City to Seek Grant For Kendrick Park Improvement

Kendrick mayor Jerry Brown said Tuesday morning that the city council will submit an application to the Forest Service seeking a \$30,000 grant that would help replace the deck around the War Memorial Swimming Pool with a new multi-use facility that would serve not only as a deck for the pool but also be

a platform that would allow greater use of the pool and Kendrick City Park by area residents, community art groups, schools and civic organizations. Such grant funds are available, if approved, by the 1990 Farm Bill Implementing Community Action Plans. Brown said the application will be submitted to the Forest Service this Friday.

The old wooden deck has deteriorated to the point where it now is a public safety hazard and should be removed. Removal of the deck will limit access to the viewing side of the pool. It will also deprive the public the use of a platform for community presentations such as plays, concerts, and choral recitals. A new deck and performing arts platform is necessary, it is felt, to gain the maximum benefits of the pool and the park.

Adding this new multi-use facility would also meet the Gem Community five-year or long range action plans such as attracting retirees to visit and settle in the area, attract craftsmen, artists and other self-employed people to settle in the area, increase tourism into the city and the surrounding areas, and support the efforts of the community arts association to attract cultural events for the benefit of residents and also tourists.

The city council and other members of the community will decide on the design of the new deck/platform based on the work done by the students of the Art and Architecture Department at the University of Idaho.

Plans are that after the 1993 swimming season is over, the process of removing the existing deck will begin using donated labor and additional in-kind services. Construction of the new multi-use facility, supervised by the city of other designated representative, will begin in September with a projected completion date of October 31. Landscaping, involving input from other community groups will be done by volunteer labor.

KHS Annual Staff Salutes Kendrick's Red Cross Pharmacy

The 1992-93 KHS Annual staff adopted a new policy—Spring Delivery. This means that the annuals will arrive before school is out. Students can carry their yearbooks with them, getting them signed those last few days.

Reminiscing will be a great break from the intensity of final test reviews and finals themselves. It will be a time to reflect on the year. Seniors will be recalling all the K-12 years as they say goodbye to many schoolmates and say hello to the new world.

Busy all year meeting the March deadline, now the staff can concentrate on completing the advertising responsibilities. This week we want to spotlight Red Cross Pharmacy, represented last spring by Dave Clayton in panel discussions. The staff had invited sponsors to tell us about their business and their role in the community. We wanted to know about job descriptions for employees.

The Red Cross Pharmacy has been in business on Kendrick's main street since 1905. The store is nicely appointed with cards, gifts, sundries, vet supplies and all kinds of things you might want to check out. Recent owners, Dave and Barbara Clayton, expect employees to want to work and do what needs to be done without having to be told. They are always clean and enthusiastic. New employees begin training by cleaning. This is essential for a pharmacy and it's still important to count out change. It cuts down on cash register mistakes as well as being more courteous to the customer. Dave has been especially proud of his delivery service for people who can't get to the store or middle of the night emergencies; it's important for people to get their medicine when they need it.

Asked what he thinks about school kids these days, Dave was full of praise. He is delighted to see more school activities focusing on community involvement—such as the BPA putting up street signs and annual articles, for example. Students are polite in his store, they never litter and they call him "Dave". He says he doesn't always know them, but it makes him feel good to be recognized.

Isn't that the way it is for all of us? The annual staff would like to thank Dave for his 43 years of service to the community. Last May he told us of his retirement—we didn't know if we should "scoop" the formal announcement. Now, Barbara continues working in the store as son Doug has taken over the pharmacy. We wish the whole Clayton family the best in their new ventures.

A special note from Miss Cozort: A few weeks ago I needed more heavy duty cough syrup. I realized this as I packed my bottle to go to the jazz concert in Moscow on Saturday afternoon. I stopped by Pay-Less and was told that they didn't carry it. Then I asked if they could call Market Time to see if they had it, I was told I would just have to go there and ask myself. Since Wal-Mart was closer, I went there. They had the medicine, but it cost \$1.50 more than the bottle I had purchased at Red Cross Pharmacy. When I asked if they had a "lowest price guarantee", I was told that they usually sell prescriptions for a dollar less than competitors. I showed the pharmacist my Red Cross bottle and receipt. She said, "Well, I'm not sure how he (the boss) prices those." She did not offer further suggestions. The moral of the story is to shop locally (which I do) whenever you can.

