NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That it is the intent of the City Council to sell certain real property owned by the City, including the building located on the premises. The description of this property is as follows, to wit:

West 20 feet, Lot 3, Block 4, Original Kendrick Townsite, Kendrick, Latah County, Idaho.

SECTION 2. That sale of said property shall be to the highest bidder. Five percent of the sale price shall be deposited by the high bidder at the time of bid opening; the remainder of the bid price shall be paid within thirty (30) days of acceptance of the bid by the City Council. The City Council reserves the right to reject any and all bids.

SECTION 3. That the sale of property shall be conducted in accordance with the requirements of Idaho Code sections 50-1401 through 50-1407.

SECTION 4. That the Mayor and City Clerk are hereby authorized and directed to, sixty (60) days after the passage of this Ordinance, and after consideration is received from the successful bidder, execute and deliver a deed for the real property described herein.

SECTION 5. That should a petition expressing dissatisfaction with this sale be filed with the City Clerk within sixty (60) days following the passage of this Ordinance containing the names of at least ten (10) percent of the qualified electors, then contemplated sale shall not occur until the appropriate special election is held on the question of whether or not to sell the property.

SECTION 6. EFFECTIVE DATE. That this ordinance shall be in full force from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.

There has been an increase in taxable property values in Latah County over the last year. Because of this increase in assessed valuation, more taxes will be collected this year than last year.

The new Truth in Taxation law requires that the School District notify its patrons any time there is an increase of more than 5% in the dollars collected for property taxes. However, the increase in total dollars collected probably will not increase the dollars available to schools. This is because when the local property tax support increases, the state funding decreases in an attempt to equalize the dollars available to all school districts across the state.

This increase is automatic and in no way affects the supplemental/override levy.

DEFINITIONS

- ad valorem taxes = taxes based on property value = Maintenance and Operations or M & O levy
- permissive levy = portion of M & O levy not voted on by public but based on property value
- supplemental levy = override levy = portion of levy suggested by Board of Trustees and voted on by patrons each year
- permissive levy + supplemental levy = M & O levy = ad valorem taxes equalization =

system by which the State Department of Education subtracts local tax dollars from the state funding allocation in an attempt to equalize dollars available to all school districts.

NOTICE OF TAX INCREASE

Kendrick School District No. 283 has proposed to increase its annual budget by an amount of ad valorem tax revenues that exceeds 105% of the ad valorem tax revenues certified for its annual budget during the previous year by 4.23% or its ad valorem property tax rate by 9.4%. I have Scleroderma, an insidious disease which for centuries has been described as "the disease that turns women to stone." The cause is unknown and there is no cure.

After being strong and active for many years, I find you must limit yourself to accommodate the disease. So when I say "no" to some things, I hope you will understand. Going out to eat isn't a big treat any more because your digestive system is hardening and you can't eat much at a time. You sleep only two hours at a time. Your house is too hot because the slightest chill turns your fingers cold and white. You have a lot of pain and discomfort.

I've joined the Scleroderma Foundation so I can keep up with the latest medication and treatment. I'm enclosing information for anyone interested or who may have this disease.

Sclero What?

Scleroderma, which is neither contagious nor hereditary, afflicts nearly three-quarters of a million people in the United States—80 percent of them women between the ages of 25 and 55. It is more prevalent than muscular dystrophy or multiple sclerosis, according to Thomas Meds-

ger, M. D., chairman of the United Scleroderma Foundation Medical Advisory Board, but is it not well known and often may be undiagnosed or misdiagnosed. Symptoms include:

- * swelling, hardening and thickening of the skin,
- * spasms of the small blood vessels in the extremities, with severe discomfort and color changes when exposed to cold or stress,
- * weight and hair loss,
- * joint pain,
- * swallowing difficulties,
- * ulcers on the fingertips,
- * extreme fatigue,

Medical science has found no cure for scleroderma and only a few symptoms respond to treatment because the cause is unknown. Researchers believe it's a disease of both the vascular and immune systems and a severe connective tissue disorder. Decreased circulation and increased production of collagen (the body's fibrous protein which some women rub on their faces or have injected to their wrinkles to make them look younger) hardens the skin and internal organs including the esophagus, heart, lungs and kidneys.

As scleroderma advances, it can render its victims helpless to perform the simplest task.
