The new Truth in Taxation law requires that the School District notify its partons any time there is an increase of more than 5% in the dollars collected for property taxes. However, the increase in total dollars collected probably will not increase the dollars available to schools. This is because when the local property tax support increases, the state funding decreases in an attempt to equalize the dollars available to all school districts across the state.

This increase is auomatic and in no way affects the supplemental/override levy.
