## Trans. Board Citizens' Concerns About Hwy 3

Citizens' concerns about the safety of a stretch of Idaho 3 near Kendrick were presented to the Idaho Transportation Board in Boise last Friday by Mike Mitchell, the Board's representative for that area.

Mitchell summarized for fellow board members, Jack X. Combo of Falls and Leon Smith of Twin Falls, the citizens' concerns about the highway's safety and shared more than 400 letters he has received.

The board instructed ITD staff to prepare a report outlining what immediate and long range improvements could be made on Idaho 3 from Arrow junction, east to Little Potlatch Creek. The board also directed ITD staff to advise local law enforcement agencies about the public's concerns over vehicles exceeding the speed limit.

This stretch of road is 20 to 24 feet wide and has heavy automobile traffic plus many farm, logging and wood chip trucks traveling on it.

"My fellow board members were receptive to the citizens' concerns and appreciative of their efforts," Mitchell said. "The board recognizes the need to find out what can be done."

## Recreation District, City, Development Association Face Swimming Pool Finances

Cost of the operation and maintenance of Kendrick War Memorial swimming pool occupied most of the agenda as the J-K Recreation District met Thursday evening, Feb. 18 with representatives of the Kendrick city council, Juliaetta city council and the J-K Community Development Association at the Kendrick City Hall.

Before the subject turned to the swimming pool, Tammy Hitchcock, chairman of the Juliaetta Centennial Park project, gave the Recreation District board an update on the progress of that group. Since September of 1992 when the park committee acquired the land west of Juliaetta a fence has been installed, clearing has been done, access right of way made across the railroad tracks,

and other plans have been made for details. The project workers are pleased with progress so far.

Rita Blewett, a member of the Kendrick council told the Recreation District commissioners that the present sun deck around the pool must be removed because of its deteriorating condition. It is hoped to have this work completed before park activity begins to pick up this spring.

Blewett told the board that the city would like to know the position of the Recreation District in regard to the responsibility they feel toward the pool. The pool has never paid its way, Blewett said. "What does the future hold?" she asked. She added that the city isn't considering abandoning the pool, but it does subsidize the operation with an average of \$8 to \$10 thousand each year.

Dana Magnuson, secretary-treasurer of the Recreation District, said since the district was formed in 1979, it has budgeted \$172,099 for the swim pool for operation and maintenance which included some major repairs and improvements. Last year the district provided \$6,000 for the pool. The district has a mill levy of 0.00205.

While all present seemed to agree that the swimming pool was a very important part of the community. Dean Brocke, chairman of the Rec. District said, "I don't think we should spend all our money on the pool." He pointed out that the district also has to help fund other activities such as the summer ball programs and other activities.

Blewett said what the city would like is an idea of what (funds) might be available on a long-term basis. "I'm comfortable with the \$6,000 figure," Brocke said. The board said the secretary would be instructed to write a letter to the council informing it that an average of \$6,000 could be expected.

It was also pointed out that more than just Kendrick children utilize the pool and it might be feasible for the Juliaetta council to help with the cost of pool operation.

