## New Issue of "Latah Legacy" Now Available

Did you know that the Latah Nursing Home, now the Latah Care Center was the first of its kind built in Idaho? or that Lola Clyde recited a verse of Rudyard Kipling on the CBS Evening News in 1987, or in 1916 county residents gathered on the Fourth of July in Moscow to see moving colored pictures of the Mawson Antarctic expedition.

These facts are from articles appearing in the latest issue of "Latah Legacy", published by the Latah County Historical Society. Grace Wicks, local author and historian, adds her personal reminiscence to the article on Latah Care Center, describing conditions at the original county poor farm which included a large farmhouse, a pest house for people with communicable diseases, a hospital, several other outbuildings, and "an outhouse or two." After visiting the Poor Farm one afternoon, Mrs. Wicks headed a vigorous campaign to convince residents and county commissioners to support construction and operation of a modern facility. The efforts succeeded, and on May 1, 1957, the patients moved into the Latah Nursing Home which had been granted Idaho License No. 1. In 1987 the facility celebrated its 30th anniversary.

Reciting a verse from "The Ballad of East and West" as CBS news aired the footage of leaders of the United States and the Soviet Union shaking hands on a historic peace accord, was just one of the ways Lola Clyde interacted with the world around her. A tribute to Mrs. Clyde, who died January 9, 1993, at the age of 92, by Grace Wicks appear in this issue along with excerpts from her oral history interviews and a letter Mrs. Clyde wrote in 1965 about harvest time in the 1930s. By the way, at the end of the Evening News, Dan Rather remarked, "The lady knows her Kipling."

Editor Bert Cross uses oral histories to recount the enjoyment county residents found in the traveling Chautauquas. The original Chautauquas were founded in 1873 at Chautauque Lake, New York, and later became commercial enterprises touring the United States. The goal of these programs given under large tents were to provide culture, education and entertainment for those living in isolated areas. The traveling companies were funded by local sponsors and ticket sales and would stay in town a week or two.

Readers will also enjoy two sketches by Nancy Atkinson about life in Moscow during World War II and a reminiscence by Jean Rudolph of family touring in the 1920s. Charles Bower of Kendrick remembers "Winter in the Country", Homer Futter traces the history of lentils in the Palouse Country, and Bert Cross uncovers the mystery of Moscow's early postmistress.

## Watering Restrictions In Kendrick Now In Effect

Despite the heavy rains of the past two months, the City of Kendrick looked at its water reservoir after a dry weekend and realized that it was time to consider restricting outside watering. At the meeting of the city council Tuesday evening, it was decided to put watering on an odd-even basis effective immediately. Homes and businesses with even address numbers may water on Mondays, Wednesdays and Friday. Those homes and businesses with odd number addresses may water on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, until further notice. There will be NO SUNDAY watering.

The rains slacked off last week and by the weekend there were many residents watering their lawns. This increase showed immediately in the levels of the reservoirs and the times the pumps drawing the water up were in use.

While there is no shortage of water at this time, August and September can be very dry months, and the council feels it is a good policy to "play it safe."

There are no hour restrictions on watering at this time—just the days.

## George Merrick, Retired Teacher, Passes July 4

George H. Merrick, a former Juliaetta resident and a highly respected man who had devoted his life to education, died Sunday, July 4, at Kennewick, Washington of congestive heart failure.



He taught school at both Kendrick and Deary.

George was born January 5, 1903 at Mt. Pleasant, Utah, the son of George F. L. Merrick and Hattie Henry Merrick. Because his mother was very frail and had lost two sons in childbirth, the couple left their homestead at Ashton, Idaho and traveled to Mt. Pleasant, his father's home, for the birth. As soon as the mother was able to travel they returned to Ashton.

He attended an elementary country school and graduated from Ashton High School. After high school he attended Ricks College and the University of Idaho for two years, then accepted a teaching and coaching position at Hansen, Idaho. It was at Hansen that he met his wife, Doris who was also a teacher there. He received his Bachelors and Masters degrees from the University of Idaho.

Doris and George were married June 10, 1928 at Tacoma, Wash. To this union three children were born, Harry, Marianne and John.

George spent most of his life teaching. He taught at Hasen, Carey, Bellevue, Deary, Marsing and Kendrick.

Doris and George retired from teaching in 1968 and traveled extensively, having touched every continent. He loved people especially young people, and enjoyed the company of children all over the world.

He was a member of the Deary Masonic Lodge, A. F. & A. M., the Kendrick United Methodist Church and many teaching organizations.

