Warrior 32 yard line where Taj Anderson broke through the line and went all the way for 6 points. A Craig Tefft to Brian Silflow pass added the conversion's 2 points and the Tigers were up 8-0 with 10:02 still remaining.

Kendrick, after holding Kootenai to downs moved the ball down the field, grinding out the yardage on the ground and with Tefft passes. A good run by John Wegner got the Tigers down to the Warrior 5 yard line, but the Tigers fumbled on the next play and the Warriors recovered. Kootenai moved the ball out to the 16 and 1st down but could go no further and had to punt. Taking over on the Warrior 40, Kendrick's Chad Heimgartner ran the ball back down to the 24. On the next play Brian Silflow came through the line and scored, but he had to make a great second effort on the ten yard line to break two tackles before moving the final yards. Heimgartner took Tefft's pass for the extra points, and the score was 16-0 with 1:40 left in the quarter.

It took the Tigers just nine seconds to score the next touchdown. David Tate, who was doing a good job as the Tiger kicker, booted a nice one down inside the Warrior ten, but instead of playing back as a safety, Tate followed his kick right on down the field where he caught the Warrior runner, stripped the ball from him on the 11 yard line and took it into the end zone to score. Tefft shoveled off to Heimgartner who carried it in for the conversion. It was 24-0 with 1:37 still remaining.

The Tigers were still on the attack and scored 8 more points in less than a minute. This time it was Anderson who intercepted a Warrior pass on the 13 yard line and went in to score. Taj converted his own touchdown and with 47 seconds left in the first quarter the Tigers were leading 32-0.

At this point Coach Kevin Driskill mercifully began to take the pressure off the out-gunned Warriors and he began clearing his bench, substituting freely.

Neither team scored in the second period although it was interesting to watch the younger Tigers in action.

Tough Josh Hudson, a sturdy 175-lb. junior back sealed the game in the third quarter as he scored both Tiger touchdowns. A Tefft to Heimgartner pass plus an interference call put the ball on the Kootenai 5 where Hudson banged across from there. Kendrick couldn't convert on a running try.

Chad Heimgartner intercepted a desperation Warrior pass on his own 10 yard and brought it back out to the 25. On the next play Tefft flipped a short pass to Hudson who took it on the 25 and outran two Kootenai men to score. Phil Brown bulled his way over for the extra points. That made the score 46-0 and the game was over.

The Tigers are still at home this Friday night to host the Troy Trojans in a game that begins at 7.

Kendrick Firemen Support New Fire Station, Seek Pledges to Help

Miriam V. Cook, 87, Passes Sept. 29

Miriam V. Cook, a retired homemaker, civic leader, church worker, and news editor, died Tuesday morning, Sept. 29, 1992, at Clarkston Care Center of causes related to age. She had been ill for a number of years. She was 87.



She was born May 8, 1905, near Gifford, Idaho, the daughter of John L. and Lily Peer Blewett.

She attended rural schools and graduated from Culedas High School in 1924. She attended Lewiston Normal School (now Lewis-Clark State College).

She married Ben P. Cook Nov. 12, 1927 at Asotin. They made their home at Lewiston until 1928 when Mr. Cook accepted a teaching position at Southwick, Idaho. The family moved to Genesee in 1934, to Craigmont in 1943 and to Kendrick in 1947, where they had since made their home. Mr. Cook was a principal and teacher in the school system here. He died April 30, 1992.

Mrs. Cook was the news editor of The Kendrick Gazette from 1961 until 1969 when her husband retired.

She was also active in civic affairs, serving as a volunteer with the American Cancer Society and the Red Cross. She helped establish the Kindergarten program in Kendrick. Her volunteer work earned her the respect of the community and she and her husband were honored as grand marshals of the 1984 Kendrick Locust Blossom Festival.

She was a member of the Kendrick Methodist Church and had been a Sunday School teacher for many years.

She enjoyed gardening, camping, and being with her family.

Survivors include two sons, Gordon B. Cook of Port Angeles, Wash., and Ben B. Cook of Ontario, Ore. two daughters, Gwen Deobald, and Donna Goff, both of Kendrick; six sisters, Neta Ruddell and June Stegner, both of Clarkston, Enid Geld and Janet White, both of Lewiston, Arla Geld of Lenore, and Mabel Lindsay, of Pasadena, Calif.; three brothers, Aaron Blewett and Rex Blewett, both of Riverside, Calif., and Milford Blewett of Clarkston; 16 grandchildren and 17 great-grandchildren.

Three brother, Richard Blewett, Nye Blewett and Pierce Blewett, and a sister, Veda Hoduffer, preceded her in death.

Services will be conducted Saturday morning, Oct. 3 at 10:30 at Malcolm's Brower-Wann Chapel with the Rev. Pat Blewett of Boise officiating. Burial will follow at Lewis-Clark Memorial Gardens in Lewiston.
