'It Begins with the People' County Planner tells Grange meeting Tuesday

If last Tuesday evening's guest speaker at the Grange Hall had spoken only on the topic originally suggested to him, it would have been like starting the second volume of a two-part novel first. As Grangers and their public guests learned, zoning is the second, more technical part of a two part process called planning and zoning. Fortunately for his audience, Gerald Billington, Latah County's Planner, began with volume 1.

It would presumably be possible to have zoning without planning, but it would smack of dictatorship and not reflect public policy, which is the responsibility of elected officials—men and women chosen by the public to represent them in protect-

ing community interests.

While planning is a policy issue, zoning is a legal one and the province of bureaucrats who craft the language of the zoning laws to reflect what the people value in their community and what they want to preserve or promote.

According to Billington planning protects the interests of the larger community and at the same time prevents injustices or hardships. It protects existing land use and even protects a land owner from his own poor choices of land use. At the same time, planning is not meant to be a roadblock to land development initiatives or a means of continuing personal or family feuds. It is not intended to be a "closing of the door" to future change.

Billington finds the planning and zoning process in Latah County to have certain strengths. For one thing, there is cooperation from its citizens, for rather than attack zoning laws as being unfair they ask how they can meet the requirements of the law. He also finds decisions of the County Commissioners and the Planning and Zoning Commission to be quite reasonable, even-handed.

Among some weaknesses in the system he notes the need for better protection of prime ag land. Marginal land can better be used for housing than prime agricultural or timber land. The development up Cedar Creek he sees as somewhat erratic, a hodge-podge of uses—an area in the county that should have been more fully scrutinized in the planning and zoning process.

Things needed for the future include taking steps to simplify the planning/zoning process and reducing duplication of effort between the County Commissioners and the P & Z Commission.

Asked if preparing a city's comprehensive plan is too technical for the average citizen to be involved in, Billington said that citizen involvement in the planning stage is critical. Unless the elected officials have input from the public, how can they know what the people value and want preserved? He offered to come and help an interested group begin the planning process. On the other hand, he noted that it looked like Kendrick was planned. Perhaps it doesn't need planning and zoning (despite a state law that mandated a comprehensive plan back in 1975). But that's for the people to say, he concluded.

Muriel Oylear, 88, Former Resident, Passes June 18

Muriel A. Oylear, 88, a retired Latah County farmer and former Kendrick resident, died of age-related causes Friday, June 18 at the Lewiston Care Center.

She was born June 24, 1904, in Kendrick to Charles and Petre Paulson Westendahl. She grew up and attended school at Kendrick.

She married Jesse C. Oylear on May 24, 1922, at Moscow. The couple farmed in the Lenville area near Moscow for several years. During the depression years, her husband began selling cars in Troy and later at Pullman.

In the 1930s, they moved to Libby, Montana, and her husband continued to sell cars there. He later purchased the Libby Motors, a Dodge-Chrysler dealership and operated it until returning to Moscow during World War II.

They began farming and ranching in the Kendrick area until 1955, when they moved to Harvard. They owned and operated a ranch there for many years and she cooked for their haying and thrashing crews who worked on the couple's farms and ranches.

Her husband died Jan. 1, 1975, and she continued to live at Harvard until entering the Lewiston Care Center in April 1993.

Oylear enjoyed fancy handwork, including embroidery and crocheting. In earlier years, she also had traveled extensively by car with her husband, and enjoyed fishing and spending time at their cabin on Lake Coeur d'Alene.

She was a member of the Harvard Ladies Club.

Survivors include a grandson, Denny Deobald of Lewiston; two great-grandchildren; and several nieces and nephews.

A daughter, Elizabeth D. "Bette" Deobald, died Dec. 16, 1981, and a son, Bud Oylear, died Dec. 4, 1988. A sister and two brothers also died previously.

The funeral service was held on Monday, June 21 at Short's Funeral Chapel, with Rev. Gerard Kulper of the Potlatch Grace Lutheran Church officiating. Burial followed at the Moscow Cemetery.

Memorials may be given to the Potlatch Fire and Ambulance Fund.

Bertha L. Marek of Kendrick, a longtime area homemaker, died of cancer Sunday, June 13, at the Lewiston Care Center. She was 83.

She was born Oct. 14, 1909, at Harrisburg, Idaho, near Kamiah, to Eddie Warren and Jennie Simmerman Knight.

She grew up and attended schools in the Kamiah area, and later married James Frank Marek Jr. Dec. 8, 1928, at Grangeville.

The couple lived at Grangeville, Genesee, Weippe and Lewiston before moving to Rose Lake, near Coeur d'Alene, in 1974. He died March 9, 1980.

She moved to Kendrick in 1983. She enjoyed sewing, flower gardening and raising cattle and Appaloosa horses.

Survivors include three sons, Norman (Bud) Marek of St. Maries, Idaho, Gary Marek of Cataldo, Idaho, and Frank R. (Tom) Marek of Kendrick; two daughters, Donna Perkins of North Bend, Ore., and Mickie Myers of Coeur d'Alene; two brothers, Raymond Knight of Winchester and Lyle Knight of Kamiah; two sisters, Mae Kane of Portland, Oregon, and Mary Lang of Lewiston; 22 grandchildren and 36 great-grandchildren. A daughter died previously.

A memorial service will be held at 10 a. m. June 30 at Mountain View Funeral Home in Lewiston with the Rev. Dan George of Southwick Community Church officiating. Burial will follow at Lewis-Clark Memorial Gardens in Lewiston.

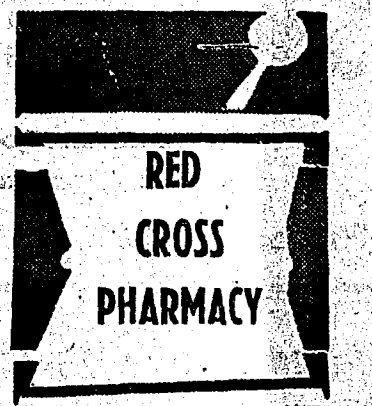

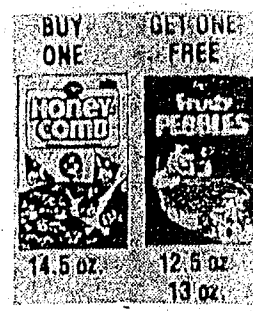

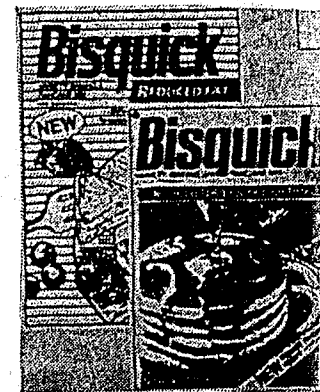
