Junior Statesmen of America/Youth in Government is a club that teaches members how government is run, and many of its members have an interest in learning of the workings of government. Each member must pay a \$3.00 registration fee to join, which makes them eligible to participate in any regional or state actively Junior Statesmen has to offer during the school year. To help fund the club's trips, the group holds various cake raffles and dances throughout the year, and hope to hold an alumni basketball game this spring. The club takes an annual trip to Boise each spring to participate in the Youth Legislature convention, which teaches students parliamentary procedure while presenting bills and debating them in the capitol. K. H. S. Chemistry Class Attended Riparian Workshop at W. S. U.

After attending the Riparian Restoration workshop at WSU with our fellow chemistry students, Corey Meyer, Stephanie Hill, Amie McGreger, and Lindsay Groseclose; our teacher, Miss Cozert, and our stream-walk advisor, Ellen Magnuson, we have become aware of the riparian zones in the Kendrick-Juliaetta area.

Mrs. Magnuson has been helping our class learn about water quality. She has worked with a Moscow group to clean up Paradise Creek. People used to think it was a ditch. Recently eight tons of garbage have been removed. Ellen took a stream-walk course this summer. Stream-walk programs are designed to help local people monitor, safeguard and enhance water quality.

The class has been learning to monitor the Riparian Zone of the Potlatch River. This is an area between a stream and its surrounding upland that is covered by vegetation. This is a very important part of streams, because not only does this vegetation help prevent erosion, but it provides food for invertebrates (which are eaten by fish) living in the water. Vegetation is a source of cover and shade for fish. Riparian areas' functions involve interaction of soil, water, and vegetation. In the process of flood plain development, river systems become healthier.

During the workshop, the class listened to a variety of speakers, viewed slides and video presentations. They were able to see the differences between streams before and after riparian restoration. Before people began restoring the area, they had to contemplate a few points: whether or not the particular site has potential, the functions of the system, and if the area needed riparian vegetation. After beginning restoration there were different ways to help, from structures to exclosures, and from management stress to natural stress. People even used many grazing systems to limit crop killing and erosion.

Now that everyone in the Chemistry class is more aware of riparian restoration, they would like to spread the information throughout the community in order to develop and improve the creeks and rivers. Later, the class will be soliciting help from adults in the community. The class is planning to assist the 6th graders with observing and learning about our riparian areas. Working together we will all become more aware.

Corey Meyer commented on the workshop, "I found the workshop beneficial for the work we are doing on the creek. The donuts were good, too."