Survivors include two sons, Harry Merrick of Spokane and John Merrick of Genesee; a daughter, Marianne Drussel of Richland; two brothers, Frank Merrick of Garden Grove, Calif., and Charlie Merrick of Ashton, Idaho; seven grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

Two sisters died previously.

The funeral was held Friday, July 9 at Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel in Lewiston with the Rev. Roger Herndon officiating. Burial followed at the Juliaetta City Cemetery.

The family suggests memorials, if desired, be given to the Kendrick-Juliaetta Ambulance Fund, Kendrick, Idaho, 83537.

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**Suggested Guidelines  
For Parents of Teenagers  
Hosting a Party**

1. Set the ground rules with your teen before the party.
  - \* Let your teen know what you expect. This will give both of you an opportunity to express feelings and concerns.
  - \* It is important to stress shared responsibility.
2. A parent should be home during the party.
  - \* Encourage shared chaperoning.
  - \* Plan to have the party in a part of the house where guests will be comfortable and where you can maintain adequate supervision.
  - \* Plan to bring in the treats and non-alcoholic drink. This will help to keep the party running smoothly and give you an opportunity to meet your teen's friends.
3. Notify your neighbors that there will be a party.
  - \* Encourage your teen to call or send a note to close neighbors telling them about the party.
4. Notify the police when planning a "large" party.
  - \* This will help the police protect you, your guests and neighbors.
  - \* If needed, discuss with the police an agreeable plan for guest parking.
5. Limit party attendance and times.
  - \* Small groups (under 30) are easier to handle.
  - \* Set time limits for the party that enables teens to be home at reasonable times.
  - \* Avoid open-house type parties. It's difficult for parents and teens to keep control with this type of party.
6. Guests should not be allowed to come and go.
  - \* This will discourage teens from leaving the party to drink or use other drugs elsewhere and returning.
7. You may be brought to court on criminal charges and/or have to pay monetary damages in a civil lawsuit if you furnish alcohol or drugs to minors.
  - \* Be alert to the signs of alcohol or drug use.
  - \* Guests who try to bring alcohol or other drugs, or who otherwise refuse to cooperate should be asked to leave. Be willing to call police if unwanted guests refuse to leave.
  - \* Notify parents of any teen who arrives at the party drunk or under the influence of drugs to ensure the teen's safe transport home. Do not let the teen drive under the influence of drugs or alcohol!
  - \* Other ideas:
    - \* Avoid easy access to alcohol. Lock your own liquor supply away.
    - \* Plan to have plenty of food and non-alcoholic drinks.

\* It's vital for parents to become acquainted with their children's friends and their parents.

\* If, despite all precautions, things get out of hand, don't hesitate to call the police for help.

Parents and teenagers should understand each other beforehand that the above guidelines are in effect at all parties. Parties do occur spontaneously and are often more difficult to control. Knowing the rules ahead of time helps avert problems. Special Note: Teens frequently try to party at homes where parents are away. If you must be away, make arrangements for quality supervision to ensure protection for you and your teen. It's a good idea to let your neighbors and the school know that you're going to be out of town and leave information on how to contact you. Make sure your teenager knows you will not tolerate partying in your home when you are not there.

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### Flour Consumption Hits 45-Year High

Americans' per capita consumption reached 138 pounds in 1992, the highest level since 1948, according to the U. S. Department of Commerce.

This 45-year high marks a rising trend that began in 1972, when a six-decade slide in flour consumption bottomed out at 110 pounds. Since then, Americans have quietly inched up their grain consumption in defiance of long standing worldwide economic patterns. History has it that flour consumption declines as income rises and recent International Wheat Council data show a continuing downward slope in most areas of the world.

"In America, flour consumption dropped from 210 pounds in 1910 to just 110 pounds in 1972," said Judi Adams, a registered dietician who heads the nonprofit Wheat Foods Council. "Now the most prosperous country in modern history is undergoing a quiet but profound change. We've shifted our thoughts from abundance to balance and from sus-

tenance to good health." Despite this reversal, grain consumption remains well below what health professionals recommend. Bread, cereal, pasta and other foods made with flour help people meet the seemingly high goal of 6 to 11 daily grain servings recommended in the Federal Food Guide Pyramid. The guideline underscores the role of low-fat grains in helping people control weight and limit fat intake by first filling up on energy-filled complex carbohydrates and natural fiber.

A recent Gallup survey found that just 5 percent of Americans obtain the minimum six grain servings each day. Nationally people average about four daily servings.

"If Americans follow the advice of health and nutrition leaders, per capita flour consumption should rise another 40 to 50 pounds," Adams said. The trend is especially encouraging to U. S. wheat producers who would need to grow nearly 300 million more bushels to meet the demand. A quantity that would take

Idaho's wheat producers almost three years to produce.
