

Neal R. Craig, 66, Passes March 4

Neal R. Craig, a retired construction worker and Kendrick resident, died Thursday, March 4, of respiratory failure at St. Joseph Regional Medical Center in Lewiston. He had been taken by ambulance to St. Joseph Feb. 27 for treatment of his respiratory problem. He had been admitted to Tri-State Hospital in Clarkston twice in February for emergency treatment. He was 66.

Neal was born Sept. 20, 1926, at Leland, Idaho, the son of Oral and Betty Robeson Craig. He was raised by a step-mother, Sue Robeson Craig. He attended school in Leland and in Kendrick, graduating from Kendrick High School in 1944.

He joined the Army Air Corps in 1945 and attained the rank of corporal. He was discharged in 1946. Craig was a member of Baker-Lind Post 3913, Veterans of Foreign Wars in Kendrick.

He then went to Guam, where he worked construction from November 1950 to February 1952 before returning to the United States.

In 1955 he married Mavis Schumann at Baker, Monona. They were divorced in 1982.

He married Vivian Westendahl Arnett on November 13, 1981 at Coeur d'Alene. She and a grandson, Billy Arnett, survive at the family home.

Over the years he worked in oil fields in Montana, on the construction of Dworksak Dam near Orofino and traveled to various other construction jobs. Neal operated a Cat and road grader on his construction jobs. He was employed by Steelman-Huff Co. when he retired in 1988.

He enjoyed hunting, fishing, camping, and was an avid reader.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Oral and Betty Craig, his step-mother, Sue Robeson Craig, and a sister, Avia Weyen.

Survivors in addition to his wife at the family home include a sister, Laurene Wallace of Cle Elum, Wash.; three sons, Warren Austin of Garden Grove, Calif., Steven Craig and Doug Craig, both of Lewiston; three step-sons, L. Duane Arnett of Clarkston, Leonard Arnett of Fernwood, Idaho, and John Arnett Sr., of Kendrick; a brother Ron Craig of Lewiston; 9 grandchildren and nine step-grandchildren.

A graveside service was held on Wednesday at 2 p. m. at Leland Cemetery in Leland, Idaho, with Rev. Robert Novak, pastor of the Kendrick Assembly of God Church, officiating.

Pearl L. Mead, 92, Passes March 1

Pearl L. Mead, a former resident of Juliaetta, died of causes related to age Monday, March 1, at Good Samaritan nursing home in Moscow. She was 92.

She and her husband, Jack M. Mead moved to Juliaetta in 1946, and he owned and operated Mead and Howard Lumber Co. there until his death in 1964.

She was born Dec. 28, 1900, in Coeur d'Alene to William F. and Ella M. Conderman Perry. She graduated from Coeur d'Alene High School and then worked for several years as a teller for Idaho First National Bank in Coeur d'Alene. On Oct. 27, 1944, she and Mead were married at Hayden Lake, Ida. During the years she lived in Juliaetta she enjoyed gardening and was known for her beautiful yard. She also enjoyed collecting antiques, interior decorating and had traveled extensively through Europe, Africa, the Orient, Hawaii and Mexico.

In 1966, she returned to Coeur d'Alene and in 1974 moved to Spokane. She moved to the Moscow nursing home in February of this year.

She was a former member of the First United Presbyterian Church in Coeur d'Alene and was a charter member of of Malac Temple No. 55 of the Daughters of the Nile in Lewiston. She was a past Matron of Queen Esther Chapter No. 12 of the Order of Eastern Star in Coeur d'Alene.

Survivors include a sister Violet Briggs of Coeur d'Alene; a granddaughter Candice Hoisington, and 3 great-grandchildren, Jon and Jennifer Fey and Kyle Hoisington, all of Juliaetta. Two other granddaughters live in Mississippi and Texas.

A daughter, Jeanne Maxwell, and a brother, Vernon Perry, died previously.

A private family service was held and burial was in the Forest Cemetery at Coeur d'Alene.

There is no charge for this service which is available to persons of all ages.

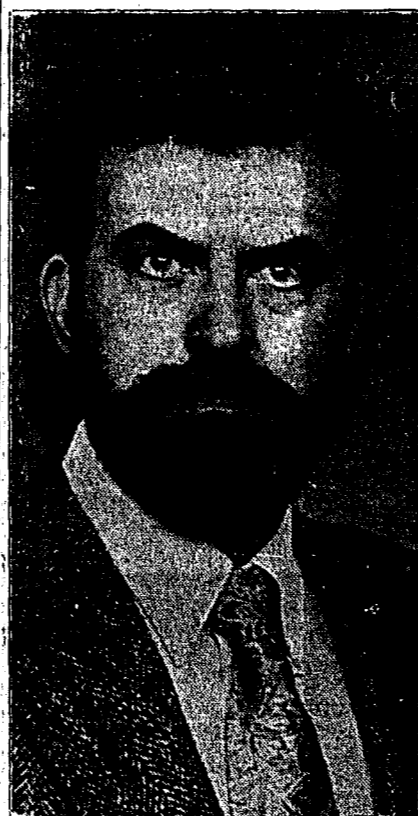

Bioethicist to Speak Here on Living Wills

Stan Tate, a bioethicist associated with Gritman Hospital in Moscow, will be speaking at the next meeting of Kendrick Grange on Tuesday evening, March 16, at 7:00 p. m. His topic will be living wills. The Grange invites the general public to attend this open meeting.

