Ray C. King, 83, Formerly of Cavendish, Passes

Ray C. King, 83, a former resident of the Cavendish area, died of cancer Monday, March 22, at his home in Lewiston.

He was born April 10, 1909, at Tacoma, Wash., to James R. and Nancy Flanary King. The family moved to Cavendish, Idaho, when he was an infant and he grew up there, attending schools at Southwick.

After graduating from high school there in 1927, he lived at Cavendish and Pierce, where he worked in the lumber mills.

He married Gladys Marie Candler on June 14, 1932, at Clarkston. The couple made their home at Cavendish, where King later owned a logging and sawmill operation.

After retiring from that business in 1961, he went to work operating a road grader for the Clearwater County road department in the Cavendish area. He retired in 1975.

King and his wife continued to live at Cavendish for several years. She died March 30, 1990. He moved to Lewiston in 1991.

He was a former member of Kendrick Lodge No. 26, A. F. & A. M. He enjoyed gardening, woodworking, particularly making cabinets, hunting and fishing, boating and traveling.

Survivors include a son, Carl R. King of Lewiston; two grandchildren, and seven great-grandchildren.

Three brothers and two sisters died previously.

Funeral services were conducted Friday morning at Brower-Wann, with the Rev. David Tucker of the Faith Tabernacle Church of Lewiston officiating. Burial followed at Normal Hill Cemetery in Lewiston.

Memorials may be given to the Juliaetta-Kendrick Ambulance Fund.

At its last public meeting back in March, the Grange learned about how to provide for a living will and a durable power of attorney for health care, both meant to assure that person's choices concerning medical treatment are honored even though the individual may be unable consciously to make such decisions during a critical or terminal illness.

Stan Tate, a bioethicist, was the presenter. Tate's PhD degree in bioethics followed a career that began with a philosophy major and MA degree in theology and went on to include his being ordained as both a Presbyterian and an Anglican clergyman and serving as Professor of Religion at Boise State University.

Tate, who has a deep respect for all religions, raises the question whether we are doing a terminal patient a favor by keeping him alive. He urged those present to review the legal forms he furnished and then to take action. Unfortunately, only 15-16% of the people who go over the forms ever sign them. They say one thing, but not signing puts families and bioethicists in a dilemma when a person is beyond communicating his wishes.

The Grange also learned on March 16 that Jim Black is the citizen of the year to be honored at a potluck supper on Tuesday, April 20.

June I. Storer, 78, Formerly of Kendrick, Dies March 24

June I. Storer, a former Kendrick area resident, died of a massive heart attack at Medical Lake, Wash., Wednesday, March 24. She was 78. She was born to John and Jessie Davis at Missoula, Mont June 23, 1914.

The family moved to Cameron, in about 1926. They later settled on a small farm one mile from Kendrick on the American Ridge Grade. She graduated from Kendrick High School.

She married Orville Storer July 30, 1942 at Kendrick. In 1944 they moved to Craigmont where they farmed the "Watts Place" until they moved to Moscow in 1964. He died in 1971.

She worked on the U. of I campus until 1973 when she moved to Medical Lake to be near her daughter and family. While at Medical Lake she worked as a resident counselor at Lakeland Village, a youth annex of Eastern State Hospital.

She was a member of the Lake City Assembly of God Church at Medical Lake, the Washington State Retired Employees Organization, and the Medical Lake Senior Citizens.

Survivors include a daughter Mary Storer of Medical Lake; a sister Margaret Brennen of Kalspell, Mont., a brother, Wayland Davis of Las Vegas, Nevada; and two grandchildren. A son, Milo, died in 1965. A brother, Verner, died in 1992.

Funeral services were held Monday at the Lake City Assembly of God Church, the Rev. Dave Phillips officiating.

Graveside services were held on Monday at the Moscow City Cemetery.

The cantata consists of a cast of approximately forty with an accompanying tape of full orchestration. There is no admission charge.

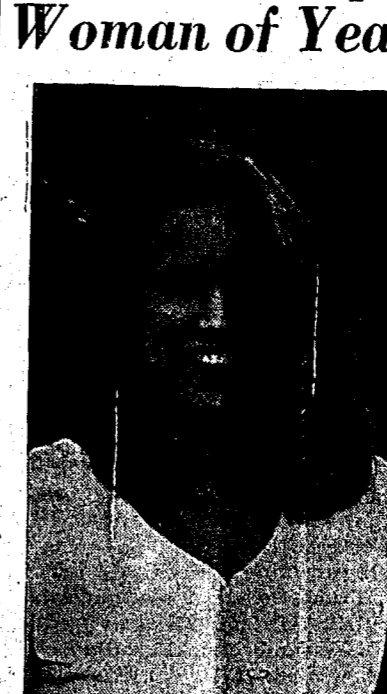
