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

CITIZEN PARTICIPATION PLAN FOR THE IDAHO COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT PROGRAM

COMMUNITY OF KENDRICK

Pursuant to the citizen participation requirements of Section 508 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1987 as amended, the City of Kendrick will undertake the following actions to ensure compliance with said requirements as an applicant for or recipient of Idaho Community Development Block Grant Funds.

1. Conduct at least one public hearing on the ICDBG activities propos-

ed in the ICDBG application submitted to Idaho Department of Commerce (IDC) and at least one public hearing on the status of funded activities.

The application hearing, at minimum, must include a review of: (a) how the need for the proposed activities were developed, (b) how the proposed activities will be funded and source of funds, (c) date application will be submitted, (d) requested amount of ICDBG funds, (e) estimated portion of the ICDBG funds requested that will benefit persons of low and moderate income, (f) where the proposed activities will be conducted, (g) plans to minimize displacement of persons and businesses as a result of funded activities, (h) plans to assist persons actually displaced, and (i) the nature of the proposed activities.

The public hearing on the status of funded activities, at minimum, must include a review of (a) a general description of accomplishments to date, (b) a summary of all expenditures to date, (c) a general description of the remaining work, and (d) a general description of changes made to the ICDBG project budget, performance targets, activity schedules, project scope, location, objectives or beneficiaries.

2. Publish notices of hearing(s) consistent with the requirements of the Idaho Code, Section 60-109.

3. Ensure the public reasonable access to all local meetings, project records and information relating to the proposed and actual use of ICDBG funds.

4. Conduct all ICDBG related public meetings or hearings in public buildings or facilities that are accessible to the handicapped.

5. Provide citizens the name and address of: (a) the person(s) authorized to receive and respond to citizen proposals, questions and complaints concerning proposed or funded activities, (b) the person(s) that will be available to provide technical assistance to groups representative of persons of low and moderate income in preparing and presenting their proposals for the request and use of ICDBG funds.

6. Provide translators during or

written translations after public hearings attended by non-English speaking residents upon their request whenever they represent a significant proportion of the persons benefited by the proposed or actual project activities.

This plan shall become effective October 13, 1992.

SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE NO. 259

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING RATES TO BE CHARGED FOR WATER SERVICE BY THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO; PRESCRIBING THE RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE CONDUCT AND OPERATION OF THE WATER SYSTEM OF SAID CITY AND CONNECTION THEREWITH; REGULATING AND GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER FROM SAID SYSTEM; PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR NONPAYMENT OF WATER SERVICE AND FOR VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Ordinance provides rules and regulations for the operation of the Juliaetta Water System and includes: general terms; the service area; a description of services; application of service procedure; policy on extension of mains; policies regarding meters; that water rates may be adopted by resolution; policy on notices to customers, billings and payment, procedures for discontinuance of service and restoration of service; provisions for access to property; responsibilities for equipment; policy for fire hydrants; penalties (misdemeanor fine of up to \$300, 30 days in jail, or both); and provides that this Ordinance shall be effective upon publication of this Summary.

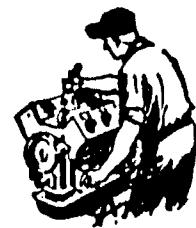

ORDINANCE NO. 638
 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK, A MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE STATE OF IDAHO, PROVIDING RATES AND FEES FOR WATER SERVICES PROVIDED BY THE CITY; PROVIDING THAT ORDINANCE 625 BE AMENDED, PROVIDING FOR THIS ORDINANCE TO BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT FROM AND AFTER ITS APPROVAL AND PUBLICATION.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Kendrick deems it in the public interest to increase water rates to a level which will permit water revenues to equal the amounts needed for water service and improvements;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: That Ordinance No. 635, Section 2 be, and the same hereby is, amended to read as follows:

Section 2: That the following monthly rates, fees, and charges for water services are hereby fixed and shall be paid effective the first day of November, 1992:

A. Each account shall be charged a monthly fee of \$6 dedicated to the Bond Reserve Fund. All other charges shall be in addition to this fee.

B. Minimum Rate: Consumption of 0 to 4,000 gallons and the minimum rate for unmetered services shall be \$10.00 per month.

C. The charge for gallons used above and beyond 4,000 gallons shall be .50 per thousand gallons or fraction thereof, for residential purposes, the following coverage fees will apply:

30,001 to 40,000 gallons	\$1.50 per thousand gallons
40,001 to 50,000 gallons	\$2.00 per thousand gallons
50,001 to 60,000 gallons	\$2.50 per thousand gallons
60,001 to 70,000 gallons	\$3.00 per thousand gallons
70,001 to 80,000 gallons	\$3.50 per thousand gallons
80,001 to 90,000 gallons	\$4.00 per thousand gallons
90,001 to 100,000 gallons	\$4.50 per thousand gallons
100,000 plus gallons	\$5.00 per thousand gallons

D. For unmetered non-residential services, the City Council reserves the right to charge a rate representative of estimated water use based on the amount of water that similar non-residential uses utilize in other cities.

E. All rates and charges shall be paid before the 25th day of each month.

F. Past due accounts shall include an additional penalty and service fee of \$.50 per month. Past due accounts shall also be charged 1.5% interest per month on the unpaid balance of the account.

G. The City may require utility customers to pay a deposit of \$50.00 to insure payment of all utility accounts.

Section 4. The rates and fees imposed by this ordinance shall be effective the first day of October, 1992. This ordinance shall be effective from and after its passage, approval and publication.

ORDINANCE NO. 637
 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK, A MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE STATE OF IDAHO, PROVIDING RATES AND FEES FOR SEWER SERVICES WITHIN THE CITY; PROVIDING THAT SECTION 1 OF ORDINANCE 634 BE AMENDED, PROVIDING FOR THIS ORDINANCE TO BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT FROM AND AFTER ITS APPROVAL AND PUBLICATION.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Kendrick deems it in the public interest to increase sewer rates to a level which will permit sewer revenues to equal the amounts expended for sewer service and improvements;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: That Section 1 of Ordinance 634 be, and the same hereby is, amended to read as follows:

A. Each account unless otherwise specified shall be charged a monthly rate of \$8.00.

B. Beauty parlors, cafes, taverns, meat markets, frozen food lockers, and laundries shall be charged a monthly rate of \$16.00.

C. Public schools shall be charged a monthly rate of \$70.00.

D. All rates and charges shall be paid before the 15th day of each month.

E. Past due accounts shall include an additional penalty and service fee of \$1.50 per month.

F. Churches, lodges, and civic organizations shall be charged a monthly rate of \$5.00.

G. The City may require a deposit of \$50 to insure payment of accounts.

Section 2. That the foregoing monthly rates, fees, and charges for sewer services are hereby fixed and shall be paid effective the first day of October, 1992.
