

Fatal Mudslide Scars Still Remain



Traffic flows normally and without interruption on this short section of Highway 3 just a half-mile east of Juliaetta, but local residents are reminded of the tragedy that occurred two weeks ago when a mudslide roared down from the north hillside to claim the lives of a Kendrick businessman and his wife, Eugene and Florence Brocke in an avalanche of mud, rocks and water at 7:00 o'clock the evening of June 2.

Work crews have cleared the highway of the debris left when the saturated ground above the road could bear no more pressure and sent water, mud, trees and boulders thundering down the slope and onto the highway at the moment the Brockes were driving west. The force of the rushing mass of earth shoved the Brocke car off the highway, over an embankment and down on a flat place next to Potlatch River where it was turned upside down and covered with tons of material. Rescue workers battled for an hour to locate and free the victims, but the struggle was in vain.

The earth will slowly heal its scars, as it always does, but the memory of that evening will remain in the hearts and minds of the community for many years to come.


