"Fatal Traffic Accident on Highway 3 East of Arrow Junction" words we pray the community will not hear repeated. The accident of Dec. 21, 1992, took an innocent man's life. The major contributor to the accident was the narrowness and roughness of the road. In fact, some portions of the road will actually throw a loaded truck. In light of all the traffic funneled over this "bottle-neck". highway 3 east of Arrow to the new road, is unsafe for the traffic of the 90's.

According to James Clayton, District Highway Engineer, the road is not presently scheduled for reconstruction in the 5-year plan. The priority for road construction in Idaho is determined by a 3-member board, (one from the north and two from south Idaho.) Mike P. Mitchell of Lewiston serves on the board from north Idaho.

A list of near misses is being compiled for Mr. Mitchell's information. Anyone having a "close call" or difficulty on this portion of highway is urged to call 289-3937 and ask for Dan Colbaugh. Be prepared to give the date, location, and other details. The state has a list of the accidents but not the narrow misses. The list will be given to Mr. Mitchell to take to Boise when the priorities for the road projects are set.

The timeliness for road reconstruction can be directly correlated to the response of area residents. Anyone concerned over the condition of this portion of the highway may write to the following address:

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

Many factors can cause baldness, head, according to Caldwell. including iron deficiency, thyrold disease, use of many different drugs, severe tension or malnutrition, In many of these cases, simple lifestyle changes can help, says Caldwell.

Vitamin and mineral deficiencies sometimes cause balding. Women commonly lost hair due to an iron deficiency which requires special blood tests to detect. Vegetarians with a protein deficiency can lose hair as well, and just need to eat more fish or cheese.

Also, medications can cause balding. Many common drugs, including oral contraceptives, amphetamines, lithium, vitamin A and certain antiblotics can cause hair loss, says Dr. Caldwell.

People often blame stress, but only severe stress is likely to be responsible for hair loss. "It needs to be pretty dramatic, like going through a divorce or a severe illness.