Tate's role as a bioethicist is to deal with the implications of biological research and its applications. As a specialist in ethics, he deals with what is good and bad and with moral duty and obligation. This specialty has become an active part of medical practice and involves all of us, particularly as we age and draw near to the end of our life here.

Living wills allow an individual while still in control of his life to make decisions concerning his medical treatment, decisions which will have the force of law if properly executed. Tate will have copies of living wills on hand and will review their purpose, their content, and their execution.

Biology by making it possible to extend life—some would say existence—has caused numerous questions to be raised, particularly those involving the treatment of persons near death. Living wills address some of those concerns. Tate's talk here has been arranged for by Dick Benjamin, a member of Gritman's board of directors and a Kendrick Granger.

Grange Hears About Rural Education Reform

Guest speaker at last week's meeting of Kendrick Grange was Colette Cozort, Kendrick High science teacher, who shared some concerns regarding rural education reforms. Reporting on a SMART workshop she had attended in Corvallis, Oregon, Cozort made it clear that rural teachers need to become active in their communities and to respond to the ever-present and sometimes uninformed criticism of the public school.

SMART is an acronym for the Science and Math Academy for Rural Teachers. There Cozort and other rural science and math teachers from the Northwest considered all kinds of proposals to improve education, especially science. The big reforms on the education horizon include stressing thinking skills rather than mere memorization, while at the same time keeping the traditional values of rural living and keeping the costs down.

Answering those who blame the schools for all of education's problems, Cozort and her colleagues cite the fact that in the computer age it is impossible to cover all human knowledge—and unnecessary! The goal of education, argued Cozort, should be to uncover knowledge, to inspire young people to explore, and to make science more hands-on than theoretical.

In the future science will not be taught by means of the traditional series of courses—biology, chemistry, physics, for example—but rather as integral parts of an ongoing core curriculum involving the basic skills of language, mathematics, and science. Only at the junior and senior level in high school will some students deal with the traditional abstractions of science. And there will be no textbooks, which tend to stifle curiosity and work against a hands-on approach to learning.

While Cozort had no problem with the increasing use of computers in learning, she plainly resists grant-writing, which according to her is a specialized discipline which only very large school districts can afford.

Here in our own rural district, students are picking their own science projects. One called "Stream-walk" involves a thorough study of the physical environment of a local stream and he implications for the larger environment.

Cozort concluded her talk by urging Grangers to oppose legislation that would take money from so-called rich land districts and give it to urban areas such as Meridian. The future of Kendrick's schools is threatened by this proposed change in state funding of education.

A regular business meeting of the Grange followed Cozort's presentation, which was open to the general public. During the regular meeting, the charter was draped in memory of Jessie Bateman and Ruth Burnvich. Routine business matters were discussed, and a delicious salad and sandwich lunch was served by Bud and Laura Adamson. Grange next meets on Tuesday, Mar. 16, to hear about living wills. (See story elsewhere in today's edition.)

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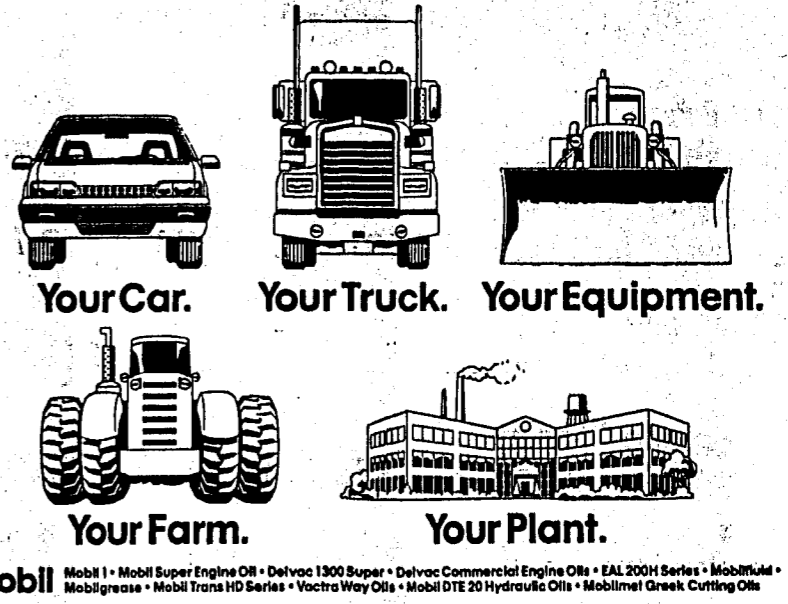
