**CITY OF KENDRICK, IDAHO
ORDINANCE NO. 639**

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK, A MUNICIPAL

CORPORATION OF IDAHO, PROVIDING FOR THE VACATING OF MAIN STREET BETWEEN BLOCKS 92 AND 103; PROVIDING THAT THE CITY SHALL RETAIN A TWENTY-FOOT WIDE UTILITY EASEMENT DOWN THE CENTER OF THE VACATED STREET; PROVIDING THAT TITLE TO SAID VACATED RIGHT-OF-WAY SHALL VEST WITH THE OWNERS OF THE PROPERTIES ON EACH SIDE OF MAIN STREET DIVIDED BY THE CENTER LINE OF MAIN STREET; PROVIDING THAT THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT FROM AND AFTER ITS PASSAGE, APPROVAL AND PUBLICATION ACCORDING TO LAW.

WHEREAS, the owners of adjacent properties have petitioned the City for the vacating of a portion of the Main Street right-of-way; and WHEREAS, on the 12th day of January, 1993, the City Council conducted a public hearing on the matter of vacating a portion of the Main Street

right-of-way and determined that such action was in the public interest;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: That the following described street right-of-way be, and the same hereby is, vacated as of the effective date of this ordinance:

All of that portion of Main Street lying between and being contiguous to Blocks 92 and 103, northwest of Lots 1, 2 and 1/2 of 3, original Kendrick town site, said property being within the City of Kendrick, Latah County, Idaho; the City retains a utility easement as described herein.

SECTION 2: That the City of Kendrick retains a twenty-foot wide utility easement down the center of the vacated right-of-way.

SECTION 3: That ownership of the above-described property be, and the same hereby is granted to the owners of the property adjacent to the vacated right-of-way on each side of Main Street with the property dividing line being the former center line of Main Street.

SECTION 4: This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK, A MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE STATE OF IDAHO, PROVIDING FOR ANNEXATION OF PROPERTY DESCRIBED IN SECTION 1 OF THIS ORDINANCE INTO THE CITY OF KENDRICK, PROVIDING THAT PROPERTY DESCRIBED IN SECTION 1 BE ZONED AS "SINGLE FAMILY RESIDENTIAL"; PROVIDING FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE COMPREHENSIVE PLAN AND ZONING MAP TO REFLECT THIS CHANGE; PROVIDING FOR THIS ORDINANCE TO BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT FROM AND AFTER ITS PASSAGE, APPROVAL AND PUBLICATION ACCORDING TO LAW.

Most Children's Accidents Are Preventable

Accidents don't just happen; about 9 out of 10 children's accidental injuries are preventable. Each year more children are killed or disabled by injuries than by kidnapping, drugs and disease combined, says Dr. Karen Thomas, associate professor of parent and child nursing at the University of Washington School of Nursing.

Thomas recommends that parents set rules about safety and follow those rules themselves. Children often don't do what parents say; they do what parents do. Parents can help prevent injuries to their children, for example, by buckling them into car seats and wearing seat belts, by making sure the whole family wears bike helmets, by teaching kids to cross streets safely and setting an example by crossing at the corner and waiting for the light.

But it takes more than a safe attitude to keep children safe. "They need specific skills, Thomas says.

"Parents may be safety conscious, but too often they focus on punishing unsafe behavior," Thomas says. "It's better to help children learn safety skills and practice them. Parents often overestimate their children's abilities, and that's very scary," she adds. "Get down to your child's level by kneeling to his or her height. See what crossing the street looks like to a 4-year-old. Because of size and thinking abilities, children are unsafe pedestrians. Their view may be blocked and they cannot estimate the speed of a car." With older children, "talk about how to listen for cars, that the squeal of brakes or roar of acceleration means danger," Thomas advises. "Then walk them to the corner and practice these skills with them."

Motor vehicle accidents are the number one killer of children at all ages, Thomas says. Half of those victims are pedestrians and half are passengers. Other major causes of

death and injury vary depending on children's ages. Burns, choking and suffocating are big dangers to infants and toddlers. Drowning and falling cause many injuries and death among preschoolers. By school age, accidents involving bikes and skateboards are a leading cause of death and injury. Among teenagers, drugs, suicide and homicide are big concerns.

Besides taking a safety first attitude, what can parents do? Thomas suggests:

— Realize that accidental injuries are a big problem and that there's a lot you can do to prevent them.
— Train your children to be safe. Talk to them and instruct them in safe practices. Role play and rehearse at home what children should do.

— Do a room-by-room safety check of your home, looking for hazards. Conduct a safety check each year, perhaps on the day you set your clocks back and change your smoke alarm battery.

— Praise your children for doing things safely. Enforce the consequences of unsafe behavior. For example, remove bike riding privileges for a day if a child won't wear a bike helmet. If a youngster can't cross the street safely, make it a rule that the child must cross only with an adult or older sibling.

— Be aware that you're more at risk for accidents during stressful times, such as divorce, illness or job loss. Raise your safety consciousness a notch.

— Learn CPR and basic first-aid skills. The Red Cross offers good classes.

— Have your phone number and address taped to the phone, so someone calling from your home in an emergency can give that information to dispatchers quickly.
