Mustangs Trample Tigers for Title

Deary's undefeated Mustang football team stayed that way last Friday on the Deary gridiron, defeating the Kendrick Tigers 55-34. The win clinched the Whitepine League's 8-man football title for the Mustangs and assured them of a berth in the District II playoffs. Kendrick, despite the loss will also be in the district playoffs.

The Mustangs wasted no time in taking the lead Friday night before a large crowd. In the first quarter the Deary team got touchdowns from Wayne Summers on a 28 yard run and from Josh Anderson on a 15 yard run. To lead at the end of the first period 14-0. Kendrick had moved the ball down the field in the first quarter and looked strong before they lost possession on a fumble.

In the second quarter the Tigers capped a 70-yard drive with quarterback Craig Tefft going the final 14 yards for a touchdown. Deary answered that touchdown with a fake reverse and a pass from Summers to Matt Anderson worth 59 yards.

Tefft scored again for Kendrick with an eight yard run and Josh Hudson added a two point running conversion. Kendrick fumbled the ball and Matt Anderson returned it 45 yards for another touchdown.

Deary led 29-16 at the half.

Deary put the game on ice in the third quarter with a 20 point, 3-TD scoring spree. Matt Anderson and Josh Anderson scored on runs of 15 and 5 yards. Tefft scored for the Tigers on a 5-yard run and then Anderson caught a pass from Summers for 43 yards and another DHS tally and Abell took a 34 yard pass from Summers for yet another Mustang score.

Kendrick tried to bring it back in the final quarter with a 4 yard run from Jody Mitchell and a 45 yard pass from Tefft to Chad Heimgartner.

Kendrick has the bye in this week's schedule.

One Percent Initiative Quer'es

The proposed 1% Initiative that will be on the ballot next Tuesday, Nov. 3, still continues to draw inquiries from local residents who are concerned about the effect this proposal will have on our schools if it is approved. Supt. of Schools Eldon Taylor has received many questions, and this week he has taken several of the most frequently asked and answers them.

Question:
Will the 1% Initiative do away with property taxes?

Answer:
No. It will lower them in most cases but you will still pay property taxes and it will open up a whole can of worms as to if or how the legislature might make up some or all of the revenue loss. The \$145,930 loss in the 1993-94 school year is essential in its entirety to offer the quality we have at the lowest dollar amount possible. In some localities of Kendrick School District, it is possible that properties are not being taxed on amounts that exceed 1% depending upon the number of taxing entities in addition to the schools and the county government taxes. The best way of checking is to look at your county taxes, if your assessed market value is multiplied by 1% you can see how close you are to this bunch mark. One exception to this is long term bonding such as the Juliaetta Elementary school addition, which would be added on to the 1% of market value limitation. An example would be if they are assessed at \$50,000 and your taxes are \$500, then you are a push (no effect). Continuing this example, one does not want to take too much comfort in either scenario. If your taxes are \$400, then on the surface it appears that you are below the 1%. But, because it is such a huge financial loss to all Idaho public services (schools, fire, police, ambulance, etc.), raising your taxes to the 1% level is one of the possible revenue increase solutions that the legislature might tap. Thus, your taxes might increase in the solution of the statewide problem. If your taxes are \$600, then you save \$100 by the 1% initiative bill, but because the legislature will be looking for ways to make up a part or all of the monies, you may well pay out more than a \$100 in another area. Since Idaho has some of the lowest User Taxes (car license, etc.) in the U. S., it is another possible area the legislature may attempt to make-up a part or all of the loss. The most anyone pays for a new car license in Idaho is in the \$80-\$100/year range. Washington state license fees can be up in the \$750-\$1000 per car range, depending upon the value of the car. Thus, using your example above, you could easily end up paying more out for other kinds of taxes the legislature imposes to make up for lost revenue since there is no language in this to make up for the lost revenue. In street language, the cure may be worse than the disease!

Question:
How does the legislature plan to make up this lost revenue to the government entities?

Answer:
The answer to this question is unknown because there is no language in the 1% initiative bill that addresses this issue. Individual legislators or the legislature themselves do not have an answer to this because it has not been a problem or a question they have to address until it becomes a law. Consequently, the answer to the above question is pure speculation and personal theories on how the lost monies can be restored. The following are some of the speculations being talked about in the Boise area:

- Doing away with the home owners' exemptions
- Raising sales or income taxes
- Taxing agricultural land on market value instead of productivity
- Doing away with sales tax exemptions on farms
- Raising all properties to the 1% market value level
- Raising user's fees (vehicle registration, license, etc.)

Looking over the above list, it is of a concern for those of us living in rural areas because it is also commonly acknowledged in the Boise area that the rural areas will suffer the most by the passage of the 1% initiative. The reason for this dialogue is because in this year's reapportionment of the legislative districts the urban areas of Idaho now have a majority of the votes. Historically, Idaho has been a state with a rural and agricultural dominated legislature.

Question:
What is all the controversy over the 2/3 requirement to repeal this initiative?

