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Burt and Vera Souders will be Two of the Grand Marshals for Locust Blossom Festival



Ask just anyone about the legend that put Kendrick on the map and they will likely tell you... "Burt's Cafe." The fellowship and enjoyment of drinking and eating together have long been the glue that holds a community united. Burt's Cafe in Kendrick has been such a place for a long, long time.

Burt and Vera Souders are one of the couples being honored as Grand Marshals of the Locust Blossom Festival May 29 in honor of their commitment to this community in the form of food service. I would probably be safe in saying they have provided a meal for about everyone in this part of Idaho sometime during the post-war years up to 1969. Burt was famous for "slapping" the burgers on the grill, while Vera provided the pies and other delicious morsels that made Burt's Cafe famous. They stayed open—more nights than they care to remember—to feed ball players and cheerleaders from not only Kendrick, but every surrounding town after games. The cafe was always open late after a dance to provide breakfast or a hot cup of coffee on the way home.

Burt and Vera are both natives of the Kendrick area. Burt was born April 9, 1909, the son of Frank and Grace Souders. The children born to this family in the order of birth were: Frank, Ida, George, Burt, Elmer, Marion, and Marvin. They lived in a log cabin in the Crescent area. Vera was born to Claude and Emma Craig on July 13, 1913. Her father was called "The Bean King of the Potlatch" as he raised many fields of beans in the Leland area. The couple also raised eight children: Bonnie, Bertha, Alva, Minnie, Ivan, Vera, Neva, and David. While growing up on the farm, Vera cooked for farm hands, serving 10 to 20 men at a time. She also worked in her father's fields hoeing beans. She attended school at Leland and graduated from Lewiston High School.

When asked when and how they met, they both gave each other a quizzical look and replied, "Darn if they knew." It seems it was probably at a "Kitchen Sweat." Having never heard of a Kitchen Sweat, I had to be told it was a "Barn Dance" that was held in the house. You move all the furniture out, pick up a fiddle, find a piano player, and dance until dawn. The kids are sent off to bed and everyone has a wonderful time until the wee hours of the morning when everyone goes home. However, it could have been when Burt worked for Vera's dad skidding timbers for the new barn in Leopold Canyon.

At any rate, it was a good marriage and it started off with bang, according to some of the old timers who went to the charavari. The young couple were living peacefully at the old Kyle cabin in Leopold Canyon when well-wishers split the night's quiet with rifle shots, dynamite and beating on tubs with clubs. This was a customary serenade for newlyweds. Burt and Vera will have been married 60 years this July 13. After their marriage in Moscow, Burt worked one summer for the U. S. Forest Service at Elk River. The couple then moved to Kellogg where they spent the next eleven years. Burt worked in the zinc smelter on the roaster floor as a shift boss at the gate house, and finally as an aluminum welder. Their only child, Burt, Jr., was born in Kellogg. They returned to Kendrick and purchased the cafe from Elmer McCoy on July 5, 1945. They reminisced that their first baker was Stella Leath. They usually baked seven pies a day, but during the sugar shortage years, usually double that amount. The cafe wasn't subject to the same rationing as individual

families, and people were "sugar hungry." During the slot machine years, business boomed.

The first year they bought the cafe it was a scorcher. The Souders installed the first swamp cooler in Kendrick in their cafe. People were thrilled to be able to come in and cool off and have a cool drink. They remodeled the cafe in 1948. Then came the fire in 1953 which destroyed their storage area and made a genuine mess of the rest. They replaced the floor tile (which is currently on the floor of the Diner), refinished the booths, and rebuilt the storage area. The work was performed by Walt Spraber and Ernest Helmgartner. They have pride in the fact they provided a good family atmosphere and excellent food.

Of course the 1950's found many people coming to town on Saturday night to see the movie and gather at Burt's Cafe.

In 1948, Burt leased the cafe to Bernadine Hudson Peters and purchased the Ed Dammarrell oil distributorship. He operated the Mobil Oil plant for three years and sold it to Hedler Oil Company.

The Souders built the house that is now owned by Bill Blewett in 1949. They retired in 1969 and spent their winters in Arizona and the summers in Kendrick—typical snow bird behavior.

They have both proven to be "survivors," having overcome many obstacles and stress-filled times. Burt was shot in the shoulder in a hunting accident and spent 28 days in St. Luke's Hospital in Spokane. Kendrick really looked good to him when the late Bill and Ava Weyen drove him home.

