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Public Hearing on Solid Waste Disposal Changes In Moscow November 19

The Latah County Solid Waste Advisory Committee (SWAC) invites the public to comment on proposed changes in the rural solid waste system. The public meeting will be held Thursday, November 19 at 7:30 p. m. in the Exhibit Building of the Latah County Fairgrounds.

The County Board of Commissioners is considering changes in the rural solid waste collection system in order to minimize the cost of solid waste disposal to the rate-payer due to the federally mandated Subtitle D regulations. Subtitle D regulations require that counties dispose of solid waste in such a manner that ground water is protected.

At the meeting representatives from the county will review Subtitle D regulations, discuss the on-going door to door pilot pick up project, and outline the proposed changes in the rural collection system.

After the County's presentation, SWAC will open the meeting to the public for comments and suggestions on the proposed changes in the rural collection system.

J-K Development Assoc. Meeting Held Thursday

Thirteen members and two guests were present at the November meeting of the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Assoc. held on Thursday at the Town and Country Diner. The meeting was called to order by president Wally Butler and minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved by secretary Lillian Howerton and a financial report was presented by treasurer Greg Mann.

It was reported that letters of support have been sent and received on the city's efforts to construct a new fire station in Kendrick.

Donna Heinen, chairman of the association's business retention and expansion committee gave her report and Frank Jacobson, chairman of the economic diversification committee spoke on the progress of his committee and also reported on a recent state meeting in Boise.

Butler reminded the group that the terms of office of himself, Lillian Howerton, Frank Jacobson and Bob Hasholdt expire December 31. Elections are to be held at the December 10 meeting. A nominating committee of Lesael Abrams, Donna Heinen and Greg Mann was appointed by the president.

Eric Phillips, a CEDA representative from Lewiston was a guest at this meeting and he complimented the association and its officers on its forward looking approach to the communities needs.

Governor Andrus Announces 800 Number to Help Locate Eldercare Services in U. S.

Governor Cecil D. Andrus today announced a toll-free telephone number that Idaho's family caregivers can use to locate services for an older family member.

The Eldercare Locator number—1/800-677-1116 — will start serving Idaho Thanksgiving week. By using this number, a family member living anywhere in the country can gather information about services and programs in the older person's community.

"This national toll-free service will help solve the dilemma that many Idahoans face—where to turn for help when caring for an aging relative," Governor Andrus said.

"This service provides information about housing options, transportation, and home-delivered meals as well as ombudsman and health services. It can even locate help for those who need assistance with chores such as raking leaves or shoveling snow. Access to this information will allow families to make better choices for their older loved ones."

Idaho, like the rest of the nation, is facing unprecedented growth in its aging population. Projections are one out of every five people in Idaho will be age 60 or older by the year 2010. Between 1980 and 1990, growth in the elderly population of those age 65 and older grew by 43 percent. Eighty percent of older persons are cared for by family members at home.

The start up of this service coincides with National Family Caregivers Week—November 22 through 28. The Eldercare Locator service is funded by the Administration on Aging.

Season's Over—Council Ousts Tigers From Grid Playoffs

The Kendrick Tiger's hopes for successfully defending their A-4 eight-man football championship were ended Saturday afternoon as the Council Lumberjacks topped the Tigers 38-18 on the Council gridiron eliminating the KHS squad from the state playoffs. The Lumberjacks go on to the finals while the Tigers end the season with a 7-4 record.

Kendrick defeated the Lumberjacks in the Kibbie Dome last year to win the state championship, but the Tigers didn't have the strength to match the powerful Council squad this season.

Council's powerful front line shut down the Tiger attack completely in the first half while scoring 2 touchdowns and a safety to lead 16-0 at the half.

Craig Tefft passed to Brian Silflow in the third quarter on a play covering five yards to get the Tigers on the scoreboard for the first time. A pass attempt for the extra points failed.

Council's Mark Paradis answered that score with an 80 yard run and converted it with a run.

Tiger Chad Helmgartner, who had been closely watched by the Lumberjacks since the opening game, broke free on the kickoff and went 85 yards for a touchdown in the third period.

Kendrick scored the final touchdown in the fourth quarter on a Tefft to Silflow pass play covering 7 yards.



Editor:
On November 3rd I voted against the One Percent Initiative because I felt it would destroy the tax system without reforming it. Even so, those of us who voted against it can't be pleased with ourselves until there is a remedy.

I'm very supportive of the remarkable and persistent efforts of Werner Brammer. For over 30 years he has led a mostly self-financed crusade which has brought to the attention of Idaho's citizens that the property tax is an unfair tax.

Werner has provided leadership for the Idaho Property Owners Association at the state and county level since 1978. He has devoted a special effort to coordinating organizational activities at the county level. This dedicated citizen always emphasizes that citizen involvement is a pivotal way to influence the legislative process.

Some of us see Werner as a single issue advocate and as an unpleasant voice in the wilderness. For most of us the irony herein is that we usually need an unpleasant confrontation with the truth before we're willing to take action. Werner Brammer feels a strong responsibility to speak for those who are vulnerable and don't know how to influence a system that doesn't seem to care.

Concerning the recent election, the property tax problem will continue to impact winners, losers, and bystanders. Back in 1978, the majority of Idaho's voters passed an initiative to limit property taxes to 1 percent of market value. However, for 14 years the Legislature has failed to take corrective action. The patience of Idaho's voters has now worn thin.

Let's pay tribute to Werner Brammer and to ourselves. Do renew your demand that the 1993 Legislature implement reform legislation, in a systematic way, to alleviate the property owners' burden.
