Kendrick Receives Grant For RV Dump Facility

The establishment of an RV waste dump in the City of Kendrick took a step toward reality this week with the notification that Kendrick has been awarded a \$15,000 grant from the U. S. Forest Service for this purpose.

Installing an RV dump facility has been a much desired project for the area and the community for some time. The city made application for such a grant aid last year, but the application was not approved. This year the city council applied again and this week the council was notified of its approval, reported clerk Lynn Bruce.

The proposed dump is to be installed the east end of Kendrick. Bids will be sought for some of its construction and volunteer labor has also been pledged.

The dump will be on property already owned by the city and the city will maintain and supervise its operation and use.

Kendrick Trounces Trojans 48-0

Two of Kendrick's Tiger football team scored six of seven touchdowns last Friday night on the KHS field as the Tigers rolled to a 48-0 victory over a game but outgunned Troy Trojan squad. The win gives the Tigers and Coach Kevin Driskill a 4-1 league record and 5-1 on the season.

Kendrick pounced on the visiting Troy team for 30 first quarter points, eased off in the second and then turned Josh Hudson loose in the third quarter to end the game via the 45 point rule.

It was Hudson, a running back, and wide receiver Chad Heimgartner who inflicted most of the damage that night.

Heimgartner opened the attack in the first quarter, scoring after taking a pass from quarterback Craig Tefft and going twenty yards. The pass try for the extra points failed. A Tefft to Brian Silflow pass was good for 17 yards and the second Tiger touchdown. Josh Hudson ran over the conversion.

Then Tefft, who completed 3 of 4 passes for 114 yards that night connected with Heimgartner on a 77 yard play for the third Tiger score. Hudson ran over the conversion.

Heimgartner scored his third touchdown in the first quarter when he intercepted a Troy pass and returned it 27 yards.

The rest of the scoring was done by Hudson. Josh converted Heimgartner's touchdown in the first and then scored Kendrick's single second quarter score with a 35 yard run to give the Tigers a 30-0 halftime lead.

Coach Driskill gave his bench strength a good workout in the third period before Hudson scored again on a 25 yard run and then again late in the third on a 27 yard run. That final touchdown put the Tigers over the 45-point mark and no points after touchdown were attempted.

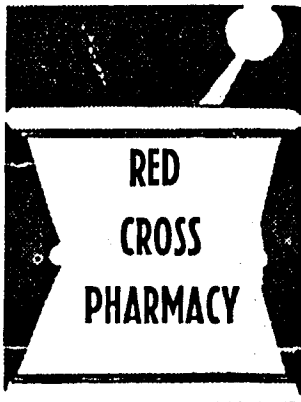