Answer:
This initiative has language in it that in order for it to be repealed, it takes 2/3 of the qualified (registered) voters. This is an unattainable requirement. It is saying that this initiative requires a simple majority to pass and 2/3 of the regis-

ered voters to repeal it. That is an extremist initiative and should be immediately struck down by the courts because it is a basic threat to democracy. This language of 2/3 of the registered voters is a precedent in Idaho law that is more demanding than our State Constitution. To have this type of language in any law removing the whole emotional issue of a taxation law is a threat to our freedoms guaranteed by the Federal Constitution (speech, religion, the right to assemble, etc.). It could get laws into effect by a simple majority of the votes. Not to be able to repeal an unpopular law or one not working the way it was intended, by an attainable vote, could bring the whole legal system to a permanent grinding halt because there is no way of getting a law off the books. In every election, because of our mobile society, there are always names on the registrar's list of people that have moved who would be counted in the total registered voters. Thus it would count against the numbers of yes votes trying to get a law repealed. This is a bad, bad bill and for a variety of reasons stated in the past two series of articles, one should vote "NO" on the 1% initiative.

Tigers Win District Volleyball Crown; Open at State Friday

The Kendrick Tiger volleyball team won the Idaho Class A-4 District II volleyball title by defeating Culesac Wednesday 15-13, 18-10, and Troy on Thursday with scores of 8-15, 15-6, and 15-13. The Tigers will now head to Twin Falls to play in the State Tournament Friday at 2:30 at the College of Southern Idaho.

In the first game against Culesac the Tigers built a 10-1 lead before the Wolves staged a comeback to pull within one point of the Tigers at 14-13 before Kendrick rallied on a kill by Lindsay Groseclose and a tip by Aundi Howerton. In the second game Kendrick had a 4-0 lead until Culesac pulled ahead 7-12. The Tigers started a rally with Aundi serving and tied the score at 13-14, 15 and 16 before winning. Deanna Carter was hot at the net with 9 kills, one tip and one dig. Michelle Taylor had 4 kills, Shelley Taylor had one kill, Aundi Howerton had 9 assists and 3 tips and 17 for 17 serves. Lindsay Groseclose had 2 kills and one dig, and Jenifer Hudson handed out 7 assists and was 12 for 12 serving.

Kendrick went flat in the first game against Troy Thursday night and let the Trojans get a 6-0 lead on them and were never a threat to the Trojans. The Tigers were too aggressive, getting 5 net errors on them in that game. In the second game the Tigers came out smoking and built a 10-1 lead and never gave Troy a chance to catch up as they won 15-6. Troy started out in the third game getting a 4-0 lead before the Tigers got hot with seven straight points to pull ahead 7-4. The score was tied at 8-all and 13-all with seven side outs and long rallies before Kendrick got the final two points to win 15-13. The game ended with a kill from Michelle Taylor, and it was on to State!

Deanna Carter had a record high of 14 kills and 2 tips, with Michelle close behind with 9 kills and 2 tips. Lindsay Groseclose stopped the Trojan offense with 5 blocks and 1 tip. Aundi Howerton lead the way at the service line serving 16 for 18 and handing out 12 assists. Jenifer Hudson had 11 assists and served 9 for 10. Shelley Taylor contributed a block.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK, A MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE STATE OF IDAHO, PROVIDING RATES AND FEES FOR WATER SERVICES PROVIDED BY THE CITY; PROVIDING THAT ORDINANCE 625 BE AMENDED, PROVIDING FOR THIS ORDINANCE TO BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT FROM AND AFTER ITS APPROVAL AND PUBLICATION.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Kendrick deems it in the public interest to increase water rates to a level which will permit water revenues to equal the amounts needed for water service and improvements;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: That Ordinance No. 635, Section 2 b, and the same hereby is, amended to read as follows:

Section 2: That the following monthly rates, fees, and charges for water services are hereby fixed and shall be paid effective the first day of November, 1992:

A. Each account shall be charged a monthly fee of \$6 dedicated to the Bond Reserve Fund. All other charges shall be in addition to this fee.

B. Minimum Rate: Consumption of 0 to 4,000 gallons and the minimum rate for unmetered services shall be \$10.00 per month.

C. The charge for gallons used above and beyond 4,000 gallons shall be .50 per thousand gallons or fraction thereof, for residential purposes, the following average fees will apply:

D. For unmetered non-residential services, the City Council reserves the right to charge a rate representative of estimated water use based on the amount of water that similar non-residential uses utilize in other cities.

E. All rates and charges shall be paid before the 25th day of each month.

F. Past due accounts shall include an additional penalty and service fee of \$.50 per month. Past due accounts shall also be charged

1.5% interest per month on the unpaid balance of the account.

G. The City may require utility customers to pay a deposit of \$5000 to insure payment of all utility accounts.

Section 4. The rates and fees imposed by this ordinance shall be effective the first day of October, 1992. This ordinance shall be effective from and after its passage, approval and publication.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Kendrick deems it in the public interest to increase sewer rates to a level which will permit sewer revenues to equal the amounts expended for sewer service and improvements;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: That Section 1 of Ordinance 634 be, and the same hereby is, amended to read as follows:

A. Each account unless otherwise specified shall be charged a monthly rate of \$8.00.

B. Beauty parlors, cafes, taverns, meat markets, frozen food lockers, and laundries shall be charged a monthly rate of \$16.00.

C. Public schools shall be charged

a monthly rate of \$20.00.

D. All rates and charges shall be paid before the 15th day of each month.

E. Past due accounts shall include an additional penalty and service fee of \$1.50 per month.

F. Churches, lodges, and civic organizations shall be charged a monthly rate of \$5.00.

G. The City may require a deposit of \$50 to insure payment of accounts.

Section 2. That the foregoing monthly rates, fees, and charges for sewer services are hereby fixed and shall be paid effective the first day of October, 1992.

Section 3: That all other ordinances, regulations and rates for the sewer system shall remain in full force and effect.