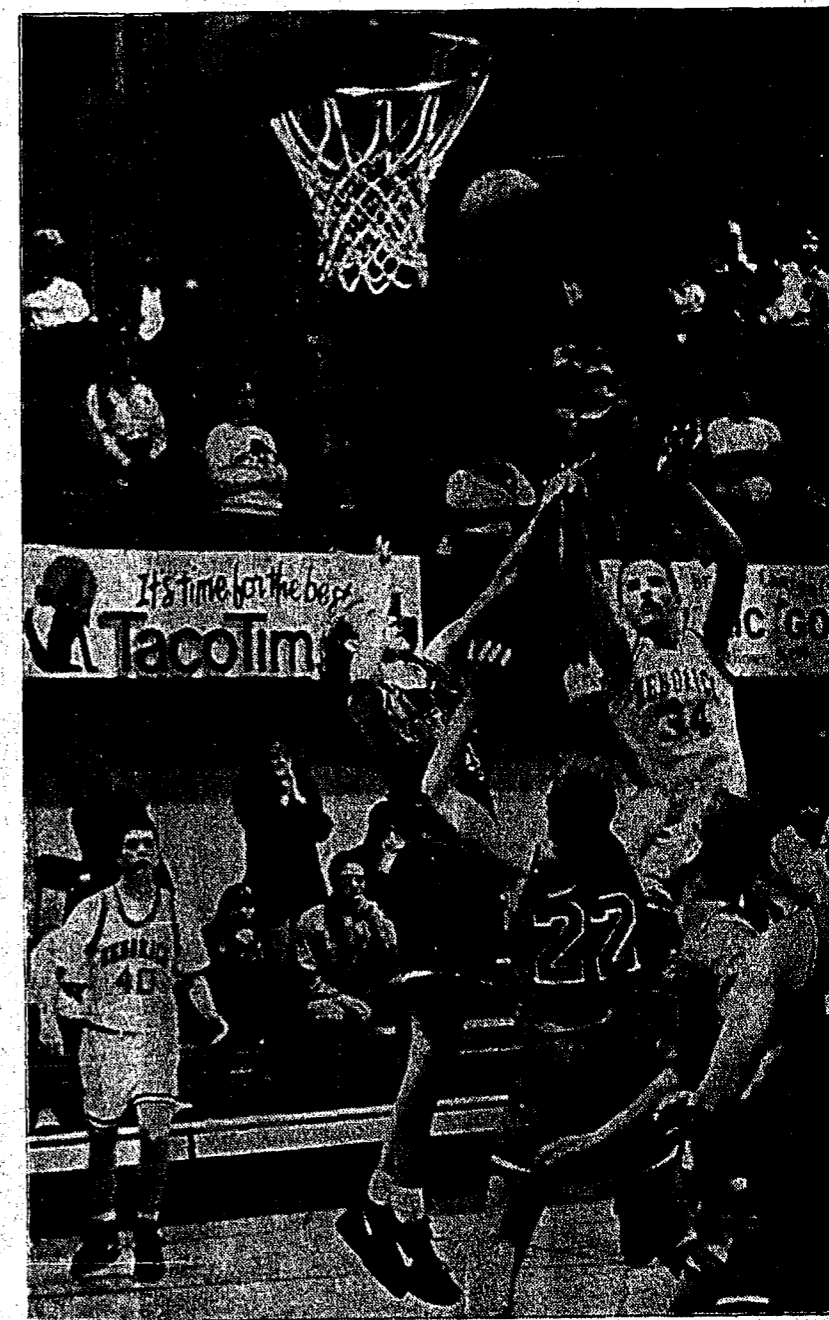
Flower girl was Kayla Pea, cousin of the bride and Rex Ireland, a nephew of the bride. Both are of Juliaetta.

After being defeated by Troy last Wednesday night, the Kendrick Tigers fought back out of the losers' bracket defeating Deary Friday night and Clark Fork Saturday afternoon to win a place in the 1993 State A4 basketball tournament that opens Thursday in Caldwell. Kendrick will play in the opening round against North Gem, the District VI champions at 5 p. m. in the Albion College gym. Kendrick schools will be dismissed on Thursday and Friday.

Kendrick had to withstand a final quarter rush by the Deary Mustangs who scored 31 points in a desperate fourth quarter rally to win 71-69 and earned the right to meet Clark Fork Saturday afternoon at Potlatch.

Kendrick took an early lead in the Friday night game at LCSC gym, outscoring the Mustangs 17-6. Deary found the range in the second quarter and scored 16 points while the Tigers managed only 6. It was a close 23-22 game at the half.

The Tigers kept the lead in the third quarter, but never seemed to get the game under complete control. With a little over 4 minutes left in the game Kendrick was ahead 37-46, their best lead of the game. Deary rallied and closed the scoring gap to a single point 69-68 as Ryan Kirk of the Mustangs scored four three-point baskets in just 38 seconds. Taj Anderson eased the pressure by hitting 2 free throws in the final minute and then Deary missed a final seconds three point attempt.

 Biology Award at  
 BSU Competition**

 Byron Walker, a KHS senior, joined juniors Deanna Carter, Aundi Howerton, Lindsay Groseclose, and Michelle Taylor for a trip to Boise for the BSU Science/Math Competition Day.