Likewise, after being diagnosed with a malignancy, Vera overcame cancer with cobalt treatments at Holy Family Hospital in Spokane. She made the doctors hurry with her surgery since she, "wanted to go to Arizona so bad, I just couldn't stand it." She has recovered completely.

While the cafe was probably the most time consuming part of their life, the most rewarding is their three grandchildren and three great-grandchildren, as well as their son Burt, Jr., and his wife Sandy. Time passes, and if you visit their home you will find mementos from every stage of life. They enjoy their home, their garden, and looking in on neighbors.

Gloria W. Choate Passes April 27

Kendrick homemaker and retired waitress Gloria M. Wilson Choate died Tuesday, April 27, at her home of heart failure. She was 68.

She was born to Axel V. and Lena M. Brown Swanson February 5, 1925 at Kendrick.

When Gloria was 3 years old the family moved from Kendrick to the Crescent area, 7 miles from Southwick. She attended grade school at Crescent and high school at Southwick. At the age of 17, Gloria worked for lumber camps, where she "flunked" in the dining room off the cook shack. That was where she met Clarence Wilson, whom she wed in February of 1946. He died on Aug. 19, 1957.

She lived in different places in the Northwest all her life and worked many years as a waitress in various parts of North Central Idaho. Gloria worked hard to provide for and raise her family.

She married Vernon Choate in 1964. The couple later divorced. In 1985 she retired and moved back to Kendrick.

Survivors include two sons, Richard D. Wilson of Genesee, and David C. Wilson of Lewiston; two sisters, Alma Finke of Southwick and Esther Souders of Kendrick, and a grandson Monte Wilson of Lewiston.

Two brothers, Alfred Swanson and Axel Swanson, Jr.; two sisters, Lena Swanson and Alpha Blalock and a grandson, Ryan Wilson died previously.

K-J Development Assoc. Reporter Stresses Regional Approach for Seniors

Speaking before local seniors at the meal site last Friday noon, the local development association's liaison representative Frank Jacobson complimented the group for its recent success in acquiring community development grant funds to complete phase II of the renovation of the Senior Center. At the same time he encouraged them to consider the debt of gratitude they owe to the Latah County Commissioners and to Eric Phillips of the Clearwater Economic Development Association (CEDA) for their support and direct involvement as partners in this achievement.

Dana Magnuson, who was present at the luncheon, will along with his fellow commissioners oversee the project. Professional help will be provided by Phillips' organization

as the administrators and the architectural firm of Castellaw Kom as the designers and superintendents of the work to be done. Jacobson called the seniors' attention to the regional support and cooperation needed to make their local project possible.

Continuing to stress regionalism, Jacobson commented on Gem Community involvement in the drafting of CEDA's overall economic development plan. Required by Federal law, the five-year plan being put together by representatives of CEDA's board and Gem Communities such as Kendrick-Juliaetta is regional in its statement of goals and objectives. Specific projects, such as the renovation of a senior center, must in the future tie in with the plan. Improving, replacing, and adding new infrastructure as needed will likely be the top priority of the plan, once adopted by CEDA's board of directors, on which Darrel Brocke and Jeff Lohman serve.

Referring to the colorful tourist guide to North Central Idaho provided each senior, Jacobson said that that was another example of a regional approach to community and economic development. Paid for by state grant monies generated by a statewide room tax, the brochure is one way in which the North Central Idaho Travel Association works to promote tourism in this region. K-J Community Development Association is a working partner in this regional effort and is represented on that association's board of directors.

Jacobson's final comments, while still stressing regionalism, were more personal as he praised Latah County Commissioner Dana Magnuson for encouraging a positive public attitude during the recent Mud-Stuck fiasco. Confessing that while his first reaction was to blame the commissioners and to fear the worst, Jacobson said that he recalled how on an earlier occasion Magnuson had said to him, "It doesn't do any good to point the finger of blame. We have a problem. Let's get to work and see what can be done to solve it."

Citing Magnuson as a "can-do kind of guy," Jacobson asked the seniors, "Can you imagine any other county commissioners who would be out pushing cars through the mud—and in various other ways helping solve the problems at hand?" Jacobson had praise not only for all the people in the community, especially nearby farmers, who by and large maintained that positive attitude that Magnuson encouraged and thus helped keep a messy problem from turning into what many had feared would be a nasty one.

The community spirit that saw us through this challenge does not grow in a vacuum. It must be nurtured by regional support and encouragement. The K-J Community Development Assoc., according to Jacobson encourages regional approaches to local problems.
