Tiger Volleyball Team Ties for Fifth at State

When the Kendrick High School girls volleyball team opened its season in September, Coach Barb Heimgartner predicted, "We'll be up there with the best of them." Her forecast proved accurate as the Tigers won their league, the district title, and last week finished a fine season by placing fifth at the state championship tournament in Twin Falls. The Tigers won once and lost twice at the state level.

Thursday afternoon the Tigers opened their play in state against Midvale and came away with a 15-4, 11-14 and 15-13 victory. Kendrick was down 0-4 when Aundri Howerton came up to serve in the first game and she proceeded to serve 15 straight points with the help of her teammates. The second game was close, being tied at 3-0, 6-6, and 11-11 before Midvale pulled ahead. Two Tigers started hot in the third game moving ahead 14-3, 21 side-outs later, they finally got the 15th point. Howerton ended up serving 24 for 24 and dishing out 6 assists. Denna Carter helped with 9 kills, one block and one net. Jennifer Hillen had 9 assists and a perfect 10 for 10 serving. Michelle Taylor contributed 2 tips and 4 kills. Shelley Taylor, 3 tips, 2 kills, 1 block and 8 for 8 serving. Lindsay Groselove was intimidating at the net, having 5 spikes and 1 block.

Thursday evening, the Shoshone Indians were too much for the Tigers and knocked KHS into the losers bracket 15-5 and 15-7. The Tigers had too many serve-receive and service errors to a threat as they fell behind 0-6 in the first game and couldn't get turned around. Shoshone went on to capture third at state.

Jenifer Hudson contributed 8 assists, Denna Carter 2 tips and 6 kills, Michelle Taylor 1 tip and 4 kills, Shelley Taylor and Lindsay Hill 1 kill with Lindsay serving 6 for 6 and Aundri Howerton helped out with 5 assists.

The Tigers were eliminated from competition at state with 10-15, 15-10 and 4-15 loss to the Hagerman Pirates. Kendrick finished by losing 7-15 and the Pirates went on to place second. Kendrick was down 0-4 in the first game before tying 4-7, 8 and 10 until Hagerman pulled away. In game two Kendrick jumped out to a 9-0 lead with Howerton serving before the Pirates began to rally. Aundri ended up serving 20 for 21 and dishing out 4 assists, with Jennifer Hudson having 8 assists and serving 10 for 11. Denna Carter showed her force at the net with 3 kills and one tip and Michelle Taylor helping out with 4 kills and 1 tip. Shelley Taylor had 2 kills and Lindsay Groselove was a force at the net with 5 blocks.

The Tigers ended the season with a 15-7 record.

Secretary Vera Hutcherson had good news for Grange Master Frank Jacobson last Friday afternoon. Calling from the Idaho State Grange convention in Post Falls, Vera spread the good news: Once again, Kendrick had taken a first at state!

Beginning back in October of 1991, Kendrick Grange had begun to focus the public's attention on the program of the Kendrick/Juliaetta Community Development Association and to support its efforts. Throughout the year the Grange continued its efforts to promote a sense of community, encourage cooperation among community leadership groups, to provide facilities for meetings to advance such ends, and to contribute to the cash match for the Gem community action grant.

For its year-long effort, Kendrick Grange was named last Friday as the winner of the Idaho State Grange community service project competition. Its project report now goes on for judging at the national level.

Thanks to all who contributed to the Grange's successful program to highlight the need for a growing sense of community.

Also repeat grand prize winners in the recent pumpkin carving contest were Harland and Marie Fey. Mabel Glenn went home from October 20 meeting with two prizes, one for the scariest pumpkin and one for the funniest. Maxine Foster took the prize for the cleverest entry. While contestants hoped to see their pumpkins in the pages of the Tribune the Lewiston paper's photo never made the scene. His loss, we say, is the Grange's gain. The October 20 meeting also discussed the proposed construction of a new fire hall in Kendrick. While supporting the need to provide more space for equipment, the Grange questioned whether the proposed site is the best one possible. The Grange's concerns were communicated in a letter to the Kendrick Volunteer Firemen.

Communication Lines Opened at Recent Housing Meeting

Participants agreed that the October 28 meeting to explore the feasibility of providing moderate priced housing in the community of Kendrick/Juliaetta achieved one of its goals—to open lines of communication among leaders, builders, realtors and representatives of the J-K Community Development Association and the community at large.