Saturday morning, we began testing at 9:00 at BSU and we had an hour and 45 minutes to finish. Deanna and Aundi both agreed that "the test was challenging and we all need to improve our skills and

expand our knowledge in science and math." The highlight of the luncheon banquet was Byron winning the small school Biology Award. He received a deluxe Hewlett-Packard graphing calculator for his efforts. Our Knowledge Bowl buddy from Potlatch, Geoff Beidler, won all the other small school awards and the full ride scholarship to attend BSU. Arriving in Boise Friday eve, we visited the Morrison-Knudson Science Center. Here we took a nature walk observing the habitats of wildlife along the trails. Examples of ways to create habitats include brush piles and wood duck boxes caught our interest. A large man-made stream runs through the small reserve near BSU, an excellent habitat for many salmonid species, sized from eggs to two feet long. There are windows in several places on the outside of the stream banks through which the fish can be seen swimming and interacting.

The Discovery Center was a great opportunity to learn about science concepts and inventions. Experiments such as hearing tests, optical illusions, and electrical tricks, were explained in detail, helping people of all ages understand these processes. A magnet exhibit allowed us to shape iron shavings on and around the magnet; little kinds showed us how the filings would even stick on our hands.

Some ideas were demonstrated by testing yourself. You test coordination by seeing how fast you can flip over pegs with your right hand, left hand and then both hands. A test for your reaction time has a piece of wood that you grab when it falls at the sound of a click. A favorite ex-

**Deobald Family Arrived  
 In Kendrick Area  
 100 Years Ago**

Mrs. Arlene Deobald Wallace of Whitefish, Mont., recently sent the Gazette a clipping telling of the arrival in this area of her grandparents, Charles and Mary Deobald, who came to American Ridge on March 7, 1893—100 years ago. The article first appeared in the Gazette Mar. 17, 1933 and was re-printed in Apr. of 1973.

In June of 1993 the Deobald cousins are planning a family reunion to be held at Kendrick and the American Ridge Deobald family home.

Kendrick Gazette Mar. 17, 1933  
 Mrs. Mary A. Deobald has been a resident of American Ridge for the past 40 years and in speaking of her arrival here 40 years ago, said, "On March 7, 1893 my husband and myself and three little children landed in Kendrick and went to visit my folks on American Ridge. We came by train from Summerfield, Marshall County, Kansas, just 40 years ago today (March 7) and today Mrs. Perry Mattoon and family invited me to their home for dinner in the same house where I had eaten supper with my folks 40 years ago.

I had never seen or tasted lima beans before my folks raised them here on the ridge. This ridge certainly is adapted to the culture of beans. I planted and raised 35 different kinds and have 10 different varieties at home at the present time. In 1920 I took my collection to the Farmer's Bank fair, where I took first prize for the largest collection, and they have kept it on exhibit since.

In the early days oxen were used for hauling lumber over American ridge to Kendrick and Lewiston. I saw some of the biggest and longest loads imaginable drawn by eight yokes of oxen, with five men driving them. In 1893 Brady gulch was just a wagon trail, with only three turn-outs. When you reached a turn-out you had to "yell" or call loud to avoid meeting in a narrow part of the road.

Horses here in those days were mountain cayuses, there being only a few heavy horses in this section. They could not stand the steep hills. My people brought 4 heavy horses with them, 2 bays and 2 grays.

I first came to American Ridge in a 4-horse sled in 1893, and today, 40 years later, I rode in a sled over the same road, to the same house with just about the same amount of snow and weather conditions.

In all these years I have watched the country and American Ridge grow, and I think it "the garden of paradise," where I raised my 6 children, 3 sons and 3 daughters. I saw the first telephone line built on the

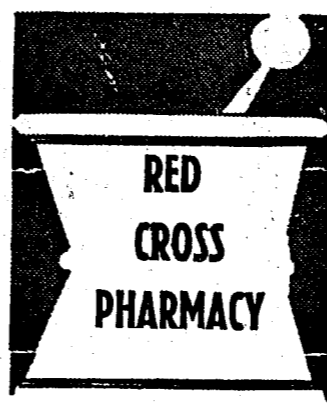

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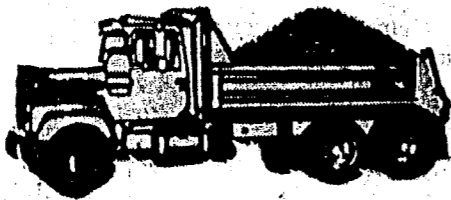
