GreenStock-'93 Floundered In a Sea of Mud

The much-publized "Greenstock-93", a weekend outdoor music festival to be held in the Cedar Creek area 14 miles east of Kendrick was canceled Saturday afternoon after heavy rains turned the site into a quamire of water and mud. Hundreds of cars and thousands of feet reduced the roads and fields into muddy messes. The festival was scheduled to begin Friday afternoon and traffic through Kendrick was a steady stream from Friday midmorning until Saturday noon. Also steady was the heavy rain. The rain continued on through the night Friday but by noon on Saturday it was apparent that the event was doomed and promoters made the announcement that the festival was canceled.

The cancellation left thousands of of would-be-celebrants stranded in the muddy fields and roadsides. The promoters hired local farmers to aid pulling the vehicles out of the mud to solid ground. Hundreds of wet, muddy concertgoers spent a miserable three days before seven school buses from the Kendrick school district were hired Monday morning to transport the young people from the site of the washed out concert back to Moscow's fair

grounds. Many vehicles are still in the fields and it is unknown when conditions or time will permit their removal.

Although most people and officials agreed that plans and preparations for the event were inadequate, and local residents argued futilely that these conditions could result in the event of bad weather, it was obvious that no one expected the amount of rain that fell over the weekend.
