

fees will apply: 30,001 to 40,000 gallons \$1.50 per thousand gallons 40,001 to 50,000 gallons \$2.00 per thousand gallons

50,001 to 60,000 gallons \$2.50 per thousand gallons 60,001 to 70,000 gallons \$3.00

per thousand gallons 70,001 to 80,000 gallons \$3.50 per thousand gallons 80,001 to 90,000 gallons \$4.00 per thousand gallons

90,001 to 100,000 gallons \$4.50 per thousand gallons 100,000 plus gallons per thousand gallons

D. For unmetered non-residential services, the City Council reserves the right to charge a rate representative of estimated water use based on the amount o water that similar non-residential uses utilize in other cities.

E. All rates and charges shall be pald before the 25th day of each

F. Pust due accounts shall include an additional penalty and service fee of \$50 per month. Past due accounts shall also be charged 1.5% interest per month on the unpaid balance of the account. The City may require utility

customers to pny a deposit of \$50.00 to insure payment of all utility accounts. Section 4. The rates and fees im-