Before a relatively small audience, a twelve member panel exchanged thinking regarding local housing needs and possibilities; and while specific action-oriented conclusions were reached, that evening nearly all of the participants appeared to be benefiting from the exchange of ideas and business cards. Follow-up exchanges of information are already occurring, and the association's plan of housing program information is growing apace.

The panel, moderated by Frank Jacobson, included local residents Dick Hammond, Phil Helms, Jerry Brown, Lum Farrington, Dick Groselove, and Paul Rush. Resource people on the panel included Barbara Leachman of Community Action, Lewiston; Debbie Kivioja of the Lewiston office of the Farmers Home Administration; Gary Machacek of Northwest Associates of Boise, a developer of low rental housing for seniors; Mary Jane Gruber, a realtor with Town & Country Realtors in Lewiston; and Chris Mooney of the Tomlinson Agency, also in Lewiston.

Following the panel's discussion audience members had a chance to comment and raise questions. The topics of senior housing and the scarcity of building lots in the towns drew considerable attention. Audience and participants stayed on following the meeting to exchange views.

One of two Kendrick candidates won in the election held Tuesday, Nov. 3. Dana Magnuson, a Kendrick insurance agent, won another four-year term as Latah County Commissioner from Dist. 3. Werner Brammer lost his bid to become State Representative from Dist. 5B. He was running as an independent.

Magnuson won re-election over his opponent Pat Nunan, a retired banker from Troy. Magnuson received 773 votes or 51.9% of the total ballots cast, while Nunan polled 7161 or 48.1%.

In other Latah County contests, incumbent State Senator Betty Benson was defeated by Republican Gary Schroeder 7890 to 7412.

Incumbent sheriff Ken Buxton lost his position to Joe Overstreet, who polled 8033 to Buxton's 7346.

The precinct-by-precinct votes were not available early Wednesday morning.

Support for New Fire Station Appears Strong

Support for the proposed fire station in Kendrick appears to be strong if the reactions at a public hearing called by the Senior Center is any indicator. Almost thirty residents were present at the hearing called by the city to explain the project and public input and reaction.

What the city would like to do is to construct a new facility house the fire trucks and emergency service vehicles on owned property on the street next to the swimming pool and present Good Samaritan Food (old city hall), that would replace the present fire station, which about everyone admits is woefully inadequate. At this time the hall houses the two fire trucks respond to a call, the ambulance must first be driven out before fire truck can leave. The new emergency service fire vehicle owned by Washington Water & Power Co. must be placed in a sepa shed about a block away. In addition there is no room for much of fire department equipment at present station.

The cost of the building plus the cost of adequate facility is estimated at \$200,000. That's a lot of money—both the city and firemen agree. But to be able afford this expense, the city is seeking a grant of \$149,619 from Idaho Dept. of Commerce. The application for the grant must be submitted by Nov. 6. A decision by Dept. of Commerce could be expected early next year and, if grant is made, completion of new facility could be as soon as November of 1993.

The proposed building is 55 feet. This would provide space adequate for the two fire trucks, emergency vehicle and the air lance, plus storage to put equipment. It would also be a 50x20 foot meeting room, kitchen facilities to replace the meeting room in the old station. It would be a separate entrance, the meeting room in addition to the assembly in the main station.

David Klatt, a member of the council explained to the audience how the community could meet share of the \$200,000 cost if the grant is approved. If the grant is made there would still be \$50,381 in matching funds to be raised.

Where does that come from? If the city would sell the present station which is estimated to be valued at \$200,000. Both the J-K and the Kendrick Volunteer Fire Department have indicated a willingness to contribute toward the project, the city will vest funds and also will provide paving and re-paving of the area involved. And, of course, public will be asked to make contributions. Other community groups and organizations will also be asked to help.

Eric Phillips of Lewiston, a CE representative is assisting with the grant application. He said that competition for these grants is great and the less money that is requested the better chance of approval. He said it encouraging that the project appears to have excellent support from the community.

Rick McGregor, chief of the Kendrick Volunteer Fire Department, his group supports the county and the council in this project. It provides a source of community pride and generate interest in the department.

Jeff Ford, an active member EMT's, said the ambulance service supports the project wholeheartedly. Jerry Bruce told the audience at first, "I had some concerns about the fire station being moved to the main street." But after studying the plans he was sure now he "could support the project."

Bruce also said he wanted thank Dave Klatt and Don Weir for the work they had put into the project.

"Whether or not the grant is forthcoming," Dave Klatt said, "I want to thank everyone for their support and hard work."

"If the grant is not approved, we will be up to the citizens and organizations to decide if the project be continued," Klatt said.
