## Lude Groseclose, 81, Juliaetta Pioneer, Passes November 29

Juliaetta pioneer Lewis Clark (Lude) Groseclose passed away at his family home Sunday, Nov. 29, 1992.

He was born at the Groseclose homestead on the banks of Potlatch Creek on April 14, 1911 to Jim and Susan Kimberling Groseclose. He attended school at the Pilot Rock schoolhouse south of Juliaetta.



He married Pearl Winters on Nov. 14, 1931.

He farmed at Southwick until moving to Camas, Wash. in 1941 where he was employed at Crown Zellerbach. Upon returning to Juliaetta in 1945, he was once again self-employed in farming at Southwick until 1960. He also cattle ranching along the Little Potlatch until 1965.

He then maintained the Kendrick and Juliaetta area cemeteries for five years, worked for the CPTA in the Southwick area for three years and was employed by the Kendrick School District as a custodian at the Juliaetta Elementary School until his retirement in 1982.

He served on the Juliaetta City Council for almost 20 years and was active in the Latah County Democratic party for many years.

He is preceded in death by five brothers and three sisters.

He is survived by his wife, Pearl, at the family home. Other survivors are his three children; Phillip Groseclose at Juliaetta, Geneva Davis, and Larry Groseclose, both of Lewiston. 5 grandchildren and 1 great-grandson.

Funeral services were at Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel in Lewiston on Wednesday, Dec. 2 with Rev. Jay W. Casciato of the Juliaetta Church of the Nazarene officiating. Burial was at the Juliaetta City Cemetery.

The family suggests memorials be made to the K-J Ambulance Fund or the Juliaetta Nazarene Church.

## The Man I Remember

I remember Lude Groseclose as a patient man who would take young boys out on a Sunday afternoon and let them shoot his gun. One who let us drive the old pickup around and around the barn on the farm. I remember Lude saying many times, "What in the Sam Hill are you kids doing?"

As a teenager I remember listening to stories about early town history. Since becoming an adult, it was fun and stimulating to engage Lude in conversation. I always found his opinions to be valuable and his advice sound.

In later years Lude could usually be found early in the day in the coffee shop, never saying much, but listening intently to the coffee shop talk as he always wanted to know what was going on in his part of the world.

The last time I talked to Lude was after his stroke. I know he recognized me, but was unable to speak. Though he could not communicate verbally I could tell by his eyes and facial expression he still knew who I was and was interested in what was going on.

Now it is time to say goodbye, even though it is hard to do, it must be done.

Goodbye Lude and thanks for the good memories.