Local stores have what you need at a fair price. I have found lovely jewelry and watch batteries at the Red Cross Pharmacy. One time, after buying a tool at Fleming's and paper from Doug, I was allowed to go in the back and gift wrap. It was great to walk in the door that night with a birthday gift ready for my husband to open. Local businesses pay taxes and are constantly bombarded for donations to fund nearly every community and school activity. For financial reasons, we need to support them so we will have their convenience and also so they can continue supporting us. More importantly, in my view, we should shop at home because the owners know us and treat us right.

The annual staff salutes the Red Cross Pharmacy for its continued patronage.

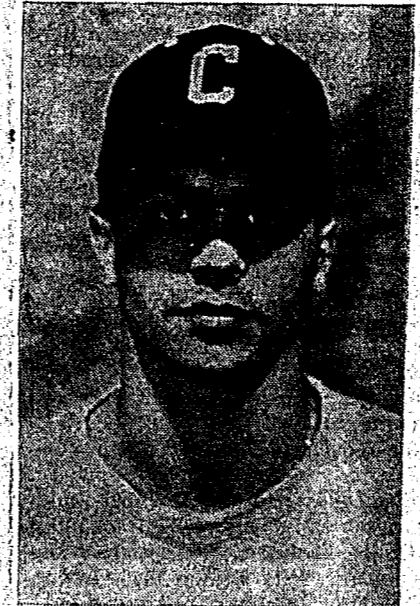

Sen. Gary Schroeder Leads Senate Effort Helping Blind Children

Legally blind Idaho school children will now have the opportunity to learn braille in the classroom thanks to a bill guided through the Idaho Senate by freshman Sen. Gary Schroeder, R-Moscow.

"The intent of this bill is require that school districts offer these students the same opportunity to learn, communicate and become productive citizens as those students who are not vision-impaired," explained Schroeder.

The bill calls for Idaho school districts to provide training in braille to students between the ages of three and 21 who are legally blind and still in school.

There are no additional costs associated to the measure either to the state or to Idaho school districts.

"It's necessary to teach braille at an early age because research shows that children learn most easily at the younger ages," Schroeder said. "Government is about helping people help themselves," Schroeder remarked "This is such a bill."

City of Kendrick, J-K Senior Citizens Get Block Grants

Months of planning, a mountain of paper work, public meetings and a trip to Boise, all came together late last week as the City of Kendrick and the Kendrick-Julietta Senior Citizens' Center were among five north Idaho communities that were awarded grants totaling \$1.24 million through the Idaho Community Development Block Grant program, Idaho Gov. Cecil D. Andrus announced Monday.

The City of Kendrick was awarded a grant of \$124,019 for a new fire station which will be constructed on city property next to the swimming pool. The building will be 3,575 sq. feet with four bays and a meeting room. The grant will be matched by donations of \$35,200 in cash and \$15,782 in labor, equipment and materials by the city, the Kendrick Volunteer Fire Department and local citizens.

The new facility will replace the old crowded fire station and meeting room on main street.

Kendrick mayor Jerry Brown and councilman David Klatt flew to Boise Thursday to address the state committee on behalf of Kendrick's application for the grant.

"We are very pleased about receiving the grant," Mayor Brown said Tuesday morning. With much of the preliminary work already done, Brown said the council hopes to call for bids by the end of April, open the bids in May and have the project underway in June.

This is the second grant the City of Kendrick has received in recent weeks. A \$10,000 grant was awarded to Kendrick by the Forest Service for the installation of a Recreational Vehicle Dumping facility. Brown said the city hopes to be able to call for bids on this project sometime in May.

The \$42,259 grant to the Kendrick Senior Center will not only solve the problem of a leaking roof, but will also provide handicapped access to the building, allow for new carpeting and improve restroom facilities.

Frank Jacobson, coordinator of the Gem Community program and an active worker in senior citizens affairs, also was in Boise last week merce board concerning the grant. It is expected that work on the senior center will begin as soon as possible, work on the senior center will begin as soon as possible.

It should also be noted that Dana Magnuson, local insurance agent and a Latah County Commissioner, is a member of the state board that decides on the awarding of the grant. Mr. Magnuson was excused from the board's decision concerning the local grants.
