

RESIDENTIAL ANTI-DISPLACEMENT AND RELOCATION ASSISTANCE PLAN

Under Section 104(d) of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended.

The County of Latah will replace all occupied and vacant occupiable low/moderate-income dwelling units demolished or converted to a use other than as low/moderate-income housing in connection with an activity assisted with funds provided under the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended, as described in 24 CFR 570.606 (b) through (g).

All replacement housing will be provided within three years after the commencement of the demolition or conversion. Before entering into a contract committing the County of Latah to provide funds for an activity that will directly result in demolition or conversion, the County of Latah will make public by publication, (e.g. publication in a newspaper of general circulation) and submit to the Idaho Department of Commerce the following information in writing:

1. A description of the proposed assisted activity.
2. The location on a map and number of dwelling units size (number of bedrooms) that will be demolished or converted to a use other than as low/moderate-income dwelling units as a direct result of the assisted activities;
3. A time schedule for the commencement and completion of the demolition or conversion;
4. The location on a map and the number of dwelling units by size (number of bedrooms) that will be provided as replacement dwelling units. If such data are not available at the time of the general submission, the County of Latah will identify the general location on an area map and the approximate number of dwelling units by size and provide information identifying the specific location and number of dwelling units by size as soon as it is available;
5. The source of funding and a time schedule for the provision of the dwelling units;
6. The basis for concluding that each replacement dwelling unit will remain a low/moderate-income dwelling unit for at least 10 years from date of initial occupancy;
7. Information demonstrating that any proposed replacement of dwelling units with smaller dwelling units (e.g., a 2-bedroom unit with two 1-bedroom units) is consistent with the housing needs of lower-income households in the jurisdiction.

The Latah County Commissioners, 208-882-8580 is responsible for tracking the replacement of housing and ensuring that it is provided within the required period.

The Latah County Commissioners, 208-882-8580 is responsible for ensuring requirements are met for notification and provision of relocation assistance, as described in CFR 570.606(b) through (g), to any lower-income person displaced by the demolition of any dwelling unit or the conversion of a low/moderate-income dwelling to another use in connection with an assisted activity.

Consistent with the goals and objectives of activities assisted under the Act, the County of Latah will take the following steps to minimize the displacement of persons from their homes:

1. Coordinate code enforcement with rehabilitation and housing assistance programs.
2. Evaluate housing codes and rehabilitation standards in reinvestment areas to prevent their placing undue financial burden on long-established owners or tenants of multi-family build-

3. Stage rehabilitation of apartment units to allow tenants to remain during and after rehabilitation by working with empty units or buildings first.
4. Establish facilities to house persons who must be relocated temporarily during rehabilitation.
5. Adopt public policies to identify and mitigate displacement resulting from intensive public investment in neighborhoods.
6. Adopt policies which provide reasonable protection for tenants faced with conversion to a condominium or cooperative.
7. Adopt tax assessment policies such as deferred tax payment plans to reduce impact of rapidly increasing assessments on lower-income owner-occupants or tenants in revitalizing areas.
8. Establish counseling centers to provide homeowners and renters with information on the assistance to help them remain in their neighborhood in the face of revitalization pressures.

(The jurisdiction should include one or more of the above to implement the planning for minimizing the direct and indirect displacement of persons from their homes.)

The County of Latah hereby certifies it has officially adopted and published said Residential Anti-Displacement and Relocation Assistance Plan. This plan shall become effective February 1, 1993.

CITIZEN PARTICIPATION PLAN Idaho Community Development Block Grant Program COUNTY OF LATAH

Pursuant to the citizens participation requirements of Section 508 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1987, amended, the County of Latah will undertake the following actions to ensure compliance with said requirements as an applicant for or recipient of Idaho Community Block Grant Funds.

1. Conduct at least one public hearing on the ICDBG activities proposed in the ICDBG application submitted to Idaho Department of Commerce (IDC) and at least one public hearing on the status of funded activities.

The application hearing, at minimum, must include a review of: (a) how proposed activities will address the need(s) in the community; (b) how the proposed activities will be funded and sources of the funds; (c) date application will be submitted; (d) amount of ICDBG funds requested; (e) estimated portion of the ICDBG funds requested that will benefit persons of low and moderate income; (f) where the proposed activities will be conducted; (g) plans to minimize displacement of persons and businesses as a result of funded activities; if applicable, (h) plans to assist persons actually displaced, if applicable. The application and related documents must be available for review.

The public hearing on the status of funded activities, at minimum, must include a review of (a) a general description of accomplishments to date; (b) a summary of all expenditures to date; (c) a general description of the remaining work; and (d) a general description of changes made to the ICDBG project budget, performance targets, activity schedules, project scope, location, objectives or beneficiaries.

2. Publish notices of hearing(s) consistent with the requirements of the Idaho Code, Section 60-109. In areas with a Hispanic population, every effort should be made to provide notices in Spanish and have an interpreter at the public hearing. This is especially the case where a significant portion of the persons benefitted by the project are non-English speaking. Provide translators during or after public hearings attended by non-English speaking residents. Written translations of the public hearing may also be helpful.

3. Ensure the public reasonable access to all local meetings, project records and information relating to the proposed and actual use of ICDBG funds. Hearings must be held at times when most citizens can attend, i.e. after regular work hours. All information presented in the hearings shall also be available, upon request, and in a form usable by persons with hearing or visual impairments.

4. Conduct all ICDBG related public meetings or hearings in public buildings or facilities that are accessible to the handicapped. The public notice shall state the hearing will be held in a handicapped accessible facility.

5. Provide citizens the name and address of: (a) the person(s) authorized to receive and respond to citizen proposals, questions and complaints concerning proposed or funded activities; (b) the person(s) that will be available and able to provide technical assistance to groups repre-

sentative of persons of low and moderate income in preparing and presenting their proposals for the request and use of ICDBG funds.

This plan shall become effective February 1, 1993.

SECTION 1. That the County of Latah will comply with the aforementioned requirements related to the implementation and management of Federal Grants.
